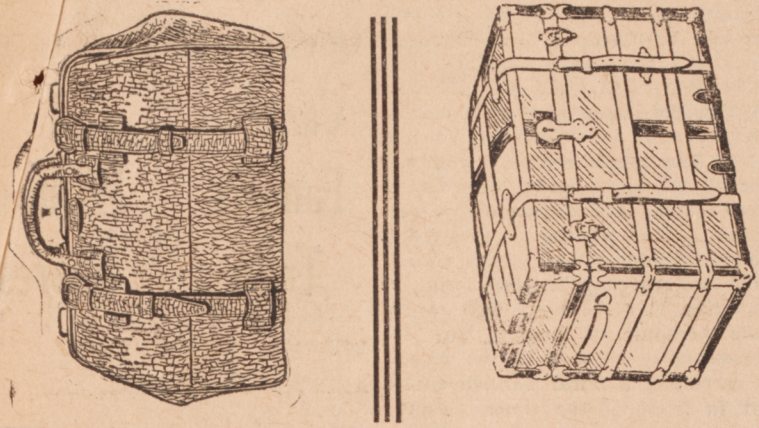

Temporary Shacks Will Not
Answer in Winter Time

Shelter of a More Substantial Nature must be Provided for
Campbellton's Homeless Ones Unless Much Misery is to
Ensnue in the Cold Weather---Only Two Months Now Before
it will be Here---Some Definite Provision must be Decided
Upon at Once---Minister of Public Works Expected Today.

Campbellton, N. B., July 27—A strong sunshine whose warming rays crept in the crevices of flimsy structures and tattered canvas aided much today in making at least tolerable the miserable lot of the unfortunate people. More than sunshine is needed in stricken Campbellton, however, for no matter how great a cheering effect it may have, it cannot blot from the minds of a destitute people the knowledge that the autumn blasts and winter snows are not far distant. Added to this the future holds nothing in store for them, for the contributions already received, although of a very generous nature, are yet too small to cope with their immediate requirements. The situation in Campbellton today is simply one in which the existence of fully 3,000 people is depending solely on the bounty of their friends. In as much as they are able the citizens of this fire-stricken town are doing their utmost to make the best of the worst. What little money they can accumulate the business men are putting it into temporary shacks the erection of which is not only bringing in money to the laboring classed but is also adding much in dispelling the scenes of desolation.

DR. PUGSLEY DUE TODAY.

Tomorrow morning at 10.30 o'clock Hon. William Pugsley minister of public works will arrive in town. He will be met by members of the town council and relief committee. He will be taken throughout the whole length and breadth of the town, automobiles having been engaged for the purpose. This will take up the greater part of the morning and in the morning and in the afternoon a general conference will be held at which the prominent members of these committees will make an appeal to the Minister of Public Works. Fact and figures will be presented, and Dr. Pugsley will be left to judge for himself what needs best be done.

The Minister will leave here again in the evening by the Ocean Limited. Neither Governor Tweedie or Premier Hazen are expected here tomorrow but the general understanding is that they will pay a visit on another occasion, the date to be named by Dr. Pugsley who will be invited to pay a second visit.

ALD. OSBORNE.

Ald. W. J. Osborne spoke of the changes that had come over modern industrial conditions because of the decay of the apprenticeship system. He felt that if there was any sufficient substitute for that way of learning a trade or business, it lay in the direction of Technical Education.

MR. J. D. PHINNEY.

Mr. J. D. Phinney said he believed that the present school system was doing as much as could be reasonably expected, and he thought that if Industrial Education was to be taken up, special schools would be provided in the centres of population, apart from the Public Schools.

MR. W. H. FLETT.

A delegation was present from the Fredericton Labor Council, consisting of Messrs. Lister, Flett and Mackenzie. Mr. W. H. Flett spoke very strongly of his conviction that Technical Education was greatly required. He said that opportunities for improvement should be within the reach of every worker, and that the result would be a general uplifting of the industrial population, a diminution of crime, and a raising of the standard of living throughout the community.

MR. FRANK LISTER.

Mr. Frank Lister said that, in common with labor men everywhere, the Fredericton Labor Council heartily welcomed the appointment of the Royal Commission, as they were firmly convinced of the wisdom and necessity of providing adequate means for Industrial Education. His own trade, printing, had a very complete scheme for the improvement of its members by means of correspondence courses, and great advances had been made from the working of the scheme. He hoped that every worker would help by every means in his power to forward the cause of Technical Education, as one of the greatest benefits that could be obtained for the country. Trades' Unions everywhere are strongly behind the movement for Technical Education, and the Com-

mittee of the Board of Trade could be assured of the heartiest co-operation of the local unionists in this matter.

MR. JOHNSON MACKENZIE.

Mr. Johnson Mackenzie said he could confirm emphatically what had been said about the need of Technical Education, by his experience of the local building trade. At the present moment there was not a single apprentice to the trade of carpentering in Fredericton, and it was becoming more and more difficult to get good workmen and in consequence the standard of work was becoming lower and lower because the ranks were filled with men having little or no training in anything but the roughest work.

MR. MCCREADY.

Mr. McCready hoped that one outcome of the meeting would be that each trade and industry would select a man to appear before the Commission to give evidence on the needs of his particular business in this matter.

MR. H. B. CLARK.

Mr. H. B. Clark spoke in general approval of the work outlined by the Commission, and said he was entirely in agreement with previous speakers in recognizing that Technical Education was badly needed at the present day, in mechanical businesses.

ALD. CLARK.

Ald. Clark said that the need for trained men in mechanical industries is very great today. He told the meeting of the failure to establish an important manufacturing industry in Fredericton some years ago, because it seemed impossible to obtain the right kind of experts to establish and carry on the mechanical part of the business. In every line of manufacturing, the demand for skilled men was far greater than the supply, and he hoped for much from the work of the Royal Commission. If a technical school could be established in Fredericton a tremendous impetus would be given to the manufacturing interests of the whole Province.

Mr. Wm. Lemont, President Hodge, of the Board of Trade, and others followed in support, and it was finally resolved that,

"In view of the importance of the whole matter, each trade and industry in the neighborhood be asked to

name one and all important question is not going to be neglected. After deliberating for some time the board decided to call for plans from different architects to be submitted for the rebuilding of the school on the old site. It is the intention of the board to have one story erected as soon as possible so to at least provide accommodation for the carrying on of the school work among the higher grades.

PUBLIC APATHY

The financial contributions continue to come in very slowly. Only a few were received today and these will be acknowledged later. Can it be the outside world is fully unconscious of the sufferings and deprivations which are being endured by this fire-stricken community? The loss, deducting insurance paid, amounts to over \$4,000,000. The contributions so far received are only in the vicinity of \$43,000. A sorrowful contrast and one which is adding despair to misery.

A slight infringement of the law was committed yesterday and as a result Magistrate Matheson was given his first opportunity of holding court since the day of the fire. The case was one of assault, which was the result of an altercation. Magistrate Matheson held court in a tent. After hearing both sides of the story he dismissed the case.

CANON SMITHER'S VIEWS

Canon Smither, of Fredericton, who is organizing relief forces throughout the Anglican diocese of New Brunswick, arrived here today made an inspection of the ruins. Speaking to The Telegraph reporter the reverend gentleman said that he felt there was a great necessity for immediate and generous help. In truth, it is not a question of kindly charity he said, but one of absolute necessity. First of all he thought steps should be taken for the proper sheltering of the women and children. The best contribution which could be made at the present, however, would be for the dominion government to assume the bonded indebtedness of the town. This would immensely encourage the citizens generally to erect permanent dwellings and would also be instrumental in inviting capitalists from outside.

Ald. John McGoldrick, of St. John, arrived here on the Ocean Limited this evening. He said he came here for the purpose of getting in touch with existing conditions.
