BACTERIOLOGICAL
LABORATORY FOR U. N. B.

Premier Hazen Favors Proposals of Union of Municipalities and Promises Consideration.

The president and secretary of the New Brunswick Union of municipalities waited upon Premier Hazen last evening in connection with the proposals for legislation made at the Campbellton convention with regard to the establishment of a bacteriological and chemical laboratory of the University of New Brunswick to be available for municipal purposes. The premier expressed himself as favorable toward the proposal and stated that he felt that arrangements could be made with authorities of the institution named to carry out the suggestion.

In connection with the exemption from taxation of water works and other facilities owned by cities and towns and located in neighboring municipalities, the resolution asking for exemption from taxation of such works also meets with the premier's favor.

The question of amending the municipalities act on taxation so as to require an affidavit to be filed with the parish assessors before any exemption from taxation could be allowed as well as the other propositions was discussed. Mr. Hazen assured the committee that he would take these matters up at once with his executive and act upon the decision of its members.

OPERATIONS STOPPED ON
LEPREAUX—NO SNOW

The lumbering operations carried on by Cornelius Hagerman of Keswick, on the Lepreaux, have been suspended for the season on account of the lack of snow. The camps have been broken up and the men have left for their homes. The lack of snow has compelled Mr. Hagerman to leave about 1,000,000 feet of lumber on the yards. This amounts to almost half the season's cut.

In past years there has been much difficulty in driving the Lepreaux. This is likely to be increased this year by the scarcity of snow. In January, during the freshet caused by heavy rains, Mr. Hagerman drove the lumber which could be got at into safe waters and is likely to bring it all out.

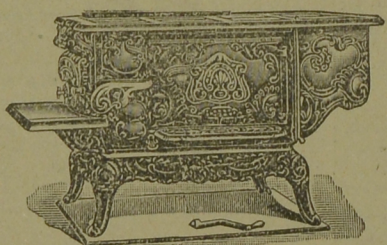

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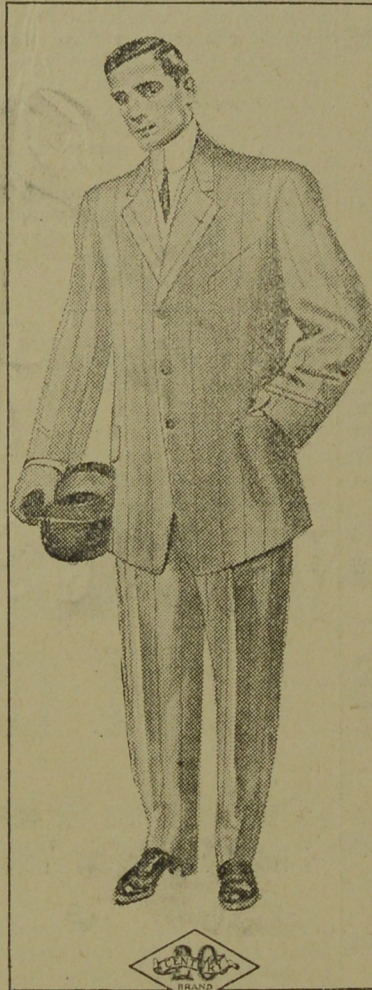
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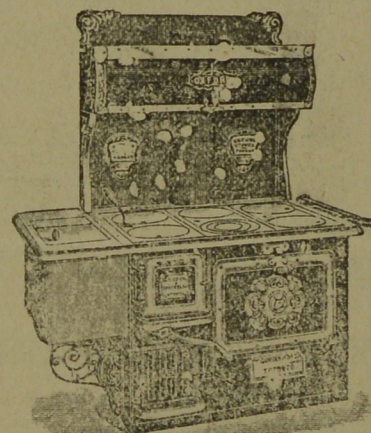
