## GREAT RACING AT GRAND RAPIDS ON THE CLOSING DAY

Giftline Beat Out The Eel in the 2.03—  
European Trotter Won First American Race in 2.08 1-4.

Grand Rapids, Mich., 23.—It remained for the closing day's program to furnish the highest class racing of a most successful meeting here Giftline, the big Kansas gelding, outraced a brilliant field in the 5.03 pacing class, and in the first heat lowered his record to 2.02½, which is the fastest racing mile of the year.

The wonderfully fast young trotter Colorado E marched to an easy victory in the 3-year-old event and the class he displayed today makes him look to be a most formidable rival for honors with the champion Native Belle in the rich futurities of the year. His heat in 2.12½ was under a pull of the wire.

Willy, the celebrated European trotter, owned by Louis Winans of Brighton, Eng., signalized his first American start by marching to a record of 2.08½ in a thrilling finish with Bobbie P. McGregor, in the initial heat, of the 2.14 trotting class, but in the second heat, showing the way nearly to the wire, he was outfinished in a smashing drive by Hallworthy, an other new 2.10 trotter for the meeting, making four in all.

More money poured into the box in the 2.03 pace than had been wagered throughout the week on the other events, for the Kansas gelding's admirers came prepared to do battle and The Eel, George Gano and Aileen Wilson had plenty of followers.

The betting was, Giftline \$100, The Eel \$100, George Gano \$50 and the field \$25.

They got away on the first score, with Giftline fairly flying at the rail, while The Eel was a length back, at the quarter, Giftline was showing the way, with the Canadian wiggler laying in close behind him and the rest of the field closely bunched a length away.

With positions unchanged, they reached the head of the stretch where McEwen pulled The Eel inside and began to drive, but the big son of Online moved away and won on the chin strap.

STEPPED TO A MARK OF 2.06½

In the second McMahon rushed Ross K. to the front in an effort to kill off Giftline, but at the half Carter moved the tail horse and he raced around the lot, took the lead and was fairly comfortable at the distance post, where Aileen Wilson, coming like a whirlwind, got to his wheel and only the fact that there were but a few yards to go saved the western money, for he won by only a scant head from the Boston mare with The Eel a length behind.

Tommy Murphy scored another win in the 2.12 pacing race, with the clean-legged mare May Day, a mare of down east breeding, and she stepped to a mark of 2.06½ with such ease that a record of 2.05 or better seems to be a possibility for her.

Myrtle Granette was a 2-to-1 choice over her field in the 2.20 trotting division, but she got the flag in the fourth heat.

The race developed into a duel between Rickey Rawson and Henry H. with the gelding the stronger at the end of the gruelling five-heat battle.

When Hallworthy won the second heat of the 2.14 trot the race looked all over, but in the third Lon McDonald shot Bobbie McGregor to the lead at the first turn and showed the way to the wire with the Axworthy gelding at his wheel. It was a flash, however, for he went away on a pace in the fourth heat and Willy, rushing to the lead, only succumbed at the wire to a remarkable finish by Hallworthy, which won by a head, stopping the watches in 2.07½, a new trotting record for the course and the fastest heat of the year at the diagonal gait.

Today the horses ship to Kalamazoo where on Monday they begin their first grand circuit engagements of the year. The summaries:
