

HILLSBORO MAN
DIES FROM INJURIES

Hopewell Hill, Dec. 19.—John Woodworth of Albert Mines, who was hurt in the plaster quarry at Hillsboro Tuesday died at his home last night having succumbed to injuries received. He had been unconscious or delirious pretty much all of the time since he was injured.

The unfortunate man was about fifty years of age and leaves his wife, who was a daughter of the late Robert Cochrane of Curryville: two brothers and a sister.

Mr. Woodworth when he was hurt was working in the same quarry in which the three men were killed on Friday last. One of the men Fred Nelson who was afterward killed, had helped carry Mr. Woodworth from the quarry at the time he was injured.

Winnipeg papers of Thursday last contain additional particulars of the marriage of Miss Jennie McLaughlin of St. John to Mr. C. P. L. Fowler of Grand Falls, Montana. The ceremony took place in the drawing room of Mr. H. S. McLaughlin's house where the decorations were prettily carried out with yellow chrysanthemums, palms ferns and smilax. American beauties bloomed in the library and bridal roses and valley lilies were used in the dining room. An orchestra stationed in the library played the wedding marches. The Telegram says the bride who was given away by her brother Mr. Walter S. McLaughlin of Minneapolis, was becomingly gowned in a tailored costume of navy blue one-piece cloth, the coat opening on a blouse of white crepe embroidered in gold and veiled with dark blue chiffon, her toque of combined sealskin and tapestry, in gold and blue tones had a mount of natural ostrich feathers at one side secured with a gold abochon, her toilette was completed by a long broad scarf and huge pillow muf of sealskin, and to the latter was secured a shower of ribbons of the valley, she wore the grooms gift an emerald and diamond ring. She was attended by a matron of honor, her cousin Mrs. C. E. MacPherson who wore a lovely gown of lavender satin soule, veiled with pale yellow nixon heavily embroidered in a floral design of floss. Her picture hat of black velvet was ornamented with a cluster of lacer plumes in yellow tones she carried a shower of mauve chrysanthemums, and wore the grooms gift a pendant of pearls and peridots. Mr. J. Abbott Read, best man, received gold cuff links. After the ceremony an informal reception followed which was attended only by the relatives of the bride and groom, the bride's table was prettily decorated with bridal roses, lilies of the valley and maiden hair fern, the large centre lamp suspended just above the table's centre being twined with ropes of smilax. STUDENTS MAN CARS IN WINNIPEG

Winnipeg, Dec. 18.—With between 50 and 60 cars running today from 9 a. m. until 8 p. m., and a like like number running all Saturday afternoon until 7, the Street Railway Company appears so far to be having the best of the struggle. Probably for sentimental reasons the company is using college boys almost altogether, although inundated with applications from men who want permanent work but who are willing to start as strike-breakers. The college boys are having the biggest time of their lives, as they are allowed to collect all the fares they can for themselves, in addition to being paid 40 cents an hour. One industrious medical student collected \$24 in silver and tickets enough to last him for two years on Saturday alone. That was his own share, after dividing the swag with his motorman chum.

The public were rather slow to take to the cars on Saturday morning, but all day they were crowded, and most of the passengers are paying the boys, although some cannot resist the temptation to ride free. The company takes no responsibility, merely allowing the boys to collect if they wish to, but issuing no instructions, and not allowing the use of any fare boxes. Demonstrations against the cars are few and far between, and have not amounted to much so far.

On Saturday windows were broken in two cars, and a strier pulled the stop cock from an air box, putting the brakes out of business, but these were the only incidents reported.

Two arrests were made by the police. John Ewing, a striking conductor who tried to break windows with a switch iron, was fined \$10 and costs by Magistrate Daly on Saturday, the Magistrate adding a general warning to the strikers that they would be severely dealt with if they failed to observe the law.

It is reported tonight that a number of expert strike-breakers arrived from Toronto during the day, and may be used tomorrow, when the company promises to have 80 cars running all day. Manager Phillips denies absolutely the reports that he is importing men from Chicago. A number of Thiel specials were sworn in on Saturday, but have not been used on the cars yet.

In an official statement issued on Saturday, the company gives the strikers until Tuesday to return to work, when all will be taken back on the old terms. In the meantime, they refuse to hire any men permanently, but declare that after Tuesday they will not hold any man's job.

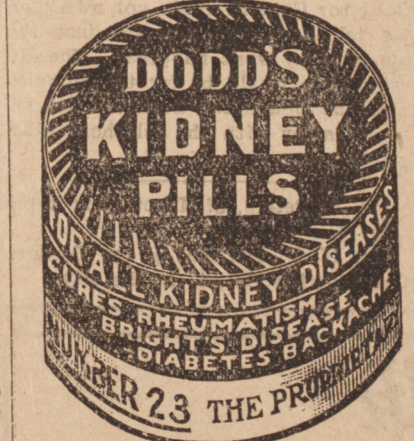

Philadelphia, Pa., Dec. 20.—Following its decision that the Temple Iron Company controlled by the Reading and other anthracite railroads, is an illegal combination in restraint of trade of the United States Circuit here today issued a decree permanently enjoining the corporation from doing business.

W. F. McLEAN, M. P. APPROVES OF NAVY

Toronto, Dec. 20.—Mr. W. F. Maclean, M. P., for South York, told the South York Conservative Association on Saturday afternoon that he partially approved of the Laurier Government's naval policy. "I cannot see eye to eye with the rest of the Conservatives in that regard," said Mr. Maclean. "I believe the peace movement is growing but until the nations come more and more to arbitration there must be some scheme of naval defence."

"I have no sympathy with the Nationalist movement in Quebec. We must assume full responsibility in Canada for our share of defence of the Empire. I am not in full sympathy with the naval defence as organized by the Government, but it is a beginning; I prefer to take a stand in favor of something being done and trust to time to put it in better lines."

"As to the suggested settlement of the question of naval defence by the people, I claim that matters of defence of our country are not to be settled by a vote but by the Government and Parliament. They must assume the responsibility."

Mr. Maclean's advocacy of naval defence was not concurred in by Capt. Tom Wallace, M. P., for Centre York another of the speakers.

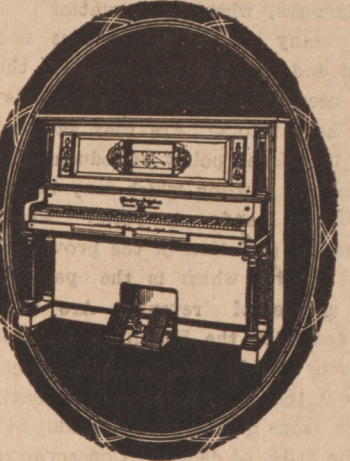
