**ENGLAND DOESN'T
NEED ANY HELP**

Country Far From Decadent, Says Lord
Kitchener—Australian Defence—
Explains why he Passed Canada by.

London, April 29.—Lord Kitchener, interviewed in reference to the defence of Australia, said that for £1,700,000 a year Australia will in due course have a complete system that will make her secure against attack. She will no longer need to look to the mother country for instant aid in the event of danger. The amount of money is but trivial to such a rich country.

Lord Kitchener added that England is not decadent, whatever anyone may say or think. Her sons are as good as ever and as full of heart. She is quite able under God to determine her own destinies. She needs help from none of her children or strangers and can quite take care of herself. "She is yet full of youth and of days, I assure you, and in no sense decadent," he said.

Asked regarding his inability to visit Canada, Lord Kitchener expressed regret that he had not had time to do so, as he was merely rapidly passing through the United States from San Francisco to New York. "I made the journey as quickly as possible and did not even have time to go to Washington. I feel it would have been a poor compliment to Canada to have passed through it in such a hurried way."

**BRIDE BY DANCING EARNS
\$600 ON WEDDING NIGHT**

Madison, Ill., April 29.—Mrs. Joseph Barry, a bride, made \$600 by dancing last night.

Miss Antonia Ropezak, twenty-three years old, was married to Joseph Barry, twenty-six, yesterday morning in Venice, Ill. They returned to East Madison, and at night the festivities began.

According to a Polish custom, every man present is expected to dance around the room with the bride and to hurl a silver dollar at a china plate. If he breaks the plate he may dance again. In any event, the bride keeps the money. When the proceeds were counted at daylight the bride had six hundred silver dollars. As some plates were broken, she must have danced more than 600 times.

**HUGHES NOW CRITICISED
FOR RETIRING TO BENCH**

His Reform Followers, Left Leaderless,
Keep Alive Rumor he Will Reconsider his Decision to Accept.

Albany, April 29.—Although there is no tangible information to justify it, says the New York World, a report that is persistently repeated in legislative and official circles has it that Gov. Hughes may be prevailed on by friends to recall his acceptance of the nomination to the United States Supreme Court tendered him by President Taft.

The intimates of the Governor, while admitting the possibility of such reconsideration, are confident the Governor will take his seat on the Supreme Court Bench in October. That all of the letters and telegrams received by him have not commended him for his self-effacement from the political map of New York is pretty generally known. Even those that indorse his decision sound a note of regret that the Governor should abandon his work of reform at its most critical period.

Some of the Governor's official family, including department heads, have openly expressed their disapproval of his course. Among legislators who have been following his leadership and fighting for his policies the same genuine disappointment is expressed.

NO LEADER IN SIGHT.

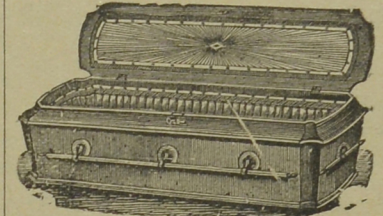
On whose shoulders the mantle of leadership will fall cannot be determined at this time, nor is it at all certain that any of the half dozen men who might be induced to continue the Hughes policies is adequately equipped for the undertaking. A Senator who has consistently followed the Governor throughout his administration said tonight:

"The reform wagon is in a very deplorable condition. It is standing in the middle of the road of corruption, fully freighted, and the horses eager to haul it to its destination. But the reins fall listlessly over the horses' backs and no driver occupies the seat to guide them on their way. Drivers like Hughes are scarce and there is seemingly no substitute worthy of the task that the Governor has laid down."

General Booth celebrated his 81st birthday on the 10th inst., and received many congratulatory messages, including one from the Queen.
