## METHODIST CONFERENCE ISSUES FINAL DRAFT STATION SHEET

Rev. Neil McLaughlin Comes to Fredericton--Ordination Service Held at which Two Candidates are Received into the Ministry--The Case of Rev. Mr. Deinstadt Settled.

Sackville, N. B., June 18.—The stationing committee held a strenuous session last night and did not complete their labors until 11.30 Saturday.

Owing to the scarcity of men a number of preaching appointments could not be filled.

A special committee, consisting of Rev. R. W. Weddall and E. H. Beers, reported as follows:

Your committee appointed to recommend to conference the best method of securing \$20,000, the amount apportioned to this conference as its share of the amount required to increase the capital account of the supernumerary fund, recommend that this conference appoint Rev. George Steel to act on its behalf in raising said amount. The report was adopted.

Rev. H. G. Thomas presented notice of motion which was given a year which proposed the gradual extinction of the children's fund between this date and the year 1912. On motion, the matter was laid on the table until next year.

Rev. J. B. Gough presented the report of the committee on church property. Adopted.

Rev. H. D. Marr, St. John, gave the report of the general Epworth League fund. He asked to be excused from the office of secretary-treasurer of the fund. Rev. J. Heaney, St. John, was elected in his stead.

Rev. Dr. Wilson, St. John, gave the report of the state of work. It showed the net increase in membership in the N. B. and P. E. I. conference during the past year of 473.

Conference adjourned at 12 o'clock to meet at 9.30 Monday morning.

### THE DEINSTADT MATTER

The ministerial session of the N.B. and Prince Edward Island conference was held Saturday afternoon, the attendance being fairly large. F. W. Mosher, Book Steward of Halifax, gave his financial statement in connection with the book room. It is understood that there was a balance on the right side of about \$400 as a result of the past year's operations.

Rev. Dr. Johnson, editor of the Wesleyan, Halifax, spoke briefly in the interest of that publication.

On motion of Rev. George Steel, seconded by Dr. Rogers, the following resolution was unanimously passed:

Resolved, that the ministerial session of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island conference have heard with pleasure from F. W. Mosher, book steward, and Dr. Johnston, editor of the Wesleyan, and hereby assure them of hearty co-operation in the important interests which have been committed to them, and we have heard with satisfaction of the success of the last quadrennium.

On motion, Tennyson McDonald, having expressed a desire to take a circuit, it was placed in the hands of the superintendent of missions.

The Deinstadt matter came up for a long discussion in which many took part, Dr. Carman occupying the chair. There were motions and substitute motions, points of law and of discipline. The matter was at last settled satisfactorily, however, Mr. Deinstadt making no claim for salary for the past year; during which time, through a number of untoward circumstances, he was unemployed on the circuit.

MINISTERS ORDAINED  
George Morris, Granville (P.E.I.), and Charles Frederick Gibson, were ordained with impressive ceremonies. Those who took part in laying on of hands, were Dr. Carman, Dr. Sprague, Dr. Stewart and Rev. Messrs. George F. Dawson, A. D. McCully, W. C. Watson T. Stebbings and M. R. Knight.

After opening of the conference Saturday morning, Dr. Carman, general superintendent delivered a brief, but very forceful address. He spoke of the British empire and of its mission in the world, and of the great union movement, which would be considered at the coming general conference. The idea of union and of merger, he said, was in the air. There were bank mergers, cement mergers and now there was a merger in China. Four religious bodies, including Methodist, were erecting colleges in China with view to a central university. Reference was made to magnificent plant at Mount Allison to the labor of the past and the fruition of the present. Dr. Graham and Rev. C. E. Manning were referred to in complimentary terms and fitting mention was made of the critical illness of Dr. Sutherland.

Dr. Carman said that the work of the Methodist church in Canada had grown into many departments, but the church had splendid secretaries to attend all the different branches. In addition to these active men, a speaker said, there was need of a sort of unifying force to supervise. He recommended the appointment by general conference of two active middle-aged men to be general superintendents or assistant superintendents. The church did not want as superintendent an old stick so serve merely as a hitching post.

"Guard our Methodism," said Dr. Carman; "guard our ecclesiastical interests." There is a little tendency to centre matters in the west. We look to men of the west for vigor and activity but there should be balancing and unifying force, centripetal rather than centrifugal. The speaker adjured ministers to preach the great truths of the Great God. Christianity is God's great effort to bring things back. The great primal doctrines of the gospel have enough in them for every man. Let us be true to our faith and opportunities, said Carman, "for God has set before us an open door glorious to contemplate."

## EMIGRANTS DEPORTED ON ARRIVAL AT QUEBEC

They were Brought Out by a Paris Hosiery Firm, but were not Allowed to Proceed to Their Destination—Manufacturers Petition Government on Matter

London, June 18.—The experiences at Quebec of thirteen emigrants engaged by a hosiery firm at Paris, Ontario, are causing considerable comment and commotion here. The men say they were detained a week in the immigration hospital, although possessing considerable money. Their letters and telegrams to the firm were not sent, and finally, without any explanation, they were deported. The men also say that the firm subsequently informed them that they had sent £60 to the customs officers to release them, but the money was returned with the intimation that the men were being "sent on." One explanation is that the deportation was in consequence of the men being "contract labor." Lord Strathcona in an interview doubted this, but said he had every confidence in the immigration authorities at Quebec.

## NEW LUMBER TARIFF IN EFFECT YESTERDAY

Montreal, June 17.—New tariffs on lumber, issued by the Canadian Pacific, Grand Trunk, and Canadian Northern Railways, went into effect yesterday, to apply to all lumber brought to Montreal for export purposes.

Lumber will be placed on the same footing as most other commodities, which are generally given special rates for export, the object being to aid the export business of the country. The saving to lumbermen will be considerable, amounting to from one to one and a half cents per hundred pounds.

The lumber exporters will also be allowed the difference between the rates which went into effect on July 5th, 1909, and the rate, enforced yesterday, which will amount to a considerable figure.

An application had been made to the Railway Commission by the Montreal Lumber Association, acting in conjunction with the Canadian Lumbermen's Association at Ottawa, asking for lower domestic rates and for a restoration of lower rates on export lumber from the port of Montreal. The former request was refused but the latter was granted, and in accordance with it the railways yesterday put into effect the new tariffs.

## TERRIBLE TRAGEDIES ACROSS THE BORDER

Gorham, Me., June 18.—Walter S. Hanscomb, a hostler, was found early this morning lying on a bed in the stable of B. W. Bickford, where he was employed, with a bullet wound through his heart. Beside him was Mrs. Annie Stewart, an employee of a Portland hotel, partially unconscious, with a wound on the side of her face, also made by a pistol ball. The revolver with which the shooting had been done was found on the floor close by the bed. The man was 32 years old and the woman 38. Both were disrobed. After a thorough investigation of the affair the county authorities have held Ray Welch, a young man of good family in Gorham, as a material witness. Both the man and the woman had been drinking and it is the theory of the county attorney that in flourishing the revolver to frighten a party of young men who were about, Hanscomb accidentally shot the woman and then killed himself. Although the possibility that a third party may have done the shooting has not been discarded. It was learned late this afternoon that Carroll Holden, another Gorham boy, lay in a stupefied condition in a room adjoining the one where the bodies were found throughout the night. Mrs. Stewart is at the Maine General Hospital, and will recover. She has made no statement.

### KILLED WIFE AND HIMSELF

Portland, Me., June 18.—A murder and suicide following close upon a similar tragedy in the neighboring town, of Gorham, took place this evening, when Wm. Libby, a laborer, shot and killed his wife, Nora Nelson Libby, 25 years old, and then put a bullet through his own head and died at the Maine General Hospital shortly after midnight.

The couple were married two years ago but separated a month ago. Friends brought them together tonight in an attempt at reconciliation, but with tragic results.
