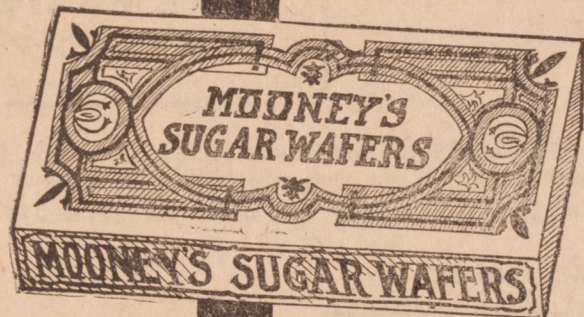

At the meeting of the representatives of the County Councils of Middlesex, Lambton and Huron held in Goderich yesterday to consider road and bridge matters of mutual interest the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Moved by A. J. Irwin, warden of Huron, seconded by D. S. Campbell, warden of Middlesex, that whereas the port of Goderich is the most important on the east coast of Lake Huron; and whereas large elevator accommodation has been, and is now

in process of construction; and whereas the growing importance of the West as the granary of the Empire necessitates such increased storage facilities, therefore be it resolved by the assembled joint committees of the counties of Huron, Middlesex and Lambton, that the Minister of Public Works, Hon. Mr. Pugsley, be petitioned to at once proceed with the breakwater and other improvements necessary to make the port of Goderich a safe and commodious harbor for all vessels engaged in trade on the upper lakes.

FOREST FIRES THOUGHT TO BE DUE TO LIGHTNING

Portland Ore., Aug. 18—Lightning, part of a general electric storm is believed to have started a series of forest fires east of Butte Falls in the crater reserve of a serious nature that forestry service at once asked for one hundred soldiers as fire fighters. The request was granted and 2 companies will leave the American Lake encampment tomorrow morning.

The largest fire was found to have a solid line of flame three miles long

ROAD WILL OPEN UP NEW AREA OF TIMBER

Winnipeg, Aug. 18.—A. Knechel, of the Dominion Department of Forestry has returned from a trip of some weeks' duration through the new territory which will be opened up by the Hudson Bay Railroad.

From Warren's Landing down, he came on the steamer Wilverine, which brought Lady Grey and Lady Evelyn Grey from seeing the Governor-General off on his famous northern trip. The Forestry Department has recently established three parties of four men each to work in the north country along the new line. One party to operate from the Pas along the proposed line of the Hudson Bay Railway; another to operate along the Nelson River to Split Lake; and the third to work round between Norway House and Oxford House, and from there out towards Hudson Bay.

Their duties are to post notices printed in English and Greek along the main lines of travel in the far north, and to meet travelers and instruct them with regard to the great necessity of putting their camp fires out before leaving them. In case a fire occurs the party having charge of

the district is supposed to do their best to extinguish it. Their winter work will be to locate and to prepare a map of all tracts of timber land, giving an estimate of kinds and quantities. Mr. Knechel said he was surprised to find the country as heavily timbered as it was, although not of large dimensions.

POLICE HUNT FOR REMAINS OF BALLOON

Dessau, Germany, Aug. 18—Police Gendarmes and foresters are today conducting a search of the hills and forests in this vicinity for the remains of a balloon and its passengers, which was last night seen flaming in the sky. Some wood cutters, who were returning from their work at nightfall observed a burning balloon drifting over the wooded hills at a considerable altitude, finally falling in rapid descent. The wood cutters lost sight of the balloon as it neared the earth, but immediately notified the authorities in Dessau, who sent out searching parties. Darkness soon fell and the search among the hills could not be continued during the night, but at daybreak this morning, the hunt was resumed.

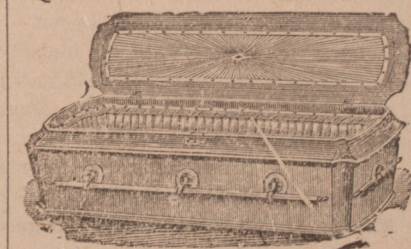
