LORD MORLEY ON FRICTION OF SECOND CHAMBERS

He asks Lord Rosebery to Define the Terms Strength and Efficiency.

Lord Morley in reply to Lord Rosebery during a discussion on the reform of the House of Lords, recently made a speech which will be remembered for some time. He said:—

I wish Lord Rosebery had taken more exalted lines in his speech, and told us plainly what he means by those two words—strength and efficiency. I think it means that this is a move—I do not use the word cynically—against the House of Commons. The stronger and more efficient this House becomes on the scale contemplated by Lord Rosebery the more it must mean opposition to the House of Commons. This demand for a strong and efficient Second House is really a taking back—an attempt to take back—that extension of popular electoral power which is one of the glories of the party opposite. If it means that you are to have your own way against the House of Commons, then it is a taking back of electoral power which the persons concerned will assuredly not stand.

Will Lord Rosebery's proposals lessen the liabilities of friction between the two Houses? Surely not. The stronger and more efficient the Second Chamber, the more are the chances of friction multiplied and intensified. One great complaint of this House is that Bills are not sent up here in time to receive adequate discussion (hear, hear). That is a complaint which had been made whichever party is in power. What is the most injurious of the complaints against your lordship's House? It is the difference between the treatment by this House of Liberal and Conservative Bills. This is due to systematic class prejudice, and nothing so much lowers the prestige of this House as that impression. How are you going to make deadlocks less frequent, less troublesome, and less dangerous? Do what you like for a renovated House by simply reducing the number of Peers, and you can never possess strength and efficiency except in the most restricted and narrow sense. Mr. Balfour said the other day, "We want this House to represent the permanent wishes of the nation." What did Mr. Balfour mean? Does he believe that the men whom the electorate sent to the House of Commons are more blind to the wishes of the nation than the House of Lords? Lord Rosebery referred to Cromwell. I do not altogether agree with him as to the feats and achievements of that illustrious man. I once wrote something on Cromwell, and I will quote a few words:—

"There is no branch of political industry that men approach with hearts so light and yet that leaves them at the end so melancholy as the concoction of Second Chambers. Cromwell and his Parliament set foot on this pons asinorum of democracy. But he never thought it out. He never, when he began, decided whether he should make his Lords strong or weak—strong enough to curb the Commons and yet weak enough to be curbed by the Commons."

That is a riddle which Cromwell failed to solve and I do not think my noble friend's contribution has yet solved it. (Ministerial cheers).—

MONTREAL TRAIN DELAYED.

A freight train which got off the track on the line of the C. P. R., delayed the Montreal express for over six hours. As a consequence mails and passengers from the west will not reach this city until some time this evening.

The prospect is that the Business Men's Association of the city, which is to complete organization tonight, will begin its existence with a large membership. The merchants and others are realizing the value of such an organization. Tonight's meeting will be held in the city council chamber.

DEATH OF JAMES A. YOUNG.

The death of James A. Young, of Taymouth, took place at about two o'clock this morning. The deceased was eighty-nine years of age and was one of the best known men on the Nashwaak, having been one of the pioneers in that region. He is survived by two sons and eight daughters. The sons are Mr. John A. Young, M. P., and Mr. William J. Young, of Taymouth. The daughters are Mrs. W. J. McWha, Mrs. J. Fred Douglas, and Miss Annie Young, of St. Stephen; Mrs. Gordon A. Grant of Southampton, Mrs. E. A. Bell of Cross Creek, Mrs. John R. Buchanan of Taymouth, Mrs. P. M. McDonald and Miss Gertrude A. Young of this city. Another daughter, Mrs. Melvin McNeill predeceased her father. The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at Taymouth. The funeral will be held at 1.30. Service will be held in the Presbyterian church at two o'clock, Dr. W. H. Smith, of St. Paul's church, Fredericton, officiating.

ICE EXPECTED TO RUN OUT SOON

The ice in the river at this point is likely to run out within a short time now. The river is clear up to Oromocto Island. The ice in the Oromocto river has run out and preparations for stream driving on that stream are being made. The Washade-moak is clear with the exception of a short distance at the mouth. The ice in the Nashwaak is still firm. It is reported that the steamer Majestic has got up as far as McGowan's.

Reports from up river are to the effect that the weather is a little colder today. The hail storm which struck this city about 1 p. m. was also felt up river.

Reports from up river by Western Union are as follows:

Edmundston.—Cold and windy. Ice is still good. Hail began to fall at 11.50 a. m.

Woodstock.—River raised about six inches last night. No crossing on ice, but pretty firm—cloudy, cool, some showers.

Grand Falls.—Ice is still solid north of Grand Falls—open south of Grand Falls. Weather cloudy, appearance of rain. Wind about southeast.

There was a report to the effect that the ice below the Intercolonial railway bridge had started yesterday afternoon. This was not correct.

WALL STREET TODAY.

MONTREAL STOCKS.

Montreal, March 31.—Stock prices were generally strong today. Dominion Coal being the only exception, with further decline of two points to 75. Scotia again fluctuated violently advancing from 82½ at opening to 86½ and later easing off to 85½. Halifax tram was 1 point higher at 123½. Other features were Steel 68½ to 68½. Cement 50½ pfd 88½; Montreal street 247½, Soo pfd 107, Asbestos pfd 95½, Power 138, Quebec 34½.

DISCOUNT RULE UNCHANGED.

London, March 31.—The rate of discount in the Bank of England remains unchanged at 4 per cent.

BANK OF ENGLAND STATEMENT.

London, March 31.—The weekly statement of the Bank of England shows the following changes: Total reserve decreased £291,000; Circulation decreased £38,000; Bullion decreased £328,960; Other securities increased £2,543,000; Other deposits increased £686,000; Public deposits increased, £1,622,000; Notes reserve decreased £194,000; Government securities unchanged.

The proportion of the banks reserve to liability this week is 44.81 per cent. Last week it was 48.45 per cent.

London, March 30.—The rate of discount of the Bank of England remained unchanged at 4 per cent. to-day.

St. Petersburg, March 30.—A caravan of fifty Gypsies broke through the ice on Cherevontzki Lake near Lumea today. Of the men, women and children all but a few were drowned.

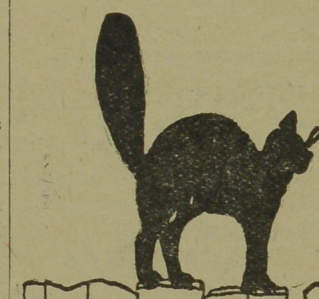
