NEW YORK MAN  
HAD SUCCESSFUL  
HUNTING TRIP

Dr. Galpin Chats Entertainingly of His Trip to the Miramichi—Saw Over One Hundred Moose.

Dr. H. T. Galpin, of New York, who returned yesterday from a most successful hunting trip to Braithwaite's camps on the Miramichi woods, left last evening for Montreal, accompanied by Mrs. Galpin and her mother, Mrs. Smith, who have been sojourning in the city for the past fortnight. In conversation with a representative of The Mail, Dr. Galpin said his hunting trip was the most enjoyable of his life. "You certainly have a great game country here," he said, "and I am planning to return next year with some friends and spend six weeks with you. I was put in the woods twelve days, and I guess I must have seen at least a hundred moose. The one I shot had an antler spread of fifty-six inches, and twenty-five points, but he was a lightweight in comparison with one which I spent a whole week following up. I think I really got on the trail of the daddy moose of the Miramichi, but he was too wise for me and I failed to get a shot at him. The guides measured his tracks and claimed that they measured eighteen inches from the toes to the claws, and I guess they were pretty near right. I followed him day after day and only got one glimpse of him and then he was three hundred yards away which was too far to risk a shot. I would like very much to have got him but he was too foxy for me. I had Robert Hunter for a guide and he gave every satisfaction."

Dr. Galpin went on to say that he made the acquaintance of Lord Kingston and Sir Robert Harvey, Bart., while in the woods. He spent a night with each of them and found them most genial and companionable. They have had several chances to shoot moose, but the heads were not large enough to suit them and they allowed the chances to go by. When the doctor started for the settlement Lord Kingston had set out on the trail of the big moose and seemed to be confident of bagging him.

Dr. Galpin is the secretary of the Canadian Camp of New York, and a sportsman of wide experience. Hitherto he has done most of his hunting in Maine, but in future he will probably give New Brunswick the preference. It is his intention to publish an account of his trip in the Burr-McIntosh Monthly of New York.

The moose which Dr. Galpin secured had an antler spread of fifty-six inches and twenty-five points. It is

It is the intention to have the organization in such a condition that when the time comes again to test the strength of the party the victory will be assured.
