## CITY COUNCIL

(Continued from page one)  
REPORTS RECEIVED.

The reports of standing and special committees were taken up.

On behalf of the Market Committee, Ald. Osborne reported the sale of market fees to James I. Atherton for \$101. On his motion, Mr. Atherton was appointed market clerk and public weigher for the ensuing year.

On behalf of the Water and Sewerage Committee, Ald. Vanwart reported that the usual supplies had been purchased. The contracts had been awarded to the following gentlemen at the prices named:

P. Farrell, coal, \$5.56 per ton.  
R. Chestnut & Sons, galvanized pipe, \$4.63 per 100 feet.

Robt. Reford Co., asphalt, \$25 per ton.

J. S. Neill & Sons, Ltd., coal tar, \$3.75 per bbl.

On behalf of the Wharves Committee, Ald. Harrison reported the sale of wharfage fees to Mr. Harry C. Mackay for \$401. On his motion, Mr. Mackay was appointed Harbor-master for the ensuing year.

MAY HAVE ANOTHER POLICE-MAN.

On behalf of the Police Commission, Ald. Clark moved that the commission be empowered to employ another or special policeman if it should deem such an officer necessary, the salary to be what the commission might deem proper.

Ald. Calder asked what catastrophe was expected to make such an appointment necessary.

Ald. Clark explained that last year there had been an extra policeman for a time. The commission would not appoint one unless he would be necessary. He would have no special duty apart from general enforcement of the law.

Ald. Walker stated that from 11 p. m. until 6 a. m. only one policeman was on duty. That one man did not give sufficient protection. It was not a proper state of affairs.

Ald. Vanwart seconded the motion.

Ald. Calder thought four policemen properly handled should protect the city. He was opposed to the council sanctioning the action of the Police Commission in the matter of appointing more policemen. Seconded by Ald. Jewett he moved in amendment that action in the matter be deferred.

Ald. Clark stated that the Police Act gave the commission power to add to the force, but it was thought best to ask the consent of the council. Another man was needed in order that a re-arrangement of the policemen's hours of duty be made.

The amendment was lost, only Ald. Jewett and Ald. Caldervoting for it. The motion was carried 6 to 2.

## SOLDIER KILLED AT HALIFAX BARRACKS

Private Ages Fell From Window of Barracks Last Night--Was to Have Taken his Discharge Saturday.

Halifax, April 28.—Private Ages, of C. Company, of the Royal Canadian Regiment, fell from a window at Wellington Barracks last night and died almost immediately, as the result of the injuries that he had received. Ages, who was about 27 years of age, belonged to London, England. The military authorities last night declined to make any statement regarding the accident.

It is thought at the barracks that Private Age's death was due to somnambulism, to which he appears to have been a victim. Two corporals entering the barrack gate from Gortingen street, about 11.30 last night, noticed a man standing on the inside ledge of one of the windows of the sleeping quarters in the upper part of the building inside the gate. They shouted and just then the man, who was in his night clothes, fell to the ground. The two corporals ran to his assistance and found it to be Private Ages. He was unconscious and death ensued quickly.

## SNEAK THIEF ROBS BANK OF \$1,200

Syracuse, April 29.—A clever sneak thief robbed the First National Bank of this city today of \$1,200. While the president of the bank, Chas. W. Snow, was in another department, a man without hat or coat, appearing to be a clerk from some neighboring office, entered the president's room and grabbed packages of \$5 bills, aggregating \$1,200.

Meeting the president at his door, the thief asked what rate of interest the bank paid on deposits, and upon receiving answer, left the bank. The police believe the thief had a confederate.

## STREET CAR MEN GO OUT ON STRIKE

Columbus, Ohio, April 29.—Motormen and conductors of the Columbus street car company who have joined the recently formed union went on a strike at 4 o'clock this morning because they claim the company refused to reinstate a few men who were discharged during the threatened strike two weeks ago, when the men were given an increase in wages. Cars are running on several of the lines, but the service is badly crippled. Wires have been cut in several sections of the city, but no violence to persons has been reported.

## FOUND DROWNED

Princeton, N. J., April 29.—Badly decomposed by the action of the water since last Sunday morning, the body of Linden C. Lozilliva, the missing student of the Princeton Theological Seminary, was found today floating in the Raritan canal near here. It is believed that Lozilliva committed suicide and that he was mentally deranged from over study. His home is in Columbia, Ceylon.

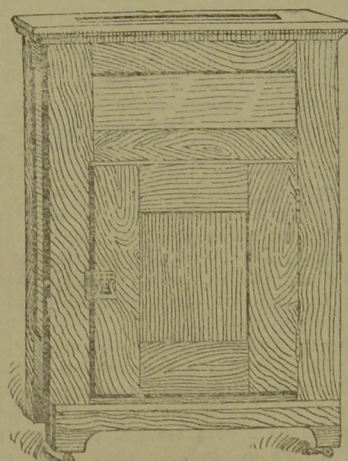
