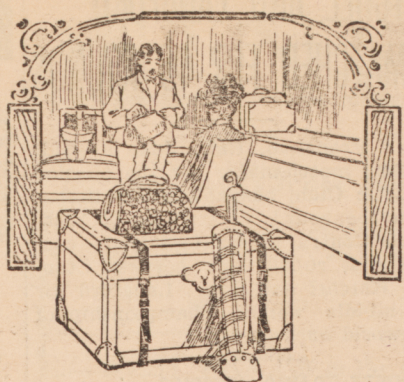

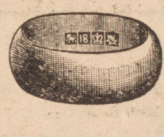

GENERAL ASSEMBLY NOW NEARING END OF LABORS

Session Passed Resolution Strongly Protesting
Against Action of Minister of Justice Regard-
ing Selling of Obscene Literature.

Halifax, June 8.—The house was smaller today by a considerable quantity. The work will now be rushed forward. At the beginning of the Assembly there is always a plethora of talk and little real work. After the reading of the minutes there was a rush of Committee Conventions to the platform, and Rev. Dr. Ramsay, for the Committee on Reception of Ministers; Prof. Baird for Committee on Formation of New Presbyteries, and Rev. Dr. Turnbull, for the Committee on Minister Evangelists, reported in quick succession. Mr. J. K. MacDonald, who is one of the keen business heads of the Assembly, presented the report of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund. It revealed a satisfactory condition in the finances. In moving the adoption of the fund, Dr. MacCrear remarking on the superior work done by Mr. MacDonald in this connection, drew loud applause. The Committee aims to acquire an endowment of half a million dollars to put it on a sound basis. Judge Forbes, of St. John, presented this side of the Committee's policy in a strong speech.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON H. M. AFFAIRS

A recommendation from the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa with reference to the appointment of a Superintendent of Missions for the Province of Quebec under a supervising Committee had been sent to a special commendation. Rev. J. A. MacFarlane, of Lewis, was appointed to the position for one year at a salary of \$2,000. This appointment is made as an experiment which if found satisfactory may be made permanent.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES W. D.

Mr. J. M. MacDonald reported for Board of Trustees. The contributions amounted to \$607,983.12 for the year. It was recommended that congregations send all collections to the Treasurer before February 28th each year. That the Treasurer have power to divide the moneys in his hands not allocated by the 28th of February. A recommendation of the Committee to secure property for a building to be used for all Presbyterian offices in Toronto was amended by the appointment of a Committee to enquire into the cost of a property and report at next Assembly.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

The auditor's report was given by Mr. J. N. MacDonald and adopted. One clause reads "In connection with the current investments made by the Board of Trustees we beg to note that at the close of the financial year only the small sum of \$4.33 interest upon a mortgage was in arrears." \$325,000 had been invested in mortgages during the year.

THE MATTER OF SKILL AND KING

A resolution was adopted without discussion regarding the action of the Minister of Justice in dealing with Skill and King, Toronto book-sellers, sentenced to imprisonment for selling obscene books. The promoters were summarily released on the advice of the Minister of Justice whose action and utterances at that time and subsequently. The Assembly felt it should challenge, and deemed it its duty to lay the matter before the Premier appealing to him to "take such action as will avert this grave peril immediately threatening our National life."

NEW YORKERS PAY NEARLY \$10,000 A YEAR FOR SKEWERS

New York, June 8.—Wholesale meat dealers of this city are selling 587,662 pounds of wood a year to the retail butchers, according to an estimate made by Clement J. Driscoll, chief of bureau of weights and measures. The wood is in the form of skewers which are put into the carcasses. The value of this amount of meat at an average of 16 cents a pound would be close to \$10,000 which comes out of the pocket of the consumers eventually. Mr. Driscoll says. He had before him today a number of wholesale and retail dealers in the hope of devising some remedy for this condition.

The Cincinnati Reds have secured Robinson the Milwaukee shortstop, as Downey is going poorly of late. Robinson was in the National league three years ago.

Hal. Chase, the Captain of the New York Americans, stealing third base in the game against the Chicago, which resulted in a twelve inning tie, the score being five runs apiece. Chase is doing good work in the field and is wielding the bat in great form heading his team in the batting averages.

THE "ALCHEMIST" GUARDS SECRET

Dr. Lange Says He Will Not Patent His Discovery Because no One Will Discover How He Changes Metals Into Silver.

Scranton, Pa., June 7.—Dr. Fred. Rick W. Lange, credited with having discovered an alchemic process by means of which he can convert inferior metals into silver, has made some striking demonstrations in his laboratory here. Visitors on Sunday saw him convert eight ounces of silver and eight ounces of an inferior metal into what he declares is silver. Saturday the resultant metal of merging eight ounces of silver and eight ounces of the inferior metal weighed sixteen ounces. Sunday the resultant metal weighed fifteen ounces, but it was easy to account for the other ounce. When the white hot crucible was taken out of the furnace, where it was subjected to a heat of 2,000 degrees, there was a tiny fissure in the side, caused by repeated exposure to such great heat, and through which some of the liquid metal dripped.

When asked what metals he had in the laboratory he said with a laugh: "I've got zinc, copper, lead, iron—any number of them."

He is absolutely cocksure that he can make two ounces of silver out of one. As he worked in his laboratory, he said:—

"When I get this thing equipped I will make 20,000 ounces a day. But I don't want to make silver to sell the silver metal. I want to convert it into nitrate and chlorides. There is more money in them. Silver chlorides sell for seventy-five cents an ounce, while the silver metals brings only fifty-four cents an ounce."

SPLIT-LOG DRAG DOES GOOD WORK

The split-log drag is a device which during the past few years, has grown rapidly in popular favor as an immediate maker of good roads in the United States and at a ridiculously low expense.

Over 10,000 farmers in Missouri are keeping in excellent repair with the split-log drag the ordinary county dirt roads leading from their front gate to their neighbors' front gate, toward town. Fifteen thousand are working on the roads of Illinois.

The Department of Highways of the State of Illinois has officially adopted this system of maintaining its roads throughout the entire state. The State of Ohio has taken up this method of road making, and foremost among automobile clubs of the nation to become enthusiastic advocates of this method of getting good roads now, to-day, cheap, stand several clubs in Pennsylvania. Among them are the Lancaster, Harrisburg, Pittsburg and Williamsport Good Roads Association.

The split-log drag is made from an ordinary log, eight or ten inches in diameter and from seven to nine feet long. The log is split in half, and the halves are spiked thirty inches apart, the split sides to the front. A team of horses is hitched to the drag by means of a chain, and the latter is dragged along the road at an angle of 45 degrees, moving the dirt to the middle of the road.

This dragging process is done after each rain. The farmer stands on the drag, and the moist earth, as it is moved to the centre of the road, fills the ruts, smooths out the uneven places and causes all inequalities to disappear. About one hour is required for the farmer to drag a mile of road after each rain.

The effect of the sun and wind baking the roadway each time it is dragged results in a smooth, hard surface, that withstands the heaviest traffic, that sheds water and brings joy to the heart of the farmer and motorist alike.

ANOTHER MOVE TO BRING MILLIONS INTO THE WEST

Big British Firm of Pryce Jones Will Open Up Large Department Stores in Different Parts of Western Provinces.

Mr. C. W. Rowley, of the Canadian Bank of Commerce in a despatch from Calgary today makes the announcement that a corporation supported by millions of British capital and under the control of Pryce-Jones and Company, of London, has been organized, and will establish mail order houses and large business interests throughout the western provinces.

Representatives of this firm recently visited the west; and after going carefully over the country decided upon Calgary as a proper location to open the first store.

This will mean the erection of a gigantic building in that town, while huge factories will be erected in other parts of the west.

Pryce-Jones have now established large Canadian business connections and it is not surprising that the six percent cumulative preferred shares for the first consignment of \$500,000 should be oversubscribed in less than a day and a half. This is proof, Mr. Rowley asserts that the British financiers now fully recognize the possibilities of the Canadian west.

The formation of this enterprise has been well approved, as it will mean the expenditure of millions of dollars, with every prospect of developing of a huge concern for the conducting of a general store and manufacturing business.

INSURANCE MEN BANQUET

Life Underwriters Claim Canadian Insurance Act is Best in the World

Halifax, June 9.—The fourth annual banquet of the Nova Scotia Life Underwriters was held at the Queen Hotel last evening and was a most successful affair. The gathering though small was a most congenial one, and after full justice had been done to a most excellent menu, some good speeches were heard.

The Dominion Life Underwriters was proposed by W. J. Marquand. Referring to life insurance in Canada, Mr. Marquand said that there was in force over \$800 million dollars of insurance. No other body of men were, he said, so closely in touch with the welfare of humanity.

The Insurance Act of Canada was the best piece of insurance legislation on the statute books of Canada, and this was due to the efforts of the Dominion Underwriters' Association. Hon. W. S. Fielding was the man who was responsible for this Act being such a good one. For four years he had listened to both sides of the question, and had given the country the best insurance legislation in the world.

In responding, J. T. Wilson briefly referred to the composition of the Dominion Association. He said Mr. Marquand had not spoken too strongly when he had said the Insurance Act was the best in the world. It had been before the House of Commons for three years and the people of Canada could point to it with pride. There was no similar legislation in England.

Mr. Wilson gave a brief review of the Act, and pointed out the many good features to be found therein.

WESTERN PRESS AND C. P. R. TELEGRAPH CO. AT LOGGERHEADS

Ottawa, June 8.—The application of the Western Associated Press for a revision of the new tariff of tolls on its press service, as filed by the C. P. R. Telegraph Company, was heard by the railway commission this afternoon. Representatives of the press from various parts of Canada were present to support the application and to urge better terms in telegraph rates for the regular press service exchanged between eastern and western Canada.

It was brought out in the evidence of John Kent, superintendent of C. P. R. telegraphs, that there was a radical discrimination in the tolls charged the western press service, as compared with rates in the east.

J. Ross Robertson, of Toronto, representing the Canadian Associated Press, and Toronto papers, strongly urged the adoption of the flat rate schedule submitted by the W. A. P. in preference to the sliding scale offered by the C. P. R., on the ground that it would greatly promote the interchange of Canadian news between the east and west.

Chairman Melce advised a conference of the newspaper men and representatives of the C. P. R., with a view to reaching some amicable arrangement. This conference was held tonight, but no agreement was reached.

The question will be further considered by the commission tomorrow.
