## MAIL-ORDER PROBLEM DEALT WITH BY BOARD OF TRADE

Lively Discussion on Matter at Last Night's Meeting--Suggestion Re Permanent Salaried Secretary Referred to Council of Board--Important Meeting.

The Board of Trade at its regular quarterly meeting, held in the City Council Chamber last night, referred to the council of the Board the suggestion that a permanent secretary be appointed on salary, to report at the next meeting of the Board in January. The council will also consider other suggestions made by President Hodge in an address to the members, including that for the increase of the annual dues and the combatting of the mail-order business of Upper Canadian houses.

Objection was made by several members of the Board to the intimation made in the advertisement of the meeting that the Board was dying. The opinion expressed was that the Board was an exceedingly live and valuable body and was in no immediate danger of passing away.

The discussion on the injury done local retailers by the mail-order business was a most lively one and introduced topics of a local nature, which gave rise to marked difference of opinion. Everyone who spoke condemned the mail-order system and recognized the danger which arose from it. Some retailers, however, objected that many citizens of Fredericton purchased clothing in St. John instead of patronizing local dealers. One retailer charged the local press with accepting advertisements from Upper Canadian mail-order houses, and not giving the local merchants the support they deserved. The remark drew protests from others present, who stated that the local papers had supported local tradesmen, and had declined the offer of mail-order houses to buy their subscription lists.

Among those present were President Geo. W. Hodge, Secretary J. J. F. Winslow, A. A. Belmore, J. T. Jennings, C. H. Burt, W. E. Farrell, W. J. McManus, Ald. A. H. VanUart, J. W. McCready, A. L. Shipp, J. E. D. Phinney, Ald. J. J. Weddall, R. F. Randolph, Ald. H. E. Harrison, Wm. Lemont, Ald. W. S. Hooper, A. A. Skute, G. Y. Dibblee, F. B. Edgcombe, Ald. W. J. Osborne, Fred H. Everett, Thos. Sansom.

Robert B. VanDine and Arthur J. McCluskey were elected to membership on the Board.

## PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

President Hodge then read an address, in which he briefly outlined a plan for the advancement of the city through the efforts of the Board of Trade, instancing Rochester, N. Y., as a city which had become progressive through the efforts of the Board of Trade. The president suggested increase of the number of members, increase in the amount of the annual dues and the employment of a permanent secretary on salary. The matter of competition with mail-order houses was touched upon, in addition to other matters.

## J. T. JENNINGS.

Mr. J. T. Jennings, speaking to the president's address, brought up the matter of the mail-order business by Upper Canadian department houses. He thought the Board of Trade should take steps to prevent the injury to local trade which is being done by the mailed catalogue. Something should be done if the post-office was to be used to take trade from Fredericton merchants. The president had alluded to what the Board of Trade of Rochester had accomplished. In the city of Des Moines results equally as good had been produced. If Fredericton expected to advance there would have to be greater interest in the Board of Trade than there had been in the past. (Applause.)

## R. F. RANDOLPH.

Mr. Robt. F. Randolph thought the way to combat the mail-order business was by educating the public to make them see that they could get as good or better value at home than from a mail-order house.

## ALD. WEDDALL.

Ald. J. J. Weddall was of the opinion that mail-order buying was a bad. It was like the habit some Fredericton people had of buying goods in St. John. The habit of buying outside Fredericton was taking money out of the town and injuring every citizen. Frequently people paid more to mail-order houses than they would have to pay local merchants.

## J. D. PHINNEY.

Mr. J. D. Phinney said that the subject under discussion concerned mercantile men rather than himself. He had been under the impression that the meeting had been called for

the purpose of discussing the life or death of the Board. He understood that certain reflections had been cast upon the work of the Board. It was unfair. The Board had done good work and was doing it. (Hear! Hear!)

There was too great a tendency to multiply societies. There should be consolidation of effort to advance the Board of Trade. He could not see the necessity for a Canadian Club in Fredericton. The money spent on that organization might well have been used by the Board of Trade. The suggestion to have a permanent secretary for the Board was a good one. Personally he was willing to increase his annual contribution.

## J. J. F. WINSLOW.

Secretary Winslow said that Mr. Phinney may have obtained a wrong impression from the advertisement issued by himself. However, he had not thought that the Board was doing nothing, but that it was not doing enough.

## J. W. MCCREADY.

Mr. J. W. McCready said that he was a member of the Canadian Club. (Laughter.) He had paid a couple of dollars in and got a good return. He regretted that the impression that the Board was dying was given circulation. The Board was a live body and a valuable one. There was no reason that the Board should go out of existence because the Secretary felt that he must retire. Fredericton was not a large enough town to charge a five-dollar fee or to employ a paid secretary. When the Board began to pay salaries interest would flag. Fredericton was going ahead. One thing that it did want was cheap power from Grand Falls or elsewhere. Fredericton would get it eventually. (Hear! Hear!) The city, through the Board of Trade, had got a double service on the Gibson Branch and would get a Pullman Car service on the Fredericton Branch in the same way.

## A. R. SLIPP, M. P. P.

Mr. A. R. Slipp, M. P. P., thought that team-work was what was needed. He regretted that the President's remarks had been followed by the remarks that had been made. Much of the advancement of Fredericton in the past few years had been due to the efforts of certain members of the Board of Trade. He had not understood from Mr. Jennings' remarks whether or not mail-order catalogues were distributed through the schools. If that was the case it should be looked into by the Board of Trade. (Hear! Hear!) He had heard that teachers in the country had acted on behalf of mail-order houses.

## MR. JENNINGS EXPLAINS

Mr. Jennings in reply to Mr. Slipp stated he had not meant that teachers had distributed the catalogues. It was true however, that all over the country mail-order houses were paying life-insurance policies for postmasters and in return having them distribute their catalogues.

## F. B. EDGECOMBE

Mr. F. B. Edgcombe explained further. Mail-order catalogues were sent to postmasters in large packages and notices that so-and-so's catalogue had arrived were posted by the postmasters. Anyone could get one by asking for it. Teachers also acted as agents and received presents for their trouble.

## GEO. Y. DIBBLEE

Mr. G. Y. Dibblee said that Postmaster Edwards had received a handsome present from a mail-order house but had returned it. Mr. Dibblee remarked that the Board of Trade had done good work and would not go out of existence. (Applause.)

## ALD. HOOPER

Ald. W. S. Hooper thought that the mail-order trouble could be combatted in the best way by each citizen putting his foot down on the mail-order business in his own home. (Hear! Hear!) Ald. Hooper agreed with Mr. McCready in opposing the proposal to have a paid secretary.

## W. E. FARRELL

Mr. W. E. Farrell stated that he was opposed to discussion of the mail-order business because it advertised it. Upper Canadian houses evidently had good systems for handling business. However one did not have to discuss Upper Canadian houses in this respect. There were many men in Fredericton and some were present that sent to St. John

## NO TRACE YET OF ROBERT VENNING

Ottawa, Oct. 10.—Although a most rigorous search has been made through the police and state departments of England, Holland and Belgium, for Robt. Venning, superintendent of fisheries for Canada, who has been missing since Sept. 1, when he disappeared from The Hague at the conclusion of the North Atlantic fisheries case, no trace of him has yet been reported.

Officials of the fisheries and Dominion police departments here are now very apprehensive that he has been robbed and murdered. If he were still alive it is almost certain that he would have communicated with his department in Ottawa, or sent some word to his wife here long before now. At the time he was last seen at The Hague he had \$600 in cash on his person.

## LATE GOVERNOR FRASER LEFT \$42,000 ESTATE

Halifax, N. S., Oct. 10.—The value of the estate of the late Lieut. Gov. Fraser is \$42,000. The will was filed today. It reads as follows:

"I give, demise and bequeath to my wife, Bessie Fraser, all my real and personal property of every kind and whatever situated. She may use and expend the rents, profits and interest arising therefrom, and the whole or any part of the principle during her life time; give to any or all my children whatever she chooses, and, if anything remains at her decease, devise the same to my children in such manner as she considers best for them and in such proportions. I appoint my said wife sole executrix of this my last will and testament."
