MR. HENRY BOURASSA NOW MR. BORDEN'S ALLY

Sir John A. MacDonald, whatever his short-comings along other lines were, was ever and always a worker and wisher for that racial unity with out which Canada can never become a great nation. Toryism today, from the mouth outwards is true to those principles. That is, the Tory press makes a great parade about the importance of creating and cherishing a kindly feeling between French and British Canadians, and is constantly attacking Laurier as one who has been a stumbling block to this unity as a creator of racial divisions and hatreds. It seems--but only seems--strange then to find Mr. Borden's party taking Mr. Bourassa to their hearts. This fiery Gaul has derided and attacked everything which that party professes to praise and revere. He objects to Canada taking any part under any circumstances in the wars of Great Britain. Not a man not a ship, not a rifle is his motto. He gives the British no credit for granting the French Catholics perfect liberty, religious and political, at a time when such a thing was practically unknown. During the South African war he denounced the sending of Canadian contingents. He is now carrying on a campaign asking the French-Canadians to withdraw their money from and have no dealings with the English banks. In short he is leaving no stone unturned to set race against race and creed against creed in Canada. Yet his newspaper Le Devoir is now the official Conservative journal in Quebec and he is almost invariably the chief speaker at every meeting held in the interests of the Conservative party in that province. Is not this silence suspicious one? It looks very like the truth that the Tories have an understood agreement that Ontario will be canvassed by an ultra-British appeal, while Quebec will be left in the hands of Mr. Bourassa to be worked by an ultra-French campaign. If both Provinces are won, the ultra-French and ultra-British forces will unite to form an ordinary Tory government. Such seems the plan of campaign, and a more rascally one, one fraught with disaster to the country has never yet been conceived. But what can be expected from a pack of wolves hungry for office and lean with hope deferred?

DOMINION EXHIBITION GRANT COMES IN FOR CRITICISM

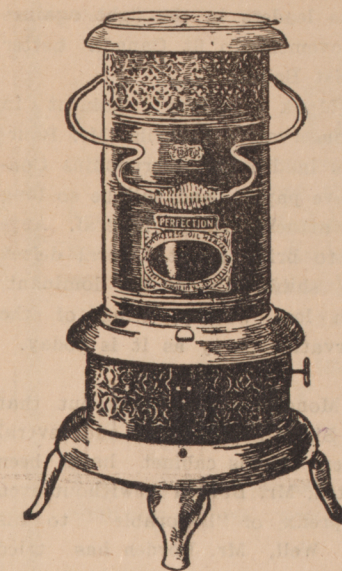
Agricultural Paper Has Something to Say About Recent Fair at St. John, Does not Think Results were Altogether Satisfactory--Last Fredericton Exhibition Had Largest Number of Live Stock Entries.

(Farmer's Advocate) for their annual local event, it was incumbent upon them locally to supply these things; on the other hand, if these places had a plant sufficient for their regular shows, then the additional grounds or buildings required for their one Dominion Exhibition would be needless and unused after the event was past. Similarly with their prize list. To make an exhibition truly national in character demanded an increased prize list over that ordinarily offered by these organizations. To some, this increase over their regular prize list had the appearance of working against the best interests of their show in after years, and consequently was not indulged in to any extent.

Examining the recent Dominion Exhibition held at St. John, N. B., we find that the prizes offered were not large and numerous enough to induce shipment from the Western Provinces especially when there was small chance for supplementary sales of stock. There was a total prize list of \$18,000, of which little, if any more than 70 per cent., or \$13,000, was actually paid to prize-takers; and, of this amount, about \$10,500 was offered on, and about \$7,000 taken by all classes of live stock. There was only a small show of live stock (not enough to take away all the prize-money), because of the conflicting time and meagre prizes offered. In comparison, it is interesting to note that at Fredericton, N. B. show this year advertised a \$20,000 entries of live stock, while at the Dominion Show, at St. John this year, there were only 650. The Halifax show this year advertised a \$20,000 prize list, while the Dominion show offered but a little over \$18,000, and the former offered within \$500 of as much as the latter in live stock. Entries at St. John totaled 95 in horses, 821 in dairy cattle, 144 in sheep, 15 in swine. Such was the live stock exhibit of the Dominion Exhibition this year, and other things were quite up to this standard! If the fair were properly managed this
