

LIVELY POLITICAL MEETING AT DRUMMONDVILLE

Hon. L. P. Brodeur Pours Hot Shot Into Nationalist Ranks--Monk and Bourassa Had Hard Time of It--Audience Interrupted Armand Lavergne.

Drummondville, Que., Oct. 28—"Co-ward, poltroon, come up here and I'll attend to your case."

"Down with the marine."
"Hurrah for Laurier."

Amid arguments of a similar nature the nomination of Arthur Gilbert and J. E. Perrault was brought to a successful termination in the basement of the big church here yesterday afternoon. It had been intended to hold an open air meeting, but snow and rain began to fall before noon and those in charge of arrangements had to change the place for the free and independent electors to gather in. The church was the only place which would begin to accommodate the crowd, so to the church they went, the befrosted cure welcoming them gladly.

WAS ONLY INTERESTING

Do not let it be assumed that the meeting was rowdy. It was merely interesting. Jean Baptiste takes his politics seriously and being somewhat emotional by nature, likes to join in the argument or express his approval or disapproval when the spirit moves him. Sometimes the meeting sounded like an explosion in a boiler factory. However, nobody was hurt.

There were no seats save for the newspaper men and for a privileged few on the platform. Not at all daunted, about twelve hundred people stood more or less patiently for four mortal hours while one or another thundered at them. Mr. Perrault was the only one to use any English at all, and he made a distinct hit with what he did use.

CHEERED FOR LAURIER

The crowd was about evenly divided in the matter of sympathy, so far as could be judged by the noise the only speakers who suffered any serious interruption being Mr. Henri Bourassa and his lieutenant, Mr. Armand Lavergne. The finer points in these gentlemen's arguments suffered somewhat by being greeted with tremendous cheers for Laurier.

Each candidate was supported by three speakers, Mr. Perrault, the Laurier candidate, having Hon. L. P. Brodeur, A. M. Beauparlant, M. P., and A. J. Gauthier, M. P., behind him, and Mr. Gilbert being vouched for by Mr. Monk, Armand Lavergne and Mr. Bourassa.

DEBATED NAVY MATTERS

The whole debate turned, of course, on the navy question. "La Marine," as it is called here. The arguments were none of them new, having been threshed out thoroughly in the press months ago.

There was one thing everybody agreed on as they recalled the mud and rain water puddles outside—it was a most appropriate date for talk on the navy.

Mr. Perrault led off. He had been chosen to represent all classes in Drummond and Arthabaska, he said, to carry the banner of the Laurier policy, a policy which had led to peace and prosperity. His opponent said he was not a nationalist and he ought to be ashamed of that. He should come out and fight in his true colors.

CHALLENGED MONK AND BOURASSA

Turning to Messrs. Monk and Bourassa he strode over to them and thundered: "Why had not you the courage to come out at first instead of slinking backward? Why did not you say what you had to say against the marine at the time it was being discussed? You go to the Tories of Ontario and call me a traitor to Canada."

There was a tremendous uproar at this, and it took Mr. Brodeur some time to get it quieted. He briefly outlined the naval scheme and emphasized the fact that service would be purely voluntary.

Hon. Mr. Brodeur, in opening, stated that the naval bill adopted by the Liberals at the last session of Parliament was a measure which did infinite credit to the government. Mr. Brodeur referred to the blood and thunder campaign which was being carried on in the province of Quebec

regarding this naval question, and recalled the fact that the naval propositions advanced by the Conservatives included compulsory service, while the present bill passed by the Liberals made no mention of such conscription.

The speaker then proceeded to explain why the Government had decided to enter upon a naval policy. In the first place Great Britain had recalled all vessels and troops which hitherto had been stationed at Halifax and at Esquimaux. Some sort of force was therefore needed to protect Canadian coasts as well as export trade. Again, a Canadian fleet would, in case of necessity, serve to maintain Great Britain's naval supremacy, should the latter ever be attacked. However, coast defence and protection of export trade were the principal motive which actuated the Government to inaugurate naval proposals.

Taking up another question Mr. Brodeur showed that under the policy of the Government the insurance rates on export products had been diminished by \$6,762,000 in ten years. All this redounded to the good of the farmer. So great had the business of Canada now become that it was necessary to have some means of naval protection.

Such was the effect of the sledge hammer blows that Mr. Brodeur dealt the arguments of his opponents that it was only with the greatest difficulty that Mr. Monk and Mr. Bourassa could make themselves heard.

Mr. Monk, who followed, spoke eloquently, but guardedly. "The Minister has evidently recovered from his illness," he said. "I am not surprised that they are talking of making an admiral of him."

"Canada has no need of a navy," he said, and claimed she needed other aid "To ruin your household and family things much worse."

LAVERGNE'S HARD TASK

Dapper and debonair, Armand Lavergne followed, and had the time of his life to get a hearing. He volunteered to punch one of the interrupters' heads, but it was not till the Cure came to his rescue that the free and independent electors consented to listen.

"If you won't listen to arguments get out; you are my guests," was the emphatic remark of the priest, and some of the noisy ones cooled off for a while. Some of them had to be ejected headfirst, though.

Lavergne wound up with a lachrymose picture of the defenceless Canadian led bleeding to the slaughter like a sheep.

J. Gauthier, M. P., replied to him, and then came Mr. Bourassa, who got a vociferous welcome and equally vociferous interruptions. His speech was to a great extent the same as the one delivered in Montreal the other night. He accused Sir Wilfrid Laurier first of inconstancy, and then of falsehood and falsification of documents.

Today the meeting places are L'Avenir in the forenoon, and Iverton at night. They are several miles apart and not on the railroad, and the candidates are driving to them.

The Liberals feel that the results of the meeting last night will be a victory for their party and their candidate. They hold that the meeting was the crucial point of the whole campaign, and that the success of the Minister of Marine's speech has given them victory already.

SCORES MAINE'S DIVORCE LAWS

Portland, Me., Oct. 27.—The feature of the afternoon session of Maine Charities Congress was an address on Divorce by Prof. Robert B. Sprague, of the University of Maine:

"It seems to me," said the speaker, "that divorce in Maine has reached a point where it needs some attention." The speaker showed that divorce in Maine had increased from 2,511 in the five years following 1877 to 4,389 in the five years following 1902. In the five years following 1867 there were but 26 divorces for intoxication and 527 in the five following 1897.

Habitual intoxication," said the speaker, "is a comparatively easy thing to prove. Maine now has the largest divorce rate of any state east of the Alleghany mountains."

The speaker believed that divorce granted for sufficient cause was a benefit, but, he said, our courts must not permit temporary passion and freakishness to bring moral chaos to a result that may be worked out by limited divorce. The real evil to be combated, he said, is not the divorce evil, but the diseased and unhealthy families. Lax marriages were mentioned as one cause for divorce. He advocated the publication of marriage intentions in the newspapers, and suggested that more premarital, dignity and impressiveness be required in the civil marriage.

Judge Levi Turner, of the Cumberland Supreme Court, spoke on the great need in the state for a reformatory for men and boys. Dr. Hastings H. Hart saw no reason why the state prison could not become a reformatory institution immediately by a system of conditional pardon.

ELEVENTH TRIP TO THE NEW BRUNSWICK WOODS

(St. John Globe.)

Mr. Edwin B. Holmes, a prominent American sportsman, of the Boston leather firm of Parker Holmes & Co., passed through the city Saturday on his trip to the game-abounding Miramichi woods. Mr. Holmes has been a month in the woods on this trip.

"Game in the woods is more plentiful than ever before," said Mr. Holmes to the Globe recently, "owing to the natural increase. More game has been seen this season than ever before, and as a rule the heads are much larger. Last month a lumberman and guide, named Mandeville, shot a moose, I might say, almost at his back door, one with a 6 inch spread, 20 points and a 14 inch blade. Many heads from 50 to 56 inch spreads have been secured up through that country this year. The caribou 14 bull moose, 31 cows and 2 calves; are larger and more plentiful than usual, and deer are increasing rapidly."

"This year," continued Mr. Holmes, "I met with an accident on Oct. 5th, after which I was unable to do much hunting. But during the ten days I was in the woods previous to that I saw 3 bull caribou and 3 cows; also 44 deer, 4 bucks and 40 does. Besides I heard the grunting of 12 bull moose and 5 cows which I did not see. It snowed on Oct. 13 and on the following day there were six inches of snow on the ground. After that the moose ceased to call."

"Ten miles from the camps of Mr. Arthur Pringle, of Stanley, where I camped, some of those who were in the woods saw as many as 30 caribou in one day. Why the guides never saw so many caribou before, and never such big heads. One peculiarity I noted was that there are very few bears in the woods. In fact there is little or no food for them in that vicinity. There is a scarcity of food for animals of all kinds. Hardly a nut of any kind is there in the forests, and the squirrels I think will have a hard winter."

CHINA APPROVES OF BIG U. S. LOAN

Peking, Oct. 29.—An Imperial edict issued today authorizes the proposed loan of \$50,000,000 from the American group of financiers. The bond issue to cover the loan will be taken by the syndicate at 95. The bonds will mature at a period of from 40 to 45 years from issuance. They will bear five per cent interest.

Of the loan \$5,000,000 and possibly \$10,000,000 will be devoted to industrial improvements in Manchuria. A large portion will be used in the extension of the planned currency reform. The guarantees are not yet determined.

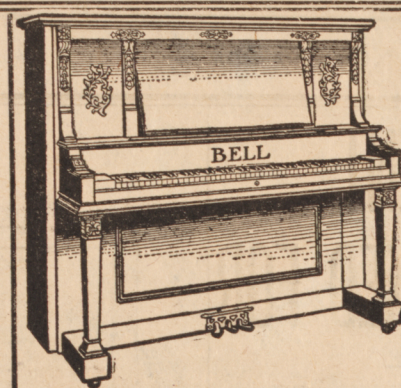
