THE HARVESTER COVERED THE MILE IN 2.01 FLAT

Track at Columbus was Not in Best of Condition—Will Try Again on Thursday.

Columbus, Ohio Sep. 22.—To the track that for 9 years held the stallion trotting championship because of the 2:02 1/4 mile made by Cresceus came back the title today when The Harvester went a mile in 2:01 flat, and thereby took a quarter of a second off the time he made last week at Syracuse Driver Geers, a moment after he had dismounted and acknowledged the cheers of the crowd, declared his intention of making an attack next Thursday on the record, if the track could be made solid close to the rail. Because of the loose footing today, The Harvester had to step a long mile. He was a trifle weary at the finish and did not cover the last quarter as he has done another points on the grand circuit.

Shortly before five o'clock the champion was sent away rushing and went the first quarter in 29 1/2 seconds. Over on the back stretch one runner became a trailer. The second quarter was stepped in 30 seconds, in the third there was slight slackening and the time for it was 30 1/2 seconds. A final quarter in 31 1/2 seconds made the mile a winning, for The Harvester had started to beat 2:01 Bervaldo, Major Brino and Manuella won the regular events of the card. Bervaldo was favorite over all the other 2:12 trotters but dropped the first heat to George Todd. May Day, the first choice in the 2:05 pace, was distanced by Major Brin in the second heat when she made a standstill break going away. Maconda was expected to win the special pace but was second three times to Manuella.
