Pittsburg, Pa., Nov. 25.—Jesse Bluestone, a former member of the Pennsylvania legislature, and Samuel Mosenen, were found guilty of complicity in the white slave trade today Rachel Weiner, 18 years old, amid tears, related how she had been lured from a factory by promises of rich clothes and high living. The defendants denied her evidence.

### HAS BERNIER MADE TRIP BY N. W. PASSAGE

Ottawa, November 24.—A communication has been received by the Marine Department from Capt. Bernier, who is in the far north of Canada, asserting the jurisdiction of the Dominion. Captain Bernier left Quebec in the Arctic in June. His letter was written in August and left at a whaling station to be brought out. It reached Ottawa by way of Scotland. If the captain succeeded in carrying out his programme he must have accomplished the Northwest passage by this time, and will be next heard from via Dawson City, where mail will arrive from the police post at the mouth of the Mackenzie River.

"C.G.S. Arctic, Albert Harbor, August 11, 1910:

"We had fair passage as far as Greenland, where we encountered a good deal of ice and fog. We sighted Cape York, on the 27th July, 1910, and we anchored on the 3rd of August at Albert Harbor, and built our first cache, called No. 1, in case anything might happen to us.

"We are now proceeding to Salmon River to take a few salmon before we proceed to Beechy Island, where we will build cache No. 2, close to Sir John Franklin's memorials. From there I will call at Dealy Island and Melville Island where I will see the condition of the cache which was left by Commander Kellet in 1854. From there I will proceed and leave a small depot at Winter Harbor in case our ship may be nipped by the ice in McClure Strait.

### EVERYTHING FAVORABLE.

"At present everything seems favorable to us to perform our work. Since our arrival here we have had strong gales from the south and southeast, which indicates that the ice will be broken up as far as we can see from this distance. Everybody on board is well.

"I am sorry to say that I cannot wait any longer for Scotch whalers. They have been here during the first part of July and traded with the Eskimos, but so far they had not succeeded in catching any whales. I will leave our letter at the station for the whalers to take home when they come here and this is the last opportunity to communicate with you until we reach Herschel Island, and if not successful in reaching Herschel's Island we will winter in the best place we can get, and we will come back to Pond's Inlet for our mails and any other communication that you may send us."

Captain Bernier adds the following: "N.B.—For the benefit of the Minister of Marine or any one else who might happen to call, the record and key of cache No. 1 will be found over the door of the cache."

The record posted on the door of the cache declares:

"Know all men, that the steamer Arctic landed here and built this cache No. 1 in case anything may happen to us in the performing of our duty in the north. This will be our rendezvous in case of accident. We leave this thirteenth of August, 1910

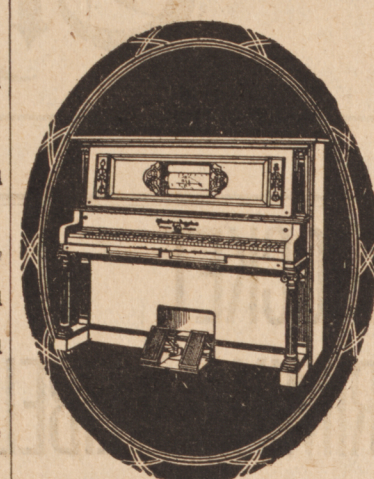
