TREATY GAVE NO RIGHT TO FORTIFY PANAMA CANAL

M. Bunau-Varilla, Panama's Agent in Negotiations, Speaks Out on Fortification Question.

Paris, Sept. 23.—Replying to a query as to whether in his opinion the Hay-Bunau-Varilla treaty authorized America to fortify the Panama Canal permanently, M. Philippe Bunau-Varilla, who was the representative of the Republic of Panama in the negotiations of 1903 for the transfer to the United States of Panama's exclusive rights of sovereignty over the mainland and island territory, said it did not.

It is true, he said, that Article XXIII authorizes the erection of fortifications, but such authorization is simply an accessory of the right to use military force to protect the canal when the necessity arises for such protection. Therefore, M. Bunau-Varilla contends, until such necessity arises the obvious right to fortify for fortifying the canal permanently the canal does not exist. Authority does not result either from the sovereign rights conceded to the United States on the Canal Zone. Such sovereign rights, M. Bunau-Varilla says, were granted as the legal mechanism necessary for obtaining the essential aim of the treaty—the establishment of a maritime highway which shall be permanently neutral and open to all nations on terms of absolute equality in peace or war.

AN ABUSE OF SOVEREIGNTY.

M. Bunau-Varilla went on to say that so strictly limited to the aim in view is the use of these sovereign rights that a special article in the treaty was deemed necessary in order to allow the use of armed forces for the protection of the canal.

Asked for his view of the international side of the question, he replied: "I can only say that the principle is gaining ground daily in the conscience of mankind that intermaritime passages are the common property of the nations, like the sea itself. The Western gate of the Pacific must, like the Eastern one, be free and open. If the canal is fortified by one nation it will be considered, an abuse of sovereignty committed to the detriment of other powerful co-users in the Pacific."

READY TO WORK ON RECIPROCITY NEGOTIATIONS

The New York Commercial Thinks Proposals Come Too Late Now, However.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 23.—Professor H. C. Emery, chairman of the new tariff commission, reached Washington yesterday, and Alvah H. Sanders, a member of that body, also arrived. Both are ready for the winter work of preparing information on which a scientific revision of the Payne-Aldrich tariff law may be based, and on preliminary work for Canadian reciprocity.

Prof. Emery does not think there is much chance that the commission will be able to make any recommendations for a revision of the individual schedules of the tariff law at the coming session of Congress.

President Taft, in his letter in the Republican campaign text-book, declares for a revision of the individual schedules of the law where the tariff commission so recommends.

Mr. Emery thinks the investigations of the commission have not gone far enough to warrant the revision of any schedules this year.

THIEKS MAJORITY AGAINST RECIPROCITY.

New York, Sept. 23.—The New York Commercial says:

"In all probability dissatisfaction with the tariff had little to do with the shrinkage of the Republican vote in Vermont and Maine. It is even more improbable that the popular demand for Canadian reciprocity in those States had anything to do with it. Still, there is good reason to believe that negotiations for trade reciprocity are 'on' between Washington and Ottawa."

"But this does not mean that a treaty may have an early conclusion between the two governments and be ready for consideration by Congress. Indeed, the great bulk of the people of the Dominion do not want reciprocity with the United States, and the publication of a tentative treaty would no doubt operate to heighten popular opposition to it there."

WHITE STAR TO BUILD FASTER BOATS FOR MAIL

Will Tender For Subsidy When the Allan Contract Expires—Means Revolution in Class of Boats.

Ottawa, Sept. 23.—The opening gun in the battle for the subsidy for the carriage of the British mails has been fired. The White Star Line has sent through its Canadian agents word to the Trade and Commerce Department at Ottawa that when the present contract expires with the Allans it will be in the field and will tender for the carriage of the mails under whatever conditions the Government may lay down.

The statement that this intimation had been given the Government has been going the rounds for the past few days, but today confirmation has come from a most reliable source at the capital.

At present the Canadian service of the White Star Line is in no way competent to cope with the growing mail service between Canada and Great Britain and the action of the company means nothing less than that the firm is prepared to put on the St. Lawrence route the fastest and most modern ships which can be obtained.

It is only a few weeks since word went out from Ottawa in tones that could not but be taken seriously that the Canadian Government would only grant the mail subsidy to the line or lines which could provide the fastest steamers and in the face of this the action of the Morgan interests is a promise from them that when the Allans' contract expires they will have ships which in their opinion will be the equals of the new vessels being built by the present holders of the mail contract.

PLANS OF ALLAN LINE.

The plans of the Allan Line provide for two new ships for the St. Lawrence service which will churn up the waters of the North Atlantic at the rate of twenty-two miles an hour and hence it is taken for granted that the White Star Line will provide something equally fast.

The coming of two such steamers, or even a greater number will relegate the present top-notchers of the fleet to a position far back in the race. While the Laurentic and Megantic are in themselves beautiful ships yet they are not to be compared with at least half a dozen vessels now in the Canadian trade when the question of speed is concerned.

MINISTER WANDERS AWAY FROM FOLD

Suddenly Disappears, Says He Had Aphasia But Young Heiress Departs at the Same Time.

Spencer, N. Y., Sept. 23.—After searching for two weeks for her husband, who mysteriously disappeared, Mrs. J. T. Bradburn, wife of Rev. Dr. Bradburn, pastor of the Spencer Methodist Church, received a letter from him today, in which he stated that he wandered away while suffering from aphasia, and found himself in Pittston, Pa.

About the same time that the Rev. Mr. Bradburn wandered away, Miss White, a beautiful young heiress of Halsey Valley, near here, also mysteriously disappeared from home. Her family has received no word of her whereabouts.

DOES NOT MENTION WOMAN

The minister said in his letter that he has now recovered, and would return home at once. He makes no mention of Miss White.

The Rev. Mr. Bradburn suddenly dropped out of sight after preaching a sermon at Nicholas two weeks ago on Sunday. He said in his letter that he did not remember leaving Nicholas, and that his mind was blank during his wanderings.

The authorities who have been asked to find Miss White, have now redoubled their efforts. The members of Rev. Mr. Bradburn's congregation have nearly been disrupted by gossip.

MAN BURNED TO DEATH IN HOTEL FIRE

Greenwich Conn. Sept. 22.—Joseph Christopher a porter, was burned to death, and Sarah Stewart, another employee, was injured in a fire here early today which destroyed the servants annex of the Elms Hotel. The fire's supposed to have started on the third floor in the room occupied by Christopher. His charred body was found in the ruins after the fire.
