WHITE SLAVE TRADERS SENT TO PRISON

Buffalo, March 16.—Buffalo's first white slave trial was closed this afternoon, when William Wilson (alias Emile Rosenberg, alias William Goldberg) of Toronto was sentenced to one year and six months in the Federal Prison at Atlanta, Ga., for attempting to import an alien woman for immoral purposes. Wilson, with tears in his eyes, asked Judge Hazel to at least give him a light sentence in order that he might reform, and the effect of his plea was to secure the above sentence. That he was satisfied with the result may be gathered from the fact that upon taking his seat he remarked that he thought he would get five years.

Edward Armstrong, another Toronto man who also had been jointly indicted with Wilson, but had pleaded guilty, was a good witness both for himself and Wilson. He testified that both intended to marry the girls they were bringing here, and that, so far as he was concerned he still held that intention. Armstrong's girl, Agnes Fletcher, broke down completely when the prosecuting attorney called them "women of the street." She burst into tears and rushed screaming into the corridor. The evidence brought out seemed to point to the fact that Armstrong who is an "English remittance man" provided the money for the entire party. He paid the bills, and the receipts were made out in Wilson's name. He paid the railroad fare for both girls and furnished the flat.

Both men have records of convictions for larceny against them, and when in Toronto, where they met the girls, were both in trouble with the police. Wilson's last arrest was for street fighting, and at that time the Taylor girl paid his fine and got him out of prison.

Armstrong will be sentenced today. His lawyer yesterday made a plea for clemency, and he declared he would marry the Fletcher girl, "despite his brother-in-law in Toronto" who, he says, has already objected strenuously.

Moncton, N. B., March 16.—The funeral of Robert W. Geldart, I. C. R. brakeman, who died in the Moncton Hospital Monday morning from injuries received at Belledune on Saturday morning last, was held this afternoon and was one of the largest seen in Moncton for some time. The last sad rites were performed under the auspices of the Orange order, of which deceased was a member.

The Grand Orange Lodge in session adjourned this afternoon to attend in a body, and besides the members of the Independent Order of Foresters the Christian Brotherhood of the Baptist church, of which deceased was a member, attended in a body. Altogether there were five lodges of the Orange order in the procession, headed by the Loyal Protestant band. Rev. C. W. Corey, acting pastor of the First Baptist church, conducted the services.
