RUMOR OF RAID
CAUSED EXCITEMENT
IN CERTAIN QUARTERS

Authorities Deny Knowledge of it—
Three Scott Act Cases to be Disposed of on Monday.

For the past few days there have been rumors of a raid on a resort on the Woodstock Road, about three miles from the city. The authorities, however, both city and county, deny any knowledge of such raid. It is said however, that such a raid was planned to take place on Tuesday night. Those in charge of the resort were informed of what was to come and a messenger was despatched from this city early that evening with orders that the inmates of the house were to prepare for the raid. It is understood that some of them came to the city and others went elsewhere, and the result was that no raid took place.

SCOTT ACT CASES.

Three Scott Act cases will be disposed of by the Police Magistrate on Monday. One will be a first offence case in which a restaurant keeper is the defendant. The others will be first and third offence cases against a druggist. In the case in which the restaurant keeper figures evidence was completed yesterday. Certificates of first and second offences were presented today in the third offence case. Counsel for the defence protested against the admission of the certificate of a first offence for which conviction was secured in 1906 on the ground that it occurred before the amended act of 1908.

PECULIAR JAG.

A drunk was arrested last night and sent to jail for eight days this morning. His jag took a peculiar form as he insisted on entering a residence on the Woodstock Road near the Rural Cemetery and taking possession of one of the rooms. The police were summoned by telephone.

MAJOR C. F. O. FISET
DIED SUDDENLY IN
QUEBEC ON TUESDAY

Formerly Commanded "H" Company
R. C. R. Here—Was Transferred to
Quebec in April Last.

The death of Major Cyprien F. O. Fiset of the Royal Canadian Regiment, who left this city early in April last to take command of No. 5 Regimental Depot at Quebec, took place in the latter city late Tuesday night. He had been ill only a few days. The deceased is survived by a widow and several children.

HIS MILITARY CAREER

Cyprien Frederic Olivier Fiset was born in the Province of Quebec on July 21, 1864. He began his military career in 1884, when he was commissioned a lieutenant in the 9th Regt., "Volontaires de Quebec." In 1891 he was gazetted a lieutenant in the Royal Canadian Regiment and in 1895 received the brevet rank of captain in that corps. In 1901 he became full captain. He received the brevet rank of major in 1903 and full rank in the present year.

The late major Fiset saw service in the Northwest during the Rebellion of 1885 and was awarded a medal for his services. He served at Fredericton early in the '90s as a subaltern and returned to this city in 1906 as commanding officer of "H" Company R. C. R. which was transferred to Fredericton from St. John's, P. Q. While stationed here Major Fiset took a course of several months' duration at the Staff College in England. He was transferred to Quebec in April last as commanding officer of No. 5 Regimental Depot.

SERVED IN INDIA

During his military career the deceased served three years with the Imperial troops in India and since his return to Canada had been stationed in Toronto, Montreal, Quebec, St. John's, Fredericton and Halifax.

RECEIVED WITH REGRET

The news of Major Fiset's sudden death was received here last evening with great regret. While stationed in this city the late Major Fiset made a large number of friends. Much sympathy for the bereaved family is felt here.
