# A Neglected Market; Canada's Chance to Ship Tomatoes

Superintendent of Ontario Agricultural Societies Returns From Europe---He Finds that Canary Islands can Ship Tomatoes to London Packed in Sawdust and Peat--Intensive Agriculture in England Brings Splendid Results.

Tomatoes, packed in a mixture of sawdust and peat and shipped from the Canary Islands seven days distant by steamship lines, are sold in Covent Garden, London, at prices ranging from twopence to sixpence a pound.

In Ontario, no farther away from the British market than the Canary Islands, tomatoes, when the crop begins to move, are sold at 25 cents a bushel.

## A CHANCE FOR ONTARIO

This is the contrast that Mr. J. Lockie Wilson, Superintendent of the Agricultural and Horticultural Societies for Ontario, draws as one result of his trip to Britain and the continent of Europe in quest of information for his department. The possibilities this one market presents for Ontario farmers will probably be recognized by the Provincial Government, upon the suggestion of Mr. Wilson, and when the forthcoming shipment of Ontario produce is made to British markets, a consignment of tomatoes packed in sawdust will likely be included.

## A NEGLECTED MARKET

Although Ontario has proven to be especially well adapted for the cultivation of tomatoes, this vegetable has no place in the great London market. A few years ago shippers attempted to introduce Ontario tomatoes in England, but they were shipped in cold storage, and their condition upon arrival put a damper upon the enterprise. The growers in the Canary Islands knowing that the tomato needed dryness more than anything else, have adopted the plan

of packing them in sawdust and peat. According to Mr. Wilson, tomatoes packed in this way will keep for two weeks after arriving in London.

## WORK UP THE PEACH TRADE

Mr. Wilson was also impressed with the opportunity of working up the trade in Ontario peaches. High prices were the rule, and the chief thing was to ship the right quality of fruit to the British market.

"From talking to fruit men," he said, "I found that England wants fine stuff." He believed that the sale of peaches in England should be placed in the hands of some up-to-date dealers, who would make a specialty of placing the fruit upon the market to the best advantage.

## AGRICULTURE IN ENGLAND

Mr. Wilson, who visited agricultural fairs in England, Ireland and Scotland, as well as on the continent has nothing but kind words for agricultural England.

"It will surprise you," he said to an interviewer "to know that agriculture is still Britain's biggest industry. Despite the fact that he is paying from two to four pounds an acre as rent for his land, the English farmer is fairly prosperous.

"England in 1909 produced 3½ million bushels of wheat, and the production per acre averaged 36 bushels for the whole country. Fifty bushels per acre was common, whereas here we think twenty is pretty fair."

## INTENSIVE CULTIVATION

Intensive cultivation, Mr. Wilson explained, was responsible for the difference. The English farmer was devoting time to the care and selection of seed and the care of the land. "They don't let weeds grow there," he added.

In England and France the farmers had brought intensive cultivation to a fine art and before long, Mr. Wilson declared, the Canadian farmer would have to follow suit. In those countries, instead of the soil production growing less as it is in many parts of Ontario and even in the west, the land was producing more than ever.

## EXHIBITIONS IN ENGLAND

While in England, Mr. Wilson visited the Japanese-British exhibition. The only colony represented was New Zealand, which had a fine exhibit of grain. He also visited the Royal Show of England at Liverpool, where Canadian produce was on exhibition. Mr. Wilson expressed himself as disappointed at the showing made there by Canada, but for the Canadian exhibit at Brussels there had, he said, been nothing but praise.

"I saw nothing in any country to equal our own National Exhibition in the matter of buildings," remarked the Superintendent, "but the grounds in some places were superior. They had more trees, shrubbery and flowers."

## ENCOURAGING HORSE-BREEDING

In Belgium the Government was encouraging the breeding of fine horses, and large prizes were offered for stallions at the Belgian fairs, on condition that the animals be kept in the country for five years. The Belgians, Mr. Wilson said, were anxious to place their horses in Canada.

In summing up his impressions of Great Britain, Mr. Wilson said Britain was suffering from three things—a plethora of wealth, a plethora of industry and a plethora of intellectual activity.

## McGraw BLACKENED BUGS RAYMOND'S EYE

St. Louis, July 24—Pitcher Arthur "Bugs" Raymond of the Giants, the only person who conducted ball player in the world, is wearing a darkened optic as the result of a clash with Manager McGraw of the New York team.

The thumping the eccentric pitcher got is said to be the second administered to him since the Giants arrived Thursday morning. Raymond is said to have attempted to stray from his keeper, Dick Fuller, Thursday morning. Fuller had to use force to prevent him from tearing away from the hotel.

When Raymond reported at the park his condition displeased McGraw who ordered "Bugs" to remove his uniform, and when Raymond remonstrated player and manager mixed. Raymond came out second best. He later removed his uniform and left the clubhouse. McGraw who is much smaller than Raymond gave the pitcher a better thumping than he did last season when they came together on a train.

Chicago, July 22—"Beware of men who want to make you President," says Col. J. Hamilton Lewis, "when they raise their hands to swear allegiance to you, put your hands on your pocketbook."

Yesterday Col. Lewis boarded a car and, owing to the usual crowd, was forced to take a "strap seat." He noticed that he was being jostled and crowded a little more than he thought was absolutely necessary, but paid no attention to it until a man standing beside him leaned on his shoulder and remarked:

"I beg your pardon, sir, but you look a great deal like Col. J. Hamilton Lewis."

"Well, people have told me that before," said Col. Lewis.

"You even talk like Col. Lewis," said the man.

"I have been told that before, too," replied Col. Lewis.

"I believe that you are Col. J. Hamilton Lewis," insisted the man. "and I want to say that you are the greatest man living. Some day you will be President."

While the Colonel was trying to figure out who his admirer was the car stopped and the man got off. Col. Lewis discovered a short time afterward that his pocketbook had got off at the same stop.

## IMPERIAL GOVERNMENT SENDS REPRESENTATIVE

British Statesmen Want to Bring Colonial Office into Closer Touch with the Colonies—Dispatch a Special Commissioner to Make Report.

Montreal, Que., July 22.—In order to bring the Colonial Office into closer touch with the Colonies, H. W. Just one of the senior of the Under-Secretaries connected with that Office, arrived here today on the Empress of Britain. Mr. Just will go through Canada from the Atlantic to the Pacific and make a careful study of conditions. He was for some time engaged in connection with the Australian end of the Colonial Office, later being transferred to the Canadian division.

He is a brother of the Immigration Officer of the same name who was assistant to Sir Charles Tupper when he was High Commissioner. Another brother is an accountant in Montreal.
