A number of anglers spent Saturday afternoon whipping the pool, but the only one who seems to have had any great measure of success was Mr. R. H. McCunn. He killed no less than five fish, the largest of which weighed eleven pounds. Mr. R. T. Mack took an eleven pounder from this pool on a fly three years ago, establishing a record which McCunn has now equalled. Mr. McCunn has caught ten salmon and grilse at Hartt's Island so far this season.


