## U. N. B. ENGINEERING CAMP BROKE UP TODAY EXAMS- NEXT WEEK

All Professors With Exception of Prof. Geoghegan Are in City -- Large Freshmen Class.

The annual camp of the civil engineering students of the University of New Brunswick breaks up today and those in attendance are expected to reach the city tonight coming from Zealand, where the camp has been held, by the Gibson branch. The matriculation, supplemental and scholarship examinations will begin on Thursday, September 29th and close on Saturday, October 1st. On the Monday following, October 3rd, lectures will begin. All the members of the faculty with the exception of Prof. Geoghegan will be in the city today. Prof. Raymond arrived this morning and Prof. Stone who has been at Zealand in charge of the engineering camp will arrive this evening. Prof. Geoghegan will occupy the chair of Modern Languages. During the past academic year he has been on leave of absence studying in Continental Europe.

## IMPROVEMENTS MADE

During the past year the gymnasium at the U. N. B. has been improved by the installation of hot water heating apparatus. The equipment is now complete and the building is now ready for use.

## MANY NEW STUDENTS

Dr. C. C. Jones, Chancellor of the University stated this morning that he had received numerous applications from intending students and expected that there would be at least fifty new students. These will come from all parts of New Brunswick as well as from places outside the province.

## TO OPEN EARLIER IN 1911

It is expected that in 1911 the academic year of U. N. B. will open about the middle of September as permission to provide for an earlier opening has been given by the University senate.

Four cases were against one person. All five cases were postponed. It is likely that the defendants will make application to the Sewerage Department for permission to make the necessary connection.

A farewell meeting was held last night in the Brunswick Street Baptist church in honor of Rev. Malcolm L. and Mrs. Orchard who leave next week to take up mission work in India.

## ADDRESSES DELIVERED

In the afternoon the Woman's Missionary Aid Society held their annual meeting and tea at which Mrs. Randolph on behalf of that organization said farewell to Mrs. Orchard. In the evening a large audience assembled in the church when addresses were made by Rev. J. H. McDonald on behalf of the church, Mr. J. W. Spurdell for the Sunday School and Chancellor C. C. Jones on behalf of the laymen who have become responsible to the mission board for Mr. Orchard's support. In reply Mr. Orchard delivered an address of great power and eloquence in which he showed his reasons for becoming a missionary. Dr. Kierstead, on behalf of the George St. church, made a brief address. Revs. W. H. Jenkins, G. W. Foster, Sharpe and Baker participated in the exercises.
