## ST. STEPHEN BANK AFFAIRS PROVE VERY UNSATISFACTORY

**At Least \$600,000 Loans Made by Bank are Considered Doubtful--Curator Hopes However that a Double Liability Assessment on the Share Holders Will Not Be Necessary.**

St. Stephen N.B., May 16.—The annual meeting of the shareholders of the St. Stephen Bank was held in the office of that bank this afternoon at 3 o'clock. In the absence of the president, Frank Todd, who is not well, and is now at a sanitarium in New York, Vice-President John D. Chipman presided.

There was a large number of shareholders, as well as of the directors present. Considerable interest was manifested, and several of the shareholders expressed themselves very freely. One of them said he did not consider President Todd's \$100,000 a gift, but a just due to the bank; another suggested that some of the other officials pay a like sum. In the main the meeting was harmonious, and the condition of affairs was generally accepted. The old board of directors was allowed to stand. A committee consisting of George J. Clarke, J. E. Ganong and Henry E. Hill was appointed to co-operate with Curator Kessen in winding up the affairs of the bank. Vice-President Chipman reviewed the situation, details of which have already appeared, and closed as follows:

"The condition of the bank is found to be such as makes it necessary to wind up its affairs."

R. B. Kessen, after stating that he had been appointed curator on March 7, continued his report as follows:

"As far as possible all the accounts have been balanced and verified. The following statement represents the condition of the bank on May 14, as shown by the books:

## MISS LOUISE WEDDALL INJURED IN ACCIDENT

Had Wrist Broken and Ribs Fractured  
by Horse Overturning Carriage--  
Others Escaped Serious Injury.

Miss Louise Weddall sister of Mr. John J. Weddall had two wrist bones broken and sustained fractures of the ribs late yesterday afternoon as a result of a driving accident on George Street. Mrs. Charles H. Weddall, Mrs. F. E. Blackmere and Mrs. Dr. Colter of St. John who were with Miss Weddall at the time of the accident escaped with a severe shaking up.

The party was in a carriage in front of the residence of Mr. F. E. Blackmere when the horse which was driven by Mrs. Weddall bolted and overturned the vehicle. The occupants were all thrown out and the carriage fell on them. It started to drag the carriage but was captured by Mr. Harry Steen and more serious consequences averted.

Miss Weddall was taken into the residence of Mrs. W. Tennant where her injuries were attended to. Later she was able to go to her home. It will be some time before she recovers from her injuries.

## GASOLINE TANK MUST BE PUT UNDERGROUND

It is understood that the City Council at its next meeting will consider a communication from Mr. Peter Clinch, secretary of the Board of Fire Underwriters, with regard to the gasoline tank which the Imperial Oil Company proposes to erect on the Intercolonial "Y." The fire insurance firms are determined to have as little risk as possible from this tank and the communication asks that it be placed underground. It is understood that this request will be complied with by the company.

"The money that has been received from all sources since the suspension of the bank has been used in the redemption of notes in circulation and in payment of the Dominion government deposits, the latter being a preferred claim.

"The notes in circulation are now reduced to \$29,990, and against this the Dominion government holds a deposit of \$13,500. The balance still outstanding is amply provided for and the notes will be paid as they are presented. Interest upon them has ceased to accrue since the 2nd of May.

"The overdue and maturing loans have been realized wherever possible and additional security obtained in cases where it could be procured.

### MANY DOUBTFUL LOANS.

"A very large proportion of the loans is of such nature as to make their quick liquidation impossible, and the interests of the shareholders can best be served by granting time for realization.

"It is not advisable and at the present time it is not allowable, for the shareholders to be informed of the names of those who are indebted to the bank or the amount involved. Were such information to become generally known the prospect of the bank realizing upon the loans would be seriously affected. Serious losses have been made and large amounts must be written off now and in the future. These losses will probably absorb the capital, reserve and profit and loss accounts. No reliable estimate can be made as to the final result, but it is hoped that a call upon the shareholders' double liability will not be necessary.

"The large profit and loss balance is accounted for by the settlement recently made with the president. Mr. Todd the amount received having been credited to this account.

"Notes in circulation were \$149,935 at the time of the bank's failure, and this has been reduced to \$29,990 less \$13,500 held by the Dominion government as deposit. There are sufficient funds to meet this outstanding demand and a small balance, but not sufficient to pay a dividend to the depositors.

Mr. Kessen stated that the depositors would receive the amounts due them probably in certain per cent instalments. When the first payment would be made he could not say, but it will probably be some months.

## ROBLIN OUTFIT AT THEIR OLD TRICKS

The Latest Tory Dodge to Rob the  
Liberals of the Franchise in Mani-  
toba--Roblin Getting Desperate.

Winnipeg, May 16.—The Roblin Government machine is confusing the electorate in the matter of voters registering. After publishing in the Gazette the official location of registration places in the various constituencies, it was quietly announced in Government newspaper on Saturday that at sixty points, all in doubtful constituencies, the locations were changed. This complicates the matter, as Liberals took pains to notify the electorate after the first announcement, and there was no time to cancel the notices, and the Government agents, no doubt, were informed of the move.

Premier Roblin is becoming desperate since fresh proofs came into the hands of Liberals showing his connection with the Eli Sand Co. The Government aided concern with which Mr. Roblin solemnly declared a year ago in the Legislature he had no connection and which necessitated his absence last session. He is in excellent health, but Prof. Osborne is reckoned to put up a whirlwind campaign in Dufferin and make the Premier attend closely to his knitting in order to win out.
