**THE BILLION BUSHEL  
 NOT SUCH A LONG WAY  
 OFF AS SCEPTICS ASSERT**

When Sir Charles Tupper declared that the Canadian West would be raising 500,000,000 bushels of wheat within ten years of the completion of the Canadian Pacific Railway, the Tories of that day saw nothing of exaggeration in the prediction, while the Liberals stood aghast at the tremendous figures, and greeted it afterwards with inextinguishable laughter. But after all, the Liberals of that time were wrong, and their incredulity arose largely from their knowledge of the general tendency of that statesman towards exaggeration than from disbelief in the country's possibilities. Had almost any of the Tory leaders ventured the statement, it would not have been met with such scornful incredulity. Sir Charles was mistaken only in the matter of time. The half billion bushels will come. The scornful criticisms of Sir Wilfrid's prediction of the coming billion bushel crop, by the Tory press, are shortsighted. The Recorder some time ago cited some figures to show the necessarily rapid expansion of our grain market in Great Britain and Germany during the next two or more generations, and the effect of this expanding market on the growth of Canadian wheat. The United States was also put on the list of wheat buyers in the near future. James J. Hill, then whom there is no higher authority in matters of transportation and the development of natural resources, makes the following calculations regarding the relation between the wheat crop and the growth of population in the United States during the next thirty years or so. In 1882 that country's population was 52,000,000, and its wheat crop 504,000,000 bushels, of which about 190,000,000 were exported. Twenty-five years after this the population had grown to ninety millions, or by 64 per cent. while the wheat raised was 634,000,000 bushels, a gain of only 25 per cent. This left about 65,000,000 for export.

Now these converging lines of production and home consumption must meet somewhere. If the present rate of growth is continued, the year 1950 will see the Republic with a population of 200,000,000. Such a population will require for food and for seed purposes 1,300,000,000 bushels. This is about twice the quantity now grown, and it must be remembered that the United States has no new field to put the plough in, according to Mr. Hill. Practically all the available virgin lands fitted for the wheat are now in cultivation, while the average crop per acre is failing in the older cultivated areas. Mr. Hill is of the opinion that a resort to intensive cultivation and the use of artificial fertilizers will double or treble the product per acre and prove the solution of the problem. This is very unlikely, at any rate within the time mentioned. What is most likely, nay, is almost certain to happen is that the Western farmer who finds his wheat lands running out will gradually take more and more to mixed farming and the scientific rotation of crops. He will find that such forms of agriculture pays him better than the exclusive growing of wheat. Then will come Canada's chance. Her rich prairies, vaster in extent and richer in fertility than similar areas of the Republic, will be in a position to produce the required grain at a very much cheaper rate than the artificially fertilized lands to the south, and will largely supply the American deficiency of 600,000,000 bushels, two or three generations hence. And the deficiency will not remain at this figure for long, but must grow as the discrepancy between population and production becomes even greater. What with the vast demands of Britain and of Germany for wheat, together with the still vaster demands of the United States, it will be surprising if the Dominion wheat fields will not be harvesting a billion bushel crop before the year 1950 arrives. There are young men living today who will see Sir Wilfrid's prediction verified.

**FT. WILLIAM HURT  
 BY DREDGING ORDER**

Suspension of Operations Will Seriously Interfere with Grain Shipments

Fort William, Aug. 30.—Fort William as a whole and individual grain men in various parts of the west are considerably worked up over instructions just received from Ottawa to suspend the dredging operations in the harbor until further notice. If the order is not soon rescinded it will result in throwing scores of men out of employment, and it will mean that no grain can be shipped this fall or next spring from the big new 3,500,000 bushel terminal elevator of the Grand Trunk Pacific, on which large gangs have worked night and day for more than a year, that it might be completed in time to handle its share of the 1910 crop.

If the Mission River is not dredged this fall to a sufficient depth to permit steamers to approach to the Grand Trunk Pacific elevator, there will be little object of the company rushing to completion this year the link between this city and Winnipeg. Under ordinary conditions through trains could be running next month.
