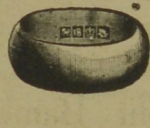

refused to pay. The costs of the suit in that matter had been greater than the amount of the bill. Mr. Phinney had cut his bill down more than he would have for private parties. In accordance with the Canada Temperance Act the monies secured from Scott Act fines must be used to pay the bill. There would be no expense to the city.

Ald. Hooper thought it not proper for a bill to be produced in committee without first going to the auditor.

Ald. Clark said he had seen bills brought before the council without first having been taken to the auditor.

The motion was lost, only the mover, seconder and Ald. Calder voting for it.

The item was then passed. On motion of Ald. Clark, seconded by Ald. Calder, the regular quarterly and monthly salaries and twenty-five dollars superannuation to Mr. Chas. W. Beckwith was ordered to be paid.

MUNICIPAL HOME RECEIPTS.

Ald. Jewett reported a balance of \$43.40 to the credit of the Municipal Home Commissioner, and moved that a cheque for \$250 be issued in the commissioner's favor. Carried.

Ald. Weddall reported a marked increase in tax collections during April last, over the amount collected during the same time last year.

ROADS AND STREETS.

Ald. Mitchell reported that the Roads and Streets Committee had recommended that permission be granted the Imperial Oil Company to erect a steel gasoline tank on the Intercolonial Railway.

The recommendation was adopted.

SALARY INCREASED.

Ald. Jewett presented an application of Mr. R. H. Boone, Commissioner of the Municipal Home, for an increase in salary. The alderman also moved that an increase in salary of \$50 per year be given Commissioner Boone. The motion was carried.

BAND GRANTS.

Ald. Hooper presented a petition from the Fredericton Brass Band, asking for a grant of \$300, one-half to be granted at the next meeting of the council. The alderman spoke strongly in favor of the granting of the sum asked for on condition that twenty open-air concerts be given by the band, four of the number to be sacred concerts to be given on Sunday afternoons. The motion included the naming of the following committee to take up the matter: Ald. Calder, chairman; Ald. Osborne, Ald. Hooper.

Ald. Osborne supported the motion.

Ald. Vanwart said that he had felt favorable to the grant asked by the Fredericton Brass Band. However, what was to be done about the 71st Regt. Band. It had been stated in committee that that organization had disbanded. It was not correct, he had been informed.

Ald. Harrison spoke in a similar strain. Capt. Guthrie, secretary of the band committee of the 71st Regt. was present. He thought Capt. Guthrie might be heard.

On Ald. Mitchell's motion, the petition of the 71st Regt. Band for a grant was heard.

Ald. Osborne said that the reading of this petition put a different face on the matter. As an officer of the 71st Regt., he could not vote for all the money to go to the Fredericton Brass Band.

Ald. Hooper asked for a vote. Anything from Capt. Guthrie would be out of order. He was prepared to give him every consideration but there was a motion before the council.

It was finally decided to hear Capt. Guthrie. The latter stated that the 71st Regt. band was merely asking for its rights. The band was a live organization. Its membership was not as large as last year when it had thirty-nine members. Band Master Mansfield had resigned, but James White had been secured as band-master. The government gave but one hundred dollars a year to the band, with free rent and light. In the past year the band had paid \$300 for instruments.

On the amendment of Ald. Osborne, it was decided to grant the Fredericton Brass Band \$225 and the 71st Regt. Band \$75. The first named band is to play fifteen open-air concerts during the summer and the other ten. Each band is to play two Sunday concerts.

MARYSVILLE ASSESSMENT UNDER SIX THOUSAND

New Town Council Disposed of a Lot of Important Business--Aldermen Out for Economy.

The new town council met for the second time in town hall last evening. Mayor C. H. Hatt occupied the chair. The following aldermen were in their places, Pickard, Harris, Gilbert, Sloat, Hazelwood, Pond Robinson, and Morrison. The town clerk, A. D. MacPherson, read the minutes of the last meeting and were adopted. A communication was read from Mr. St. John Bliss, secretary-treas. of the county, in referring to the assessment of the town of Marysville amounted to \$1,917.99, which is not as much as last year.

The assessments for the town was passed as follows:

A heated discussion took place when some of the aldermen thought the expenditures exorbitant, while others thought the reverse. A committee was appointed to provide some more economical way of caring for the poor. Some thought if they were housed together instead of being scattered they could be cared for at less expense.

Bills such as the poll clerks salary for the last election, the policeman's salary for the month of April, were ordered paid.

Matthew Brennen was appointed pound keeper for ward No. 2, L. Burns cattle driver for No. 3. It was asked that a health inspector be appointed. Mr. W. L. Estabrook was offered the position of health inspector at a small salary.

Mr. Wm. Bubar offered to collect the taxes for less than the present officer. The communication was too late to be considered.

Two men were named for road master, Chas. McConaghy and J. Manzer. Chas. McConaghy was given the position. The following were appointed to locate a suitable place for a public dump: Aids. Hazelwood, Sloat, Gilbert, Morrison.

The bridge washed away at McConaghy's brook is to be replaced by the town, at the expense of the local government, by which means the town will be in the amount of two hundred dollars.

A committee was appointed to meet the county council in reference to the claim. Here the meeting adjourned.

The Ladies' Aid of the United Baptist Church held a very successful social in Oddfellow's hall, Monday evening.

WILL RACE TO FREDERICTON.

The Royal Kennebecasis Yacht club will hold an endurance race from Millidgeville to this city on July 8th. The annual cruise will begin on July 23rd, and will be to Oromocto. Some of the yachts will very likely come to Fredericton.

Farrell was nominated as a member of the local Board of Health.

Ald. Walker presented a petition for a fire alarm box at the corner of Aberdeen and Westmorland Streets. The matter was referred to the Fire Committee, with power to act.

PETITIONS.

Ald. Calder presented a petition, asking for the extension of Aberdeen Street from Church Street to University Avenue. The matter was referred to the Roads and Streets committee, with power to obtain information.

A petition from the Monitor Manufacturing Company asking for exemption from water rates and taxes was presented.

It was decided to inform the company that it must have representatives appear before the council and make formal application.

Ald. Calder asked why the sewerage pumps had stopped. He understood the water in the river was high enough to endanger the sewerage system.

Ald. Vanwart replied that the pumps had both been broken, but the water had fallen sufficiently to do away with danger.

On Ald. Walker's motion, the usual pay was voted the firemen.

Ald. Jewett proposed that the street laborers be paid fortnightly instead of monthly. He seconded a motion of Ald. Mitchell to put this change into effect. Carried.

THE WHARVES.

Mayor Thomas remarked that there was much dissatisfaction concerning the wharves, particularly in freshet time. Some improvement would have to be made.

Ald. Walker said that a complete survey of the city wharves had been made. In 1908 it had been intended to build a concrete wharf behind the City Hall, but the cost had been found to be excessive. The council adjourned without taking action.
