Morse--Tupper Wedding a Brilliant Society Event

Ottawa, Dec. 19.—Attended by exceptional interest and charm and in the presence of a large and fashionable assemblage of guests, comprising the elite of the Capital's society, that much anticipated event, the marriage of Miss Margaret (Madge) Peters Morse, only daughter of Dr. Charles Morse, K. C., and Mrs. Morse and granddaughter of the late Charles Morse, K. C., Judge of the Probate for Queen's County, Nova Scotia, to Mr. Charles Stewart Tupper, of the law firm of Tupper, Galt and Tupper, Winnipeg, was celebrated here, amid picturesque settings, at Grace Church at two o'clock on Saturday.

The groom, who is a son of Mr. J. Stewart Tupper, of Ravenscourt, Winnipeg, is the eldest grandson of Sir Charles Tupper, Baronet, and grandson on the maternal side of Chief Justice Sir Thomas Galt of Winnipeg.

EVENT OF WIDESPREAD INTEREST

Seldom has such an event aroused such widespread interest, partly because of the beauty and charm of the bride, and the rising fame of the groom, and also on account of the family connections on both sides. The bride is descended on the paternal side from Samuel Morse, who came to Salem, Mass., in 1633, from Marlborough, England, and whose family eventually settled in Nova Scotia. On her mother's side she is of old United Loyalist stock.

Both bride and groom possess an ancestor in common, Lady Tupper, who was Miss Francis Morse before her marriage, being also a descendant of Samuel Morse. The Tupper family originally came to America from Hesse Cassel and later made their home in Nova Scotia. Both young people are great social favorites in their respective cities.

CHRISTMAS DECORATIONS IN CHURCH

The Archbishop of Ottawa, assisted by the Rev. J. F. Gorman, performed the ceremony. The interior of the church was very effectively and beautifully decorated in a color scheme of scarlet, white and green, in keeping with the Christmas season; on the altar were great vases of white lilies, while the chancel rail was completely hidden by a wealth of palms and ferns and red poinsettia.

The chancel steps were crowned by a beautiful arch of palms studded with red poinsettias and white azaleas. Bunches of red holly tied with white ribbons, were fastened to the pews assigned to the guests.

Mr. Cyril Rickwood presided at the organ, playing appropriate music, while the guests were arriving. Mr. Jack Clarke sang "A Song of Praise" while the register was being signed.

The service was fully choral. The choir meeting the bridal party at the door, preceded the procession singing, "The Voice that breathed o'er Eden." Then came the ushers, followed by the bridesmaids in single file, the maid of honor, and lastly, the fair young bride, escorted by her father.

The groom awaited the bride at the chancel steps, accompanied by the best man, Mr. Claude Aldous. The ushers were Mr. Talbot Papineau of Montreal, Mr. Carl Morse, of Calgary Mr. Hugh Fraser, Mr. Pat Edwards, Mr. Monty Bate. The bride's attendants were Miss Hope Wutele, Miss Jessie Cassils, Miss Anna Olwin, Miss Francis Tupper of Winnipeg, sister of the groom, and Miss Janet Tupper of Vancouver, her cousin. Miss May Wyld was maid of honor.

BRIDE WAS CHARMING PICTURE

The bride made a lovely picture in her exquisite robe des noces of soft ivory satin, veiled in a tunic of French handwoven net, composed of bisque braids draped in Greek effect, the folds of the drapery caught here and there with clusters of orange blossoms, and the collarless yoke being outlined with beaded embroidery and the short sleeves finished in the same manner.

She wore a beautiful old Holiton lace veil, an heirloom in the groom's family, which had been worn by Lady Tupper on her wedding-day sixty-four years ago. The veil was prettily arranged over a snood of orange blossoms, finished at each side of her coiffure with a cluster of the same flowers.

The groom's gift, a beautiful diamond pendant centred with a large peridot set in platinum, was suspended around her neck, and she carried an immense shower bouquet of orchids and lilies of the valley, with a tress of bebe ribbon caught with lilies of the valley.

The maid of honor and bridesmaids were gowned alike in lovely costumes of opalescent shades of pink satin, veiled in pink and blue nimon gracefully draped; the soft folds of the bodices were held in place by garlands of roses in shades to match the gowns and the low, collarless necks were outlined with silver and black jet. They wore large black velvet picture hats, the brims outlined with deep gold insertion with large flat bows of pink satin trimming the crowns at the back and roses beneath the brim, and carried lovely shower bouquets of pink rosebuds and lilies of the valley tied with long pink satin streamers and pink gloves, shoes and stockings to match. They wore the bridegroom's gifts, dainty platinum brooches set with pearls and diamonds, centred with different gems. For the best man and ushers the groom presented waistcoat buttons of pearl and platinum.

SOME OF THE JEWELS WORN
Mrs. Morse, mother of the bride, wore a handsome gown of amethyst colored striped nimon over satin with touches of cerise and a hat to match trimmed with plumes and cerise velvet and a cerise scarf, black lynx furs. She carried a bouquet of mauve orchids.

Mrs. Tupper, mother of the groom, was beautifully dressed in taupe chiffon velvet with touches of blue and silver net. A taupe velvet hat with blue and taupe plumes and her bouquet was composed of violets and lilies of the valley. Miss Tupper was becomingly gowned in old rose chiffon velvet trimmed with mink fur and large black velvet hat, and a bouquet of pink roses and lilies of the valley.

Mrs. Frank Peters, of Winnipeg, aunt of the bride, was dressed in champagne voile trimmed with lace of the same shade caught with roses made of the same material, black velvet and pearl and peridot necklace.

Mrs. Matthewson, of Montreal, was richly gowned in black satin and jet, with a black velvet picture hat trimmed with willow plumes and black sable furs.

Mrs. Hugh Matthewson, wore a smart costume of brown crepe de chine trimmed with lace and a brown hat with willow plumes.

Miss Dorothy Langford was in lemon colored marquisette trimmed with bands of lemon satin, black velvet hat with roses.

Mrs. Langford, of Winnipeg, heliotrope satin with hat of the same shade, trimmed with willow feathers and a rich Japanese wrap embroidered in oriental colors.

The Misses Creelman, of Montreal, were in blue and black velvet with hats to match.

THE RECEPTION A BRILLIANT AFFAIR

At the conclusion of the ceremony the guests adjourned to the residence of Dr. Morse, 44 McLeod street, where a reception was held. The bride and bridegroom stood at one end of the room, surrounded on either side by her pretty attendants. The room was decorated with long stemmed yellow chrysanthemums and in the aining room, where refreshments were served, the table was daintily arranged with white hyacinths and maiden hair fern.

The bride's health was proposed by the Rev. J. F. Gorman, in a short speech, sparkling with wit and humor. The groom responded, concluding by proposing the health of the groom's parents. Mr. Stewart Tupper of Winnipeg, made a neat response and in turn toasted the bridesmaids, for whom the best man answered.

Senator Kirchopfer, of Brandon, then proposed the health of the father and mother of the bride, and Dr. Morse responded in a happy vein.

Mr. and Mrs. Tupper left later amid a shower of confetti and good wishes for New York. They intend returning to Ottawa for Christmas before going west to their home in Winnipeg.

The bride looked charming in her travelling gown of pastel pink homespun trimmed with an applique of pink broadcloth and touches of gold. Her hat was a toque of black velvet with a bandeau of gold finished with gold tassels and she wore a handsome sealskin coat and ermine furs.
