Mr. McCready said that he had no intention of being offensive to the secretary and withdrew his remarks.

A. A. SHUTE

Mr. A. A. Shute wanted the people educated to buy in Fredericton so that they might get a return for their money. He thought the newspapers might aid in the educational campaign. The local papers had taken advertisements of Upper Canadian mail-order houses and should do something to aid local merchants who paid for the bulk of the advertising.

Messrs Farrell and Osborne objected to the remarks concerning local newspapers. Mr. Osborne said that merchants who complained of mail-order houses had a great deal of their job-printing done outside Fredericton.

WM. LEMONT

Mr. Wm. Lemont thought that the address of his friend McCready on the question of the appointment of another secretary was the most sensible he had ever heard him make. (Laughter) A paid secretary would be valuable but the Board was hardly in a position to pay a man. He proposed that a campaign for publicity be inaugurated and that city patriotism be taught the children. Mr. Lemont moved that the matter of a paid secretary and kindred subjects be left in the hands of the council of the Board to report at the January meeting the motion was carried.

Mr. W. E. Farrell asked that the Transportation Committee look into the matter of reporting the time of arrival of the morning train from St. John. The C. P. R. Telegraph Company and the Telephone Company had agreed to transmit a report of the departure of the train from Fredericton Junction. Mr. Dibblee said the Transportation Committee would take up the matter. Pres. Hodge brought up the matter of fire insurance rates and suggested that the underwriters be asked to appear before the Board. No action was taken.

ST. JAMES METHODIST CHURCH TO CELEBRATE CENTENARY

One Hundred Years Since Montreal's
Famous Methodist Church was Estab-
lished, Rev. Joseph Sawyer was the
First Pastor.

St. James Methodist Church or as it is sometimes called semi-colloquially called, St. James Methodist Cathedral will this month celebrate its centenary.

It is one hundred years old not as a building but as a church. It is a matter of fact but a bare twenty-three years since the present magnificent building reared its twin towers to the sky on St. Catharines street, to become the pride and joy of Canadian Methodism, the largest and finest Methodist church in the British Empire and a striking tribute to the powerful hold which the Methodist creed has taken in the city.

But if it is one hundred years since first a Methodist congregation worshipped in St. James church in the city of Montreal, for it was in the year 1810 that a little meeting house on St. Sulpice street first housed a bare handful of Methodist worshippers who were the pioneers of Methodism in Montreal. The Rev. Joseph Sawyer was the man who first conceived the idea that a resident Methodist pastor might be stationed in Montreal, then a bare village with a handful of worshippers of the Methodist faith.

At the time the Rev. Joseph Sawyer was engaged in spreading the Methodist belief throughout the circuit of the Bay of Quinte. From this district into Montreal, he rode, two hundred and fifty weary, dangerous, miles through dense pine forests, where no woodman's axe had scarred the virgin bark, and where the trail was known only to a few friendly Indians who piloted the white missionary on his way.

FIRST RESIDENT MINISTER

Joseph Sawyer's famous journey was made in 1803. A year later the Rev. Samuel Mervin travelled the same road to become the first resident minister in Montreal. Six years later the first St. James Methodist church was built on St. Sulpice st., with the Rev. Mr. Mervin as the first pastor.

For eleven years the St. Sulpice street church sufficed for the needs of the small community of Methodist worshippers, but in 1820 the quarters began to get cramped and a larger church was built, this time on the corner of St. Francis Xavier and St. James streets, where later stood the St. Lawrence Hall, and where at the present time excavations of a still larger and more modern building.

MOVED FURTHER WEST.

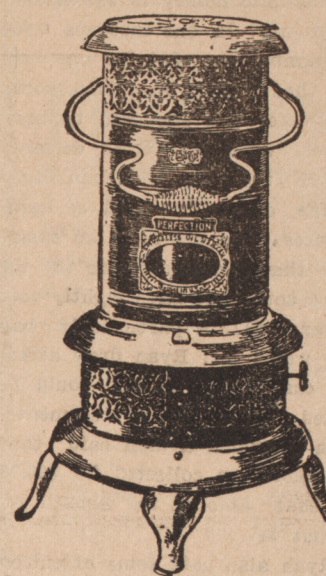
But large and important as was the second St. James Methodist Church at the time, it was not large enough for the growing needs of Methodism in the city, and after over twenty years of worship in this ancient meeting house it was decided to build yet another St. James Methodist Church. The site this time selected was further west, giving an indication that the city had already started to divide itself into its component parts and that the French-Canadian had already taken the western section of the city as their part while the English-speaking people drifted to the west.

At the present time the most imposing temple of financial and commercial enterprise in the country stands on the site of the third St. James Methodist Church, for where the Temple Building was afterward erected and where the magnificent Canadian Bank of Commerce now stands in stately pillared dignity, was the spot selected for the "Great St. James Street Church," as it was at that time called.

This was in 1844. Senator Ferrier, then the leading Methodist layman of the Dominion, but now dead many years, laid the corner stone of this church, and for over forty years it stood as a rallying centre for the great religious anniversaries of many of the Protestant churches in the city.

The development of the St. James Street district into a financial and commercial centre of the rapidly growing city, finally forced upon the church trustees, however, the realization that they must move nearer the foot of the mountain, in pursuit of their congregation, which was beginning to live up town.

So the present valuable and magnificent building on the corner of St. Catharines, City Councillor and Mayor Streets was planned, and finally, in 1887, it took definite shape, the corner stone being laid by Senator Ferrier with the identical trowel which he had used at the same ceremony for the third church forty years before.

The new church was on a scale which had never been attempted in the history of Methodism in all the world. An idea of its magnificent appearance and proportions may be gleaned from the pictures and from the measurements here given.

The length of the church from north to south is 253 feet. The transepts are 100 feet wide. The great tower is 200 feet high. The lesser tower is 140 feet in height. The height of the church, from the ground to the apex of the roof is 92 feet. The church has seating accommodation for 2,500 persons, while the school room will hold 1,000 persons.

The St. James Church also has the reputation of having the largest regular evening congregations of any Methodist church in the world.

The present St. James Church has

been instrumental in starting several other Methodist churches in the city, chief among which are the Mountain Street Church and the East End Methodist.

The wealth of this leading body of Canadian Methodism may be judged from the fact that the contributions to various church funds last year totalled \$21,500.

CELEBRATION OCTOBER 23.

The one hundredth birthday of this grand old church will be celebrated in fitting manner between the days of October 23 and November 6. A special request is made by the church secretary that members who live outside the city shall write to him giving their addresses in order that a special invitation may be sent them. This refers, of course, principally to old-time members, of whom trace has been lost.

The provisional program for the centenary celebrations is announced as follows:

Sunday, Oct. 23, 9 a. m., Union love feast; 11 a. m., and 7 p. m., the Rev. Dr. James Henderson, for Monday, Oct. 24, St. James' Past (Continued on page six.)
