**N. B. TELEPHONE COMPANY
HELD ANNUAL MEETING**

Added \$40,000 to Reserve For Deprecia-
tion and \$1,000 to Surplus--Decided
to Extend St. John Office at Cost of
\$35,000.

The New Brunswick Telephone Com-
pany at its annual meeting last
night decided to improve its St.
John office and to do this will ex-
pend about \$35,000, which amount
be secured by the sale of stock. The
company's building at St. John was
built originally to meet the needs of
that city alone. Subsequent changes
have made it necessary to double the
capacity of the building.

The sum of \$40,000 has been added
to the reserve for depreciation and
the sum of \$1,000 to the surplus. The
earnings for the year ending March
31st, 1910, were about \$20,000 more
than in the preceding year. It is
understood that the dividend declar-
ed will be the same as last year,
6 per cent.

The meeting was held in the com-
pany's office on Carleton Street. The
attendance was not large.

THE ANNUAL REPORT

The annual report to the share-
holders was as follows:
To the Shareholders of the New
Brunswick Telephone Company,
Limited:

Your Directors beg to submit here-
with a statement for the Year ended
March 31st, 1910.

The Plant account of the Company
is now \$1,206,728.18, which is an in-
crease of \$41,699.30 over that of the
previous year. This amount is large-
ly made up of the expenditures made
for underground construction in the
Cities of St. John and Fredericton,
the addition of a new copper line
from Moncton to Chatham, and for
the development of the rural service
of the Company in the St. John
River districts.

The small amount shown in the
statement for surplus for the year
calls possibly for some explanation,
in view of the amount of the surplus
indicated in the report for the pre-
vious year. In the last year's re-
port the deduction from the surplus
of a semi-annual dividend subsequent-
ly paid by the Company for the year
was not made, as such dividend had
not been declared for the term cov-
ered by the fiscal period of which the
report was dealing. The actual sur-
plus on hand for the year 1909 was
\$4,329.90, and for the present year
the actual surplus is \$1,144.37, and

**FRILLS BAD FOR
GIRL GRADUATES**

Cambridge, Mass., May 19--Miss
Margaret Glover, Chief Marshal of
this year's graduating class at Rad-
cliffe, has posted nine rules regarding

the total surplus for the two years
is therefore \$5,474.27.

It will be noticed, however, that
the sum of \$40,000 has been added
the present year to the reserve of
the Company for depreciation. The
Directors, for some time, have real-
ized that the earnings of the Com-
pany were not sufficient to enable it
to set aside a proper amount for the
depreciation of the properties of the
Company, and they now realize that
the earnings are still inadequate for
the purpose. At the same time, your
Directors feel assured that the gra-
dual growth of the business of the
Company, and the putting in force
by it of the rates adopted by the
Company throughout the Province,
will ultimately furnish a sufficient
revenue to meet the necessary depre-
ciation requirements, and your Di-
rectors believe that their past action
in respect to the provision made for
depreciation--in cutting the garment
according to the cloth--will in the
end be fully justified.

The Company, during the year, has
maintained the expansion in its busi-
ness that your Directors had reason
to anticipate would occur. The num-
ber of 'phones has increased from
8410 to 9035 during the year, and it
is the policy of the Directors to con-
tinue to develop the Company's sys-
tem throughout the Province where-
ever warranted, in order to meet
the requirements of the public for a tele-
phone service, and thus continue to
increase the earning possibilities of
the Company.
