MONEY OR LOVE

On the day Everard was twenty-one years old a man called on him and told him that he would like to have him go out with him where he could impart a secret. The man was over sixty years old and evidently a gentleman. He took Everard to a private room in a lawyer's office, closed the door and said to him:

"You are not Everard Ward. You are Lawrence Farwell. You are a foundling. I promised your mother that I would keep track of you and if certain persons who were heirs to certain property died before you I would advise you of the fact and enable you to claim that which such deaths would place in your hands. You were born in wedlock and today, your birthday, are entitled to a property worth about \$200,000.

The rest of the information the gentleman gave Everard—who his real father and his real mother were and why he was abandoned—does not necessarily form a part of this story. That it was all true the young man had no reason to doubt, for his informant showed him proofs which he had carefully kept for years and offered to turn over to him the fortune he referred to and of which he was executor. Everard instead of being made happy over the discovery, appeared to be very much pained. LONDON'S CONCRETE NEW POST OFFICE

Eighty Thousand Feet in Space, and a Vast Sum Saved by the Use of This Material.

London, Aug. 23.—Out of mud, chalk and gravel, which dredges have scooped up from the bottom of the Thames, has been raised London's new general post office, which is now completed and will be open to the public in the course of the next week or two. Its construction, costing \$1,750,000, has occupied five years, the foundation stone having been laid by the late King Edward on the site formerly occupied by the "Blue Boys" school, Christ's Hospital, in 1905. It is the first of the government buildings to be built of ferro-concrete, as it is generally called, reinforced concrete—and a remarkable feature of it is that not a single steel joint has been used in the entire construction.

The load of mud, chalk and gravel was landed from barges at Blackfriars and carted to King Edward Street, where it passed through a machine which sorted the stones into various sizes, and then another machine turned the whole mixture into liquid concrete. By the use of this ferro-concrete quite 80,000 feet of space has been saved, to say nothing of the economy in cost. For instance the retaining walls in the basement are only eight inches thick, whereas had they been of brick they would have required a thickness of seven feet.

The buildings themselves consist of two blocks, each of seven stories, and six observation galleries are provided on each floor for the superintendents, so that they have an uninterrupted view of all that is going on. Endless hands, or conveyors, for carrying letters from the mail bags in the yards to sorters at three tables have been installed, and lightning electric stamping machines will frank letters at the rate of several hundred a minute, or four or five times faster than they could possibly be done by hand.

A Dresden naturalist has discovered that ants allow seeds of plants of the pea family to partly germinate before drying them in the sun. They are then chewed to flour and made into biscuits, which are baked in the sun and stored away. The sprouting of the seed looks suspiciously like a plan to make malt and indulge in alcoholic excesses.

MILLINER'S ASSOCIATION DECIDE ON THE FUTURE STYLE OF LADIES HATS

Chicago, Aug. 24.—There is no belief in sight for women, who have accepted the dictates of fashion and struggled under the unwieldiest of the size of an umbrella, that it the edict of the National Association of retail milliners which is holding its annual convention here. Big hats are to be bigger and small hats smaller than ever before. There are to be no medium sized hats. The desire for extremes extends even to the coloring according to Mme. Matrie, President of the Association. The more brilliant the coloring the more nearly to the ideal effect will the new hat conform. The new shades will include magnolia, a shade of orange, daisy, pompeian, a dead rose, a coral red, herne, a light mahogany and a cajou, a raisin color.

CHILD LOST LIFE IN THREE INCHES OF WATER IN TUB

Montreal, Aug. 23.—In a wash tub containing only three inches of water Henrietta, the 17 months old child of Louis Lehall, 14 Market Square, lost her life yesterday morning before she was lifted out by her father who then rushed for a doctor, although it was then too late to restore animation.

While the father had been amusing the little one in the kitchen yesterday morning, she ran to the rear balcony. In the meantime, the father's attention was attracted elsewhere until they noticed the child's absence and found she had fallen head-first into the tub. After lifting the little one out, the father placed her in his wife's arms and rushed to the General Hospital, which is only a short distance from his home, for medical aid. One of the doctors returned with the father, and pronounced the child dead.

Lehall could not understand the sudden occurrence, as he said the child had not been out of his sight more than a couple of minutes. He did not think she could have been drowned in that quantity of water, nor did he hear any noise like a fall or splash. It was thought probable that when the child stumbled against the tub, she took fright, causing heart failure. Lehall is employed at the La Patrie office.
