The Abbe Won Tenth Successive Race Yesterday--General H. Winner in 2.10.

Columbus, Ohio, Sept. 19.—Buffalo owned pacers gathered in the two stakes which made up the major portion of the programme of the opening day of the last grand circuit meeting of the year. Both were odds-on favorites. Ess H. Kay took the Board of Trade event away from Merry Widow but lost the third heat to her, breaking after the turn home had been made.

THE ABBE WINS

The Abbe won his tenth successive race when he won the Hotel Hartman \$5,000 stake from Evelyn W., the Cleveland mare, which beat him in one heat this year. At times the Geers entry was hard pressed by his rival, being lapped the greater part of the last hundred yards in the second mile. The final quarter of the third mile was timed officially in .28 and the last half in 1.01. Gen. H. easily won the 2.10 trot, Ora Bellini and Direct Tone being unable to reach him when they tried the stretch.

ABE ATTELL HAD EASY TIME WITH CHARLIE WHITE

Milwaukee, Wis., Sept. 19.—It is conceded today that Charlie White, the Chicago featherweight, is not fast enough to win over Abe Attell. In a ten-round bout here Friday night, White was badly outpointed.

White's only good blow, a straight right to the head, did not bother the champion, and although White repeatedly got to Attell, his blows lacked steam. White had the best of the champion in the fourth and sixth rounds, as far as clean blows went, but he could not keep up the pace against the shift fighter. White was groggy at the finish.

BILLY ST. CLAIR WAS GIVEN THE DECISION OVER COLEY BURKE

Crowd Disappointed When Ten-Round Bout Ended in Fourth Round--St. Clair Had Better.

Billy St. Clair got the decision on a foul over Coley Burke at Marysville last night in the fourth round of what was to be a ten-round boxing bout. The thin crowd which went to the Orange Hall to see the match felt pretty sore at the outcome as it hardly got its money's worth. Fred Yeomans of Marysville was the referee. His intentions were good, but his execution very imperfect. The two men hugged one another and shoved one another against the walls of the small stage to their hearts' content. Burke put St. Clair to the floor once and went down himself several times. He claimed that St. Clair's body blows were too low but the referee allowed them.

The bout was pulled off in the Orange Hall the stage of which was too small for such a performance. Chas. McCoy acted as second for Burke and Bob Wright as second for St. Clair. Bert Ling of Fredericton was timer and Fred Yeomans of Marysville referee. St. Clair, kicked about Burke's hands being bandaged but finally fixed his own hands and donned the gloves.

Burke forced the fighting all the way through. In the first round he led with his right sending it to St. Clair's face. The two clinched. After the break St. Clair rushed but was met in the face with a stiff right, which put him to the floor. St. Clair got on his feet and the two clinched repeatedly doing little damage to one another. Burke continued his aggressive tactics until the gong sounded. It was Burke's round.

In the second Burke again went for St. Clair. The latter rocked Burke's head with a right and repeated the blow. He then drove his right beneath Burke's ribs and the other went down. A foul was claimed by Burke's friends but was not allowed. St. Clair's round.

The third round began with clinch after clinch. Burke pushed his opponent against the wall and drove his left to his face. They broke and St. Clair again drove his right below the ribs and Burke went down. He got on his feet but was put down by the same blow. Burke's friends again yelled for a foul.
