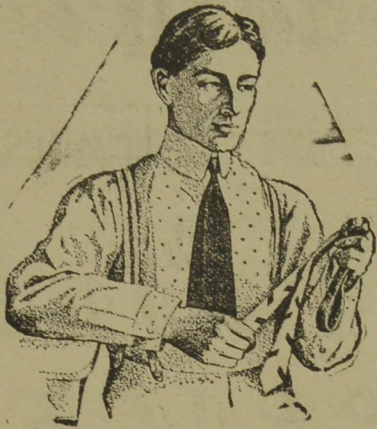


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SPANKING IN SIGHT FOR SOMEBODY

Gazette Serves Notice on the Trouble Makers in the Opposition--Serious Internal Strife in Tory Party.

(Montreal Herald.)

This morning's Gazette--rock-ribbed organ of the Opposition as it is--serves notice that somebody in the Conservative party is in for a spanking if he doesn't look out. The Gazette's warning is contained in a special from Ottawa which is printed under a display heading as follows:

TROUBLE IN RANKS.

Section of the Party Ignoring the Conservatives of Quebec.

TORONTO CLIQUE ACTIVE

Mr. Borden May Ply the Whip--Mr. Foster Says He Will Return to Parliament Shortly.

The despatch itself is as follows: Ottawa, April 4--The alleged internecine strife in the ranks of the Conservative party has reached a stage where public attention is being called thereto in no uncertain manner. The Opposition here is divided amongst itself, but no man can place his finger on the sore spot. That Mr. R. L. Borden must be sustained as leader is admitted, but Mr. Foster also, it is recognized must be upheld against those who desire his political scalp. The reports of the intended retirement of the member for North Toronto, sedulously disseminated through the Liberal press, are not true. There is still the fighting fire in Mr. Foster and the old maxim about "life in the old dog yet" was never better exemplified than in this case. Mr. Foster has given the answer to those who desire his political beheading for their own political advantage by stating that he will return to Parliament shortly.

The disposition on the part of a wing of the Conservative party--by no means the wing with which it has flown in the past--to disregard the Quebec Conservatives and pay undivided attention to its own concerns is not regarded with favor here by the liberal-minded men of the Conservative ranks. There has been too much dominance from Toronto, and if Mr. Borden is in trouble today he owes it to his attention to the vague schemes of the same clique. The attempt to ignore the 125,000 Conservative voters of Quebec will not carry. Quebec did valiantly for the Conservative platform at the last elections and any attempt to throttle free speech and free thinking will divide the Conservative ranks absolutely.

It must not be forgotten that Mr. Borden has the whip hand in this trouble and if he wishes to use the rod the Conservative child will not be spoiled. Any attempt to read Mr. Foster out of the party, however will meet with the retribution it deserves and the hysterical cries that Mr. Monk is demanding the head of Mr. Borden on a platter are equally ill-founded.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY IS TO BE USED BY POOL ROOMS

New York, April 7--With the opening of the racing season in the Metropolitan district only a week away, interest was excited in racing circles today by reports that pool room operators were preparing to circumvent the official ban upon them by arranging to flash race results by wireless from the tracks.

Wireless stations, it was said were to be established just outside the grounds from which the news could be flashed to distributing centres wherever it might be thought expedient to locate them. Heretofore it has been comparatively easy for detectives to break up sending stations by confiscating the ordinary telegraph and telephone instruments of the pool room men, but it is feared that if the wireless system were adopted it might be a difficult thing to prove that news was sent to law breakers to assist them in violating the laws.

An active campaign to prevent, if possible, the carrying out of the pool room men's wireless plan is expected.

LORD KITCHENER ARRIVES AT SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, April 7--Lord Kitchener, commander of the British forces in the Mediterranean and also in the far East, arrived last night in the steamer Maraposa. He has been making a tour of inspection in Australia on his way to England. In a communication to the British consul general, Lord Kitchener expressed the wish to be received here a private citizen and that no public reception be accorded him.

The custom officials will pass his baggage tomorrow without examination upon orders from Washington that every courtesy be extended to the distinguished British general.

PERU ISOLATED WITH MANY FOES

Ecuador, Bolivia, Columbia and Chile Against Her--Situation Desperate--Peru's Forces.

Washington, April 6--The situation of Peru is desperate. The American State Department looks on the entanglements which Peru has with fear for the outcome.

Advices in the State Department are that Ecuador is not alone in her enmity towards Peru, but that Chili, Colombia and Bolivia are sharing it.

The disputes which have caused the trouble are over boundary lines, and the dismemberment of Peru is possible if a united attempt is made against her.

The State Department has heard from Consul Dietrich, at Guayaquil, Ecuador, and instructed him to give an asylum to Peruvian refugees in the chief seaport of Ecuador. Mr. Dietrich informed the department of the mob outrages on the Peruvian Consulate at Guayaquil last night. The Peruvian Consul has taken up his abode inside the American Consulate.

The rioting at Lima, where the Peruvian students retaliated on the Ecuadorian Consulate, has also been communicated to Washington.

The United States will keep out of the mess and only intervene to protect American life and property if it is endangered in the rioting which may follow the demonstration of the students of the two capitals last night.

If the trouble between the countries continues the Pan-American Peace Conference to be held at Buenos Ayres, in August, may be abandoned. The United States has already selected her delegation to the Congress, with former Ambassador Henry White as its head. The other members of the delegation are John Barrett, director of the Bureau of American Republics, and Lewis Nixon, of New York. The spectacle of the delegates of belligerent countries talking peace while their respective armies are at war would be ludicrous and if war comes it means the abandonment of the peace congress.

Peru's army consists of four thousand men, equipped with Mauser rifles, twenty-four machine guns and twenty-four light field pieces. Her navy consists of five ships, the newest being two cruisers four years old, and small compared four years old and small.

Ecuador's standing army is about the size of Peru's, but Ecuador has a reserve of 90,000 militiamen who can be called out. She has practically no navy, a torpedo launch and a transport being her only sea strength.

WALL STREET BROKER INHERITS BARONETCY

New York, April 7--The Herald today says:--Arthur Boswell Elliott, for years James R. Keene's confidential manager in Wall street and now a member of the stock exchange firm, received word today that he had come into the title of Baronet through the death of his uncle, Sir William Elliott, of Stobs Castle, Roxburghshire, England. Sir Arthur had been prominent in Wall street for the last 15 years. He came to this country from England 20 years ago and became associated with the brokerage firm of which Talbot J. Taylor, Mr. Keene's son-in-law, was the head.

Sir William Elliott was the eighth Baron of Stobs. He was related to Lord Minto. The title dates back to 1661 and the present Sir Arthur Elliott is a direct descendant of Robert Bruce. The family is one of the oldest in England.

WALL STREET LANGUID.

New York, April 7--The very light opening dealings in stocks were insignificant of the languid speculative interest. The price changes also were narrow and mixed. Amalgamated Copper and Western Union showed declines of a point and Chesapeake and Ohio, General Electric rose 1/4 and Northwestern 1/8.

COTTON MARKET

New York, April 7--Cotton futures opened steady; March 14.55; June, 14.37; July 14.34; Aug. 13.89; Sept. 13.08; Oct. 12.57; Dec. 12.40; Jan. offered 12.39.

LONDON'S TRADE

London, April 7--The March statement of the board of trade shows increases of \$30,534,500 in imports and \$12,434,000 in exports. The principal increase in imports was in foodstuffs and raw material and in exports in manufactured goods.

London, April 7--The weekly statement of the bank of England shows the following changes:

Total reserve decreased £525,000; Circulation increased £192,000; bullion decreased £342,100; other securities increased £971,000 other deposits decreased £3,754,000; public deposits increased £1,793,000.

Notes reserved decreased £451,000; government securities increased £4,498,000.

The proportion of the bank's reserve to liability this week is 39.55 per cent; last week it was 44.81 per cent.

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
