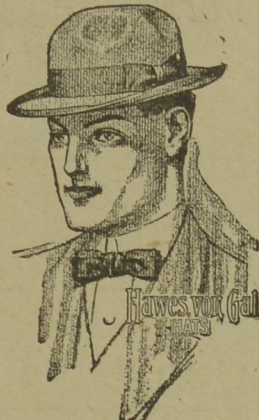

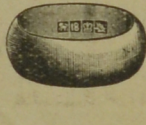
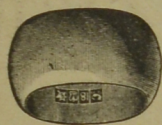

## THE NAVAL BILL PASSES FIELDING'S SPLENDID SPEECH

Sir Wilfrid Insists Upon a Canadian Navy Controlled by the Canadian Parliament--Vessels to be Built in Canada.

Hon. Mr. Fielding delivered a memorable speech on the third reading of the Naval bill. A speech thrilling with patriotism, Canadianism and Imperialism. He contrasted the former utterances of Mr. Borden and other Conservative leaders on 29th March 1908, with their attitude today. He exposed the complete change of front of these gentlemen for no other than party reasons. He cleverly demonstrated that the government were following the exact views expressed by the British Admiralty, and he contrasted the queer attitude of Mr. Borden in advocating sending \$20,000,000 of cash out of the country at once, and asking that an expenditure of half the amount be referred to the people.

### TOUCHED RESPONSIVE CHORD.

Mr. Fielding touched a responsive chord when he asked: Suppose Canada had sent money instead of men to South Africa, there would have been no Paradeburg. He touched also upon the effect the British preference had upon welding Canada to the Motherland by tighter commercial bonds, and contrasted the attitude of the Conservative party during its long term of power, which had done nothing for Imperial unity of any kind whatever.

### BESTED THEM IN REPORTEE

In repartee Mr. Fielding was at his best. When some Conservative with more courage than discretion undertook to put an irrelevant question, he experienced the penalty of foolishness. Mr. Cowan of Vancouver

undertook to interrupt the minister, and was answered in these words: "I have fought that question out not with better, but with stronger men than my hon. friend." Whereupon Mr. Cowan subsided into that obscurity from which he had temporarily emerged.

### ALL CANADIAN ENTERPRISE

The Finance Minister declared that the government intended to construct a Canadian navy that would be the pride of Canadians. He hoped and believed that the navy would be constructed in Canada even if the cost were greater than if constructed in English yards. The navy would be a Canadian navy in time of peace, and be at the disposal of the Imperial authorities in case of war involving the supremacy of the British Empire.

Mr. Fielding's speech aroused the house to a high degree of enthusiasm. He raised the debate to a higher plane than it had occupied for some time. His speech might be described as Canadian, Imperialistic and fervently patriotic. It provoked acclamations from the Liberal side of the House, and made a deep impression on the Conservatives, a fact which was quite obvious.

### NAVY BILL HAS PASSED.

The question of a Canadian navy was settled after Mr. Fielding had spoken. There was no desire to add anything further to the debate. Leading members of the Conservative party decided that nothing more was to be said, and the vote was taken, resulting in a large majority for the government.—The naval bill had passed.

## "THIRD DEGREE" TO BE ENQUIRED INTO

American Senators Will Order Searching Enquiry into Present Police Methods.

Washington, April 26.—The "third degree" ordeal practiced by officers of the law in extorting confessions or statements from persons charged with crime and the maintenance of an espionage over jurors, or any other practices tending to prevent or impair the fair and impartial administration of the criminal law, will be made the subject of a searching investigation by the judiciary committee of the senate.

A resolution providing for the appointment of five senators to conduct such an inquiry was reported to the senate today by Senator Sutherland. It was based upon a resolution introduced by Senator Heyburn as the result of reports of the "third degree" ordeal practiced by the police of Atlantic City upon William Seyler, who is charged with the murder of Jane Adams, whose body was found in the water near a pier which had been visited by the pair.

The decision to include in the inquiry the practice of employing persons in the espionage of jurors was prompted by disclosures made during the investigation by the committee of charges against Robert T. Devlin, U. S. attorney for the northern district of California, whose confirmation for another term is now being held up in the senate.

Members of the committee were practically unanimous in their condemnation of reported practices which tend to prevent the impartial administration of the criminal laws.

It is not doubted, therefore, that the resolution will be adopted by the senate. Under the terms of the resolution the committee could sit during the recess of congress.

## QUEBEC'S PULPWOOD POLICY TAKES EFFECT MAY 1st

Quebec, April 26.—After a Cabinet meeting held today Sir Lomer Gouin announced that the order-in-council fixing the provincial government's timber policy had been passed and signed by the Lieutenant Governor.

According to the new regulations it is declared that all timber cut on Crown lands after the 1st of May, 1910 must be manufactured in Canada, that is to say, converted into pulp or paper, into deals or boards or into any other article of commerce or merchandise as distinguished from such timber in its raw or unmanufactured state.

The ground rent which is to be increased from \$3 to \$5 per square mile annually will not be charged until the 1st of September, 1910.

## RESTIGOUCHE M. P. P. LEAVES FOR WEST

Wm. Currie, Member for Restigouche in Provincial Legislature to Reside in Vancouver in Future.

Campbellton, April 26.—Wm. Currie M. P. P., and family, left this morning for Vancouver, where they will reside in future. Mr. Currie was presented with an address and a gold headed cane beautifully engraved by the trustees and other bodies of the Presbyterian church last evening.—St. John Standard.

## PREMIER OF NOVA SCOTIA UNDERGOES OPERATION

Halifax, N. S., April 26.—Halifax was startled today to hear of the serious condition of Premier Murray. On Sunday night he complained of weariness and pain in his left leg. The pain grew worse and today he was taken to the Victoria General Hospital and an operation was performed this afternoon at 4 o'clock by Doctors Stuart and Chisholm.

The trouble was caused by the blood congealing and blocking the main artery just below the left knee. The limb had become very much swollen and caused the Premier much pain.

The operation was a slight incision to relieve the swelling. So serious is the condition of the leg that the surgeons entertained grave apprehension of saving it. They will know definitely tomorrow.

The Premier has been ill for the last two weeks brought on by overwork and worry, and a few days ago he suffered a slight attack of la grippe which may have aided indirectly to bring on the present trouble. While his life is in no danger, his friends are anxiously awaiting the decision of the surgeon.

### WILL WEIGH IN AT 126

San Francisco, April 27.—It was agreed last night by Charley Harvey representing Jim Driscoll and Ben Selig, acting for Abe Attell, that the two little fighters who are to battle for the featherweight championship at Coffroth's arena in Colma, shall weigh 126 pounds, four hours before the fight. This is the recognized feather weight limit in England.

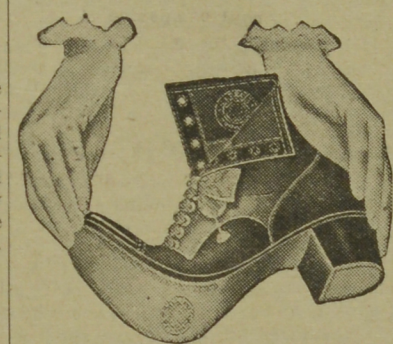

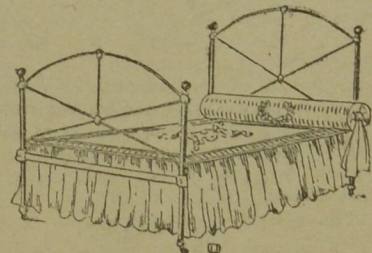
