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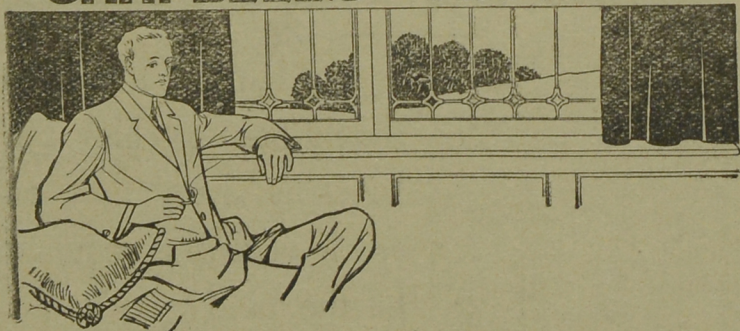
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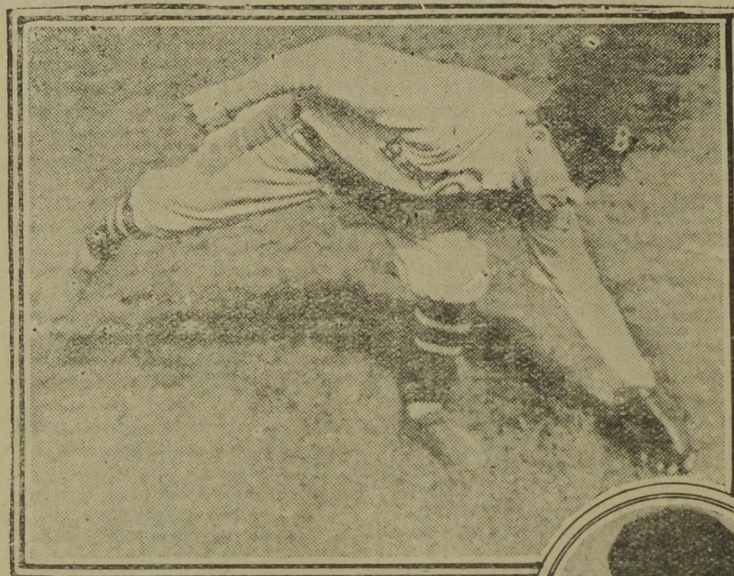

Brooklyns Have Good Stuff in Their Team and Should be Heard From Later in Season--Some of Their Stars.



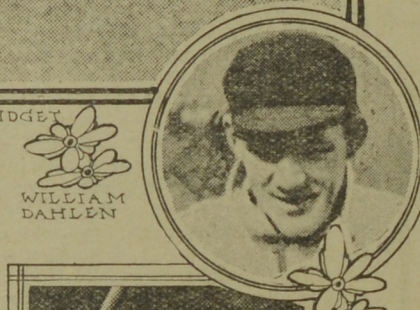
McMILLAN, BROOKLYN'S MIDGET SHORT STOP

JACK JOHNSON LAUDS JEFFRIES

Shows Los Angeles Sports that he is in Great Shape--Does a Few Tricks in Ring.

Los Angeles, April 29.—Frank Conley, bantamweight champion, won a newspaper decision over Dan Webster in a 10-round fight before the Pacific Athletic Club here last night. Webster was knocked down twice in the fourth round and was rescued by the bell. Jack Johnson sparred two short bouts with George Ootton and Mark Cutler as a preliminary. Johnson displayed great cleverness. He showed his strength by placing the palms of his gloves against Cutler's ears and lifting him half way across the ring. Johnson made a speech lauding Jeffries and promising to get into perfect condition for the fight on July fourth.

LANGFORD AND BURNS MATCHED AT LAST

Philadelphia, April 28.—Billy McCarney, who came from the Pacific coast especially to secure Sam Langford's signature for a fight with Tommy Burns, now in Australia, accomplished his mission here tonight. Joe Woodman, manager of Langford accepted the terms of the Metropolitan A. C. of San Francisco, which offered \$30,000 for a fight between the two heavyweights Sept. 5 next. Twenty thousand dollars of this purse is to go to the winner and \$10,000 to the loser.

A cablegram from Burns received here late tonight notified McCarney of his acceptance. As soon as his expense money is received Burns will return to this country.

ABE ATTELL AND TOMMY MURPHY FIGHT DRAW

New York, April 28.—Abe Attell and Tommy Murphy fought a ten-round draw at the Rmire Club tonight. Neither was in bad physical banded up, and Murphy's nose and condition when the bout came to an end, but Attell's left eye was badly mouth showed signs that Attell's punches had landed fairly hard and often.

FLYNN SAYS KETCHEL HAD NOTHING ON SAM

Pueblo Fireman Also Picks Jeffries to Win Big Fight at Emeryville on July 4.

Boston, April 29.—Jim Flynn, the "Pueblo fireman" who has fought all the leading heavyweights and middleweights out in California has arrived in Boston from Philadelphia, where he saw the Langford-Ketchel fight. It is Flynn's first visit to the East and he said he would like to box in Boston if a good opponent could be secured.

Flynn was asked what he thought of the newspaper decisions on the Langford-Ketchel affair. "I wouldn't want to offend neither men" he said "so let me out by saying it was a good draw. I will say, though, that the New York newspapers that said that Ketchel gave Langford a terrible beating are away off. Ketchel had nothing on Langford at all and Langford cut Ketchel up badly and came out of the fight without a mark. Ketchel was aggressive all the way, and that would give him a draw. He did not beat Langford."

It was apparent that Flynn thought Langford had the better of the bout although he wouldn't say so in terms. Flynn when asked about Jeffries and Johnson said: "Take a tip from me and pin a bet on the white man. He is all right and will be all right July 4. I've seen him at work, and believe me, he will come back and win."

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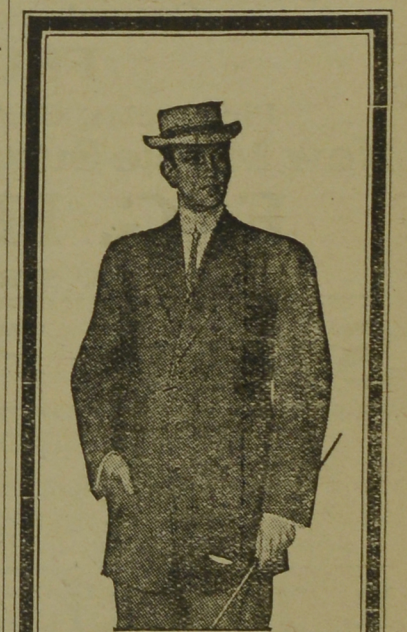
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
