## DR. STERLING OF STANLEY ELECTED PRESIDENT

Union of Municipalities Completes Its  
Labors--Permanent Roads Should be  
Constructed by the Government--Mo-  
tion to Collect Interest on Overdue  
Taxes Defeated After a Warm Debate.

Woodstock, Oct. 20.—The first busi-  
ness taken up this afternoon by the  
Union of Municipalities was the elec-  
tion of officers, which resulted as  
follows:

President, Dr. Sterling, of Stanley;  
Vice-Pres., Mayor McMurdo, of New-  
castle; Sec-Treasurer, J. W. McCready  
of Fredericton; Executive, Mayor R.  
E. Armstrong, of St. Andrews; Coun.  
Henry Scott, of Stonehaven; Ald.  
F. L. Potts, of St. John; Coun. J. E.  
Williams, of Lakeville; Warden C. C.  
Campbell, of Sackville; Mayor C. H.  
Thomas of Fredericton; Mayor D.  
Murray, of Campbellton; S. H. Fle-  
welling, of Hampton; Dr. L. N. Bour-  
que of Moncton.

It was voted that all ex-presidents  
by virtue of their office be members of  
the executive.

Dr. Sterling thanked them for the  
honor of electing him president; his  
election was proof that the cities are  
willing to give in turn the honor of  
holding the presidency of this union  
to the municipalities of which he was  
an humble member.

It was moved by Coun. Scott, of  
Woodstock, seconded by Ald. Potts,  
of St. John.

Whereas a demand prevails through-  
out this province that the pay set by  
law for the services of petit jurors is  
not sufficient, and that the grand jur-

ors should be said for their services,  
and would like to see a resolution pas-  
sed by this union calling the local  
government to remedy this condition

Speeches were made by Couns. Haz-  
en, Scott, Warden H. D. Stevens and  
Mayor Jones of Woodstock; Coun.  
Tompkins, of Peel; Secretary Bliss,  
Secretary McCready and many others.  
The matter stood over for one  
year.

Moved by Coun. Siddall, seconded by  
Ald. Potts:

Whereas, the means of transporta-  
tion is of the greatest importance for  
the development of the natural re-  
sources of the province; and

Whereas, the means of transporta-  
Dominion and Provincial parlia-  
ments have granted very large sub-  
sidies in aid of the construction of  
railways; and

Whereas, the proper construction  
and maintenance of the highways of  
the country are of the most vital im-  
portance to the agricultural and in-  
dustrial development of our prov-  
ince; therefore

Resolved, that in the opinion of this  
convention it would be in the best in-  
terest of the people of New Brun-  
swick for the Provincial government  
to borrow by the issue of debentures  
a sufficient amount to construct per-  
manent highways in the province.

Mayor Jones, Secretary Bliss, May-  
or Armstrong and others spoke, when  
the resolution carried.

Ald. Potts moved, seconded by May-  
or Murray:

Whereas, in our municipalities,  
towns and cities a large percentage  
of rates and taxes is not paid until  
the latter part of year; and

Whereas, the banks charge the mu-  
nicipalities, towns and cities on over-

## ACADIA'S NEW PRESIDENT INAUGURATED

Wolfville, Oct. 20.—The formal in-  
auguration of Rev. George Barton  
Cutten, Ph. D., as president of Ac-  
adia University took place this  
morning.

The inauguration address was de-  
livered by Prof. George Trumbull  
Ladd, L. L. D. of Yale university,  
who had for his subject The Univer-  
sity and State.

Dr. Ladd's discourse was both in-  
teresting and instructive. He show-  
ed the great need of education in  
this age and proved how vitally im-  
portant it is that people should be  
educated. He strongly favors univer-  
sity men entering the legislature.
