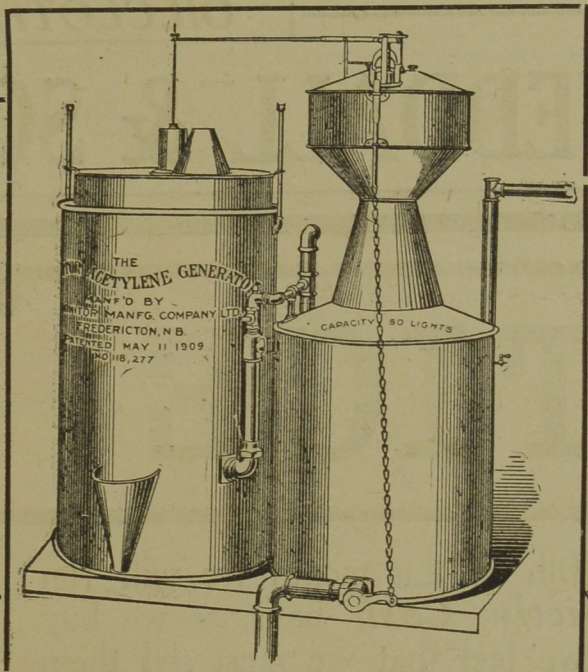

Rev. Canon Smithers was the guest of Mrs. Howard Douglas through Easter and conducted the services in the Anglican church.

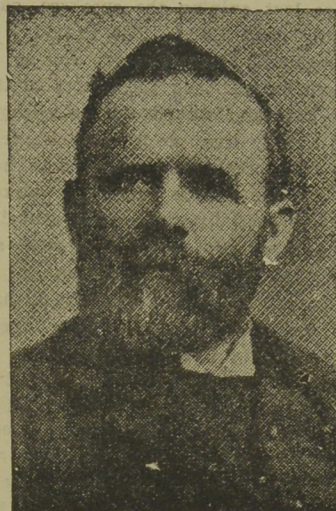
HUGH G. BROWN DEAD

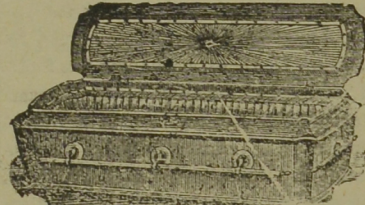

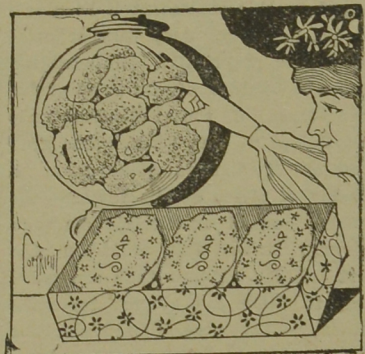
