MEDITERRANEAN ISLAND
SWEEP BY TIDAL WAVE

Naples, Oct. 24.—The island of Ischia, in the Mediterranean Sea, sixteen miles southwest of the city of Naples, has been storm swept. First reports reaching here gave a very considerable loss of life from a tidal wave, but the latest reports indicate that the victims are few.

Communication with the island is difficult, but brief dispatches from Casamicciola state that while it is believed some persons were killed by the collapse of houses, the body of only one woman has so far been recovered.

Naples suffered from a furious storm of wind and rain last night and all today, the damage amounting to millions. Every section of the city bears the marks of the gale, and the suburbs were even more seriously affected, several persons being killed. The surrounding country has been devastated, great quantities of grapevines, trees, walls and parts of houses being scattered about in all directions.

An avalanche of stones and mud rushed down Mount Vesuvius above the lava line of the eruption of 1900. It swept all before it as far as the town of Portici. It wrecked the tram line and engulfed nearly a score of victims. Up to the present there is no confirmation of the report that Ischia suffered from a tidal wave or a seismic disturbance. It was in the direct path of the hurricane which

topped over the houses in Casamicciola and other villages. After the earthquake in 1883 these places were rebuilt with the very thinnest houses which, while admirably calculated to resist earthquakes, were unable to withstand the violence of the storm of the last 24 hours. While it is believed that there are some bodies under the debris, the very flimsy nature of the structures probably permitted most of the occupants to escape death or serious injury.

There is much anxiety here, however, as many residence of Naples under to Ischia to escape the cholera. Signor Cacchi, minister of public works and Admiral Leonardi, minister of marine, have already arrived at Naples. They will make an inspection of the district and direct if necessary the work of rescue.

ROME HEARS NEWS

Rome, Oct. 24.—The ministry of the interior this evening received word of a tidal wave at Casamicciola on the island of Ischia that drowned 200 persons. Communication with the island has been interrupted and verification of the report is impossible. The ministry of the interior has ordered four men of war to the scene with men and supplies. Casamicciola is 12 miles south west of Pozzuoli at the foot of Mount Epomeo. It was nearly destroyed by an earthquake in July, 1883 when about 177 lives were lost.

MONTREAL MEN
HELD FOR MURDER
OF YOUNG GIRL

Case Has Aroused Great Indignation
Throughout the City—Victim Said to
Have Been Drugged and Outraged.

Montreal, Oct. 25.—Sensational developments in the Westmount mystery occurred today, when the body of the girl, discovered in a vacant lot, was positively identified by the clothing as that of Cecile Michaud, a girl thirteen years of age.

It was immediately remembered that two men, Albert Cheverier, a bartender, and Ludger Perrault, a soloon-keeper, had a short time ago been committed for trial on a charge of abduction, and a still more serious charge against Cecile Michaud, and another girl of sixteen named Bernadette Dagenais.

Shortly after the Michaud girl disappeared in August, the father and a lawyer started an investigation with the result that they learned from Bernadette Dagenais that early in August the two men had met them and induced them to take an automobile ride, promising to bring them back in an hour. But Bernadette said that instead they were driven to a resort just outside the city and plied with drink, while Cheverier induced the Michaud girl to stay. Bernadette then left and apparently Cheverier was left alone with Miss Michaud, who was never seen again. This led to the arrest of Cheverier, and Perrault, and they were committed for trial on two charges. Now they are held for murder, and will probably be so charged at the coroner's inquest tomorrow.

The lower jawbone of the girl was discovered today with several teeth apparently knocked out. Two teeth were also missing from the upper front, while the father states that the child had a perfect set of teeth when he last saw her. He thinks the child was drugged and abused and that probably the teeth were knocked out in a struggle to force a drug into her mouth.

The case has aroused great feeling throughout the city, and every effort will be made to ferret it out.

SEARCHING FOR
MISSING BALLOONISTS

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 25.—Edmund F. Stratton, who has been sent here by the aero club of America to institute a search for the missing balloon America II., which sailed from St. Louis last Monday, and of which little trace has been heard since, said to night it would be mere guess work to venture any opinion as to what direction the balloon had taken. He has a party organized ready to rush to the scene of the descent wherever any report reaches him. His plan of campaign has been to approach the government and the telegraph companies, and tonight every operator throughout the region within which the balloon must be, has been notified to acquaint Mr. Stratton at once with any reports that reach them.

He places much dependence upon the newspapers, and hopes the readers of the press will be asked to communicate with him at once at Ottawa if they have seen any balloon, and mention particularly the color.

The two missing aeronauts have only four days' supply of provisions with them, but Mr. Stratton points out that when the balloon begins to descend everything may have to be thrown overboard, so that even their provisions may be gone. There are various rumors that the balloonists have been found; but Mr. Stratton does not consider any of them as authentic.

Bt. Louis, Mo., Oct. 25.—If Alan R. Hawley and Augustus Post and their balloon America II. are not reported by Wednesday morning, S. Louis Von Phul, as the representative of the Aero Club of St. Louis, will attempt to find them with the balloon St. Louis III., it was announced last night.

RICH GOLD STRIKE
IN AUSTRALIA

Melbourne, Aus., Oct. 25.—The Bull-finch gold discovery gives promises of great values. Some specimens of ore indicate an average of 400 ounces to the ton. A rush has been started over all Australia and expert seek peggers "wildcat" promoters and option hunters are crowded in the field. The government has surveyed the township site and within a month building blocks will be ready for action. The marvellous lode has not yet been found to extend beyond Bull-finch, but companies claim that it continues and have floated many claims beyond the district. There is a frantic speculation on the Adelaide and Melbourne exchanges.

Mr. Doolittle, who purchased Bull-finch for \$25,000, is now reckoned to be worth \$1,000,000. He was originally a tailor in Adelaide and made a fortune in the Kalgoorlie mines.

TRURO PRESBYTERY
FOR CHURCH UNION

Truro, N. S., Oct. 25.—A meeting of the Presbytery of Truro was held today. The chief business was a consideration of remits from the general assembly, the principal item of which was the basis of union with the Methodists and Congregationalists. Most of the day was spent on this remit, practically every member speaking on the question. When the vote was taken it stood thirteen to one in favor of the basis of union.

The Presbytery of Truro is the oldest in the Dominion, and so far as known is the first to come to a decision on this matter.

EMPEROR WILLIAM
VISITS BRUSSELS

Brussels, Oct. 26.—Elaborate police and military measures were taken today in connection with the visit of Emperor William and other members of the royal family to King Albert. The streets were lined with 10,000 troops.

Today's newspapers call attention to the fact that the Emperor never returned the visit of the late King Leopold II, which was made to Berlin in 1904 and expresses the opinion that the present call which will be followed in the spring by a visit from President Fallieres of France, marks a new era for Belgium.

The socialists met today and adopted resolutions of sympathy for the Germans oppressed by militarism.

MCGILL PROFESSOR
PASSED AWAY AT SEA

London, Oct. 26.—David Pearce Penallow, the botanist and professor of botany at McGill University, Montreal, since 1883, died today aboard the steamer Lake Manitoba, upon which he was a passenger from Montreal.

The Lake Manitoba sailed on Oct. 14 and arrived at Liverpool yesterday. Prof. Penallow was born at Kittery, Port Maine, on May 25, 1854, and married Sarah A. Dunlap, of Amherst, Mass., in 1876. He had written extensively on the science to which he devoted his life work.

KING COLE WILL AGAIN
PITCH FOR THE CUBS

Chicago, Oct. 26.—"King" Cole has signed a three year contract to pitch for the Cubs and it was announced that his salary has been doubled. President Murphy received the signed contracts of two recruits, W. R. Kinnan, pitcher of Fond Du Lac and "Ginger" Clark, a pitcher of Waterloo, Iowa.
