## INTERPROVINCIAL CONFERENCE MAY BE HELD AT EARLY DATE

(Toronto Globe)

It is altogether probable that, as a result of the discussion among the legal representatives of the Canadian Provinces at the Parliament Buildings on Saturday, Sir Lomer Gouin and Sir James Whitney may be asked to convene at an early date a formal inter-provincial conference.

At the last session of this Parliament of Provincial Premiers, held at Ottawa, the heads of Quebec and Ontario Governments were appointed joint convenors of future conferences. It was the original intention to hold these gatherings every year, but the difficulties experienced in suiting the convenience of the various interests involved in the absence of insistent subject matter caused this purpose to be abandoned and the responsibility placed upon the two Knights who presided over the pioneer Provinces.

### BASIS OF REPRESENTATION

The Globe learns that the primary purpose of the proposed conference will be to discuss the basis of representation in the Dominion Parliament as it affects the various Provinces. The point is raised, it is understood, by the Maritime Provinces which are threatened with further loss of representation as the result of the coming census. Under the British North America act the Province of Quebec is the standard for determining the basis of representation, and the fact that the census returns showed that the population grew more rapidly in this Province than in some of its eastern sisters, resulted in a shrinkage of their membership in Parliament. For instance it is pointed out that when Prince Edward Island entered confederation in 1873 she was accorded six members, while at the present time her representation is reduced to three.

The proposal as 'The Globe' learns it, is to secure an amendment to the act under which the minimum representation of the various Provinces will be fixed at the number they were given when they entered confederation. By this change of membership can never fall below the initial figure and reduction of representation will not be a danger beyond that point. As to the basis above that minimum, the present system, with Quebec as the standard, will continue to govern.

### VISIT SIR LOMER GOUIN TODAY

The whole matter is believed to have been formally discussed at the meeting on Saturday, and it is understood that considerable support was vouchsafed at the proposal. As

a result it is understood that Premier Hazzard of Prince Edward Island and Premier Hazen of New Brunswick will wait upon Sir Lomer Gouin, Premier of Canada, Chairman of the Interprovincial Conference, on their way east today, and urge him to communicate with Sir James Whitney, the Vice-chairman, with a view to the early calling together of the next Conference at Victoria. The place of meeting will be determined by the two Knight Premiers. It is reported that Premier McBride of British Columbia has made a strong bid for the location of the next Conference at Victoria but whether in view of the fact that on many matters likely to be dealt with conference with Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Federal Government may be necessary, this course will be followed seems problematical. Both Ottawa, where the last conference was held, and Toronto, where Sir James Whitney would readily extend hospitality have also been mentioned.

## LITTLE PROSPECT OF EXTRA DIVIDENDS IN U. S. STEEL

New York, Oct. 25.—The directors of the United States Steel Corporation will make public the regular quarterly report and dividend next Tuesday. There have been rumors current of the declaration of an extra dividend, but such action is not generally expected. While the corporation will probably earn in the neighborhood of 12 or 13 per cent. on the common stock this year, it is not believed that the directors would consider it policy to declare anything extra at this time in view of the extremely depressed condition of the steel industry and the uncertain prospect for next year. Such an extra declaration would mean either the most sanguine confidence in the future of the steel trade of a radical change in the policy of the corporation in respect to the employment of surplus earnings. The largest estimate of the earnings for the quarter place them at about \$37,000,000, which compares with \$40,170,960 the previous quarter. This is considerably more than was looked for in the early part of the quarter, but is based on the fact that specifications have been heavier than were looked for.

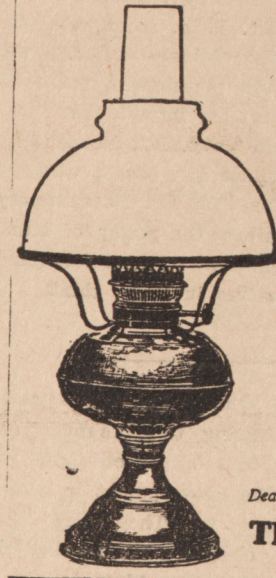

## NEED OF UNITY IN CANADIAN CHURCHES

(Montreal Herald.)

"More co-operation between the Christian denominations in Canada is required if much waste of useful energy is to be prevented and if the church is to overtake the needs of the rapidly increasing population of the western provinces which have suddenly shot forward into large communities, spread over great areas and present a problem that is quite without precedent in older lands."

Ven. Archdeacon Madden, of Liverpool, and Rev. Geo. H. Hansen, M. A., D. D., of Belfast, the two representatives of the Evangelical Alliance who have been on a tour through the Dominion, arrived here Saturday from Kingston, and thus summed up their impressions after having carefully surveyed the field all the way from Halifax, St. John and Charlottetown to Edmonton, Prince Albert and Saskatoon, together with the principal Ontario centres—Toronto, Hamilton, London and Ottawa.

They have been preaching in churches of all denominations, addressing large meetings, not only in connection with the places of worship, but the universities and Canadian clubs, and received with enthusiasm everywhere. They are vastly impressed by the extraordinary development they have witnessed. They came out in response to an invitation from the Toronto Evangelical Union, which met under the presidency of Sir Mortimer Clark, and requested the British Council to send over a delegation to promote the cause of Christian unity.

Archdeacon Madden is a leader of great force, the head of one of the principal churches in Liverpool—a sturdy evangelical churchman—while Dr. Hansen is a well-known Presbyterian leader, who holds the pastorate of the principal church in Belfast after having been for many years in charge of Marylebone Presbyterian Church, in some respects the most important in London.

Archdeacon Madden is the guest of the Bishop of Montreal, and Dr. Hansen is staying with Rev. Dr. Johnstone, of the American Presbyterian Church.

The Alliance which they represent is sixty years old and its catholicity is expressed by the Apostles' creed. Dr. Hansen in an interview last evening remarked that its objects are three-fold—first the promotion of a spirit of unity by bringing men together into the Alliance; second, the essential truths of the gospel by putting first the things that ought to go first, and third, the protection of minorities in the exercise of their conscientious convictions.

"This protection," said Dr. Hansen, "has been of a very real and effective kind in Europe on more than one occasion, when Christian unity has been threatened. For instance, Rev. John McNeil, who has been described as the Scottish Spurgeon, was invited a year or two ago by a united meeting of Protestants in Malta to hold a series of mission services, and engaged the theatre for the purpose."

The Roman Catholic Archbishop went to the Governor and represented that an old prerogative of the Roman Catholic Church, which it had possessed for centuries since the days when the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem had their headquarters there, had been invaded, and he insisted that the theatre should not be used for missionary purposes. The Governor yielded to the Archbishop. The Alliance took the matter up and brought it before the attention of Sir Edward Grey, secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, who wrote a courteous but peremptory letter to the governor, directing him to remove the prohibition and allow the services to be held. The Archbishop appealed against the decision to King Edward, but his late Majesty upheld the Foreign Minister, and also upheld the principle that under the

British flag any one is free to worship God as his conscience dictates.

Another illustration of the activity of the Alliance to which I may point was the stirring up of the indignation of Europe over the Armenian atrocities and spurring of the powers to action against the inhuman barbarities of the Turks to the Christian population under the domination of the late Sultan. Just how effective the Alliance can be for work of that kind may be judged from the fact that we have auxiliaries in twenty-nine different countries. Not only do we bring matters requiring redress before British statesmen, but through our auxiliaries we are able to bring direct pressure to bear upon any government in Europe

Dr. Hansen then turned to the special conditions as seen by the delegation in western Canada, mentioning that in places of four or five hundred inhabitants, including women and children, there were as many as four or even five churches—Anglican, Presbyterian, Methodist, Congregational and Baptist. There were really only room for one. They were all maintained by the mission, funds or they could not exist, but such waste of energy and funds should be avoided, particularly when there were so many new districts rapidly opening up, whose religious needs were either wholly neglected or very inadequately served.
