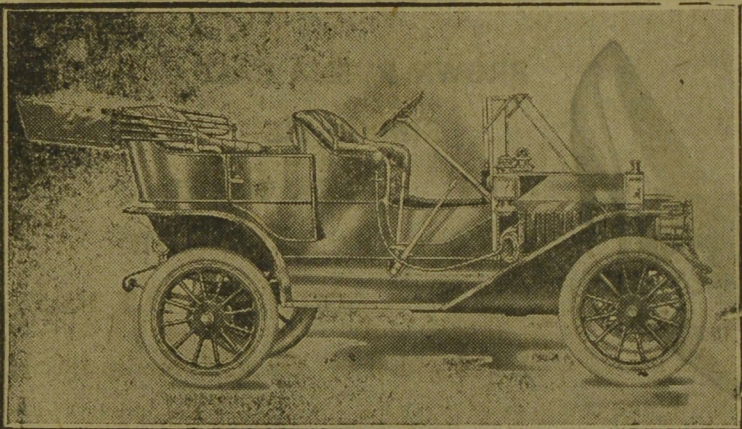

### CAMERON AND CORKERY TO REMAIN AMATEURS

Give Direct Denial to Stories That They Are to Become Pros—Race at St. John Tonight.

St. John, May 17.—Cameron and Corkery arrived in the city on the maritime express yesterday afternoon for the race in the Victoria rink with Sterling tonight. Both Cameron and Corkery look to be in the pink of condition, and it is expected they will put up a great race. Last night Cameron said: "Although I have not been doing any special training of late, yet I am in first class condition, and can be counted upon to put up a good race tomorrow night. I do not say I am going to win, but I will do my best. The outcome of the race is certainly doubtful for," said he, good humoredly, "neither I nor Corkery think we have anything on Sterling in a five mile race." Asked regarding his future plans he said: "I intend to rest during the month of June so as to be in fit condition for the ten mile Canadian championship race which is expected will be held in this part of the country, probably Amherst, early in July." Continuing he said: "There is no truth whatever in the reports that I am to turn professional, as I have no intention whatever at present of doing so."

Corkery when asked as to his plans for the future, said that after tonight's race he intended leaving for his home in Toronto. "I too," said he, "intend to remain in the amateur ranks at least for a while yet."

Tonight's race will not be called till about 9 o'clock, but the preliminary races will be called shortly after 8 o'clock. The entries for the preliminary events are as follows:

### COLLEGE TRACK MEET ON VICTORIA DAY

Nine Intercollegiate Events to be Run Off Then Also High School Events—Inter-Class Meet on 31st.

The Athletic Council of the U. N. B. Amateur Athletic Association, met last night and decided to hold the College Sports on the 24th of May, the day on which, with few exceptions, they have been held ever since the College students went in for track and field events. There will be a change for the better this year, however, as three events are to be taken off the programme. This will make it possible to end the meet before 6 p. m., and render it unnecessary to keep contestants and spectators on the grounds until evening. The three events which are to be cut out are the standing broad jump, hop, step and jump, and half mile run. These events are rather back numbers and are not often run off in meets. The High School events, 220 yards dash and broad jump, will be run off on the 24th. On Tuesday, the 31st inst., there will be a class meet at which the full programme of sports, including the three events which will not be held on Victoria Day, will be run off. A mile class relay-race is to be added to that programme.

Records made on May 24th will be recognized and those made on May 31st in the three events mentioned before, will also be recognized.

Two more Toronto players have been released. Wyatt Lee, pitcher and utility outfielder, and Stewart Gurney, pitcher.

### TWO FIGHTS THAT ATTRACT ATTENTION

Ketchel and Flynn at Boston Tonight—Papke and Thomas at San Francisco on Thursday.

Two bouts are on the lists for the week that will attract attention all over the country. One is the Papke-Thomas fight, 20 rounds, at San Francisco, Thursday night, and the other is the 12-round bout at the Armory Club of Boston Tuesday night, in which the Boston heavyweight, Porky Flynn, stacks up against Stanley Ketchel, the middle-weight champion.

The two bouts have a peculiar relation to each other. The winner of the Papke-Thomas bout will be matched against Ketchel on the coast probably in June. But if Flynn should by any chance happen to defeat Ketchel, it would naturally upset the plans of the coast promoters, and Flynn and Ketchel might be the big card.

Nobody seriously expects Flynn to take the measure of the middle-weight champion. He lacks experience, in the first place. Again, the only thing with which to beat Ketchel is a wallop like the kick of a government mule, and this Flynn does not possess—except in rare flashes. But as for skill, Flynn probably has as much or more than Ketchel, and in defensive skill Flynn is by far the better.

So it comes down to a question of whether Ketchel can defeat Porky decisively, or in fact defeat him at all. On paper it looks like a cinch for Ketchel to win by the K. O. route, but can he do it.

It isn't at all unlikely that Flynn will go the limit with Ketchel and give him a close contest into the bargain, and if he does that it will be a great boost for James P. McKandoo. It is the chance of his life to win a national reputation.
