## The Democrats Triumphant In United States Elections

**Captured the National House of Representatives and Elected Governors in New York, Massachusetts, New Jersey and Connecticut--A Marked Change in Public Opinion for Which the High Tariff is Said to be Responsible--A Democratic Landslide in New York.**

New York, Nov. 8--Elections held throughout the United States yesterday resulted in a political convulsion of far-reaching extent similar at many points to the famous tidal wave of 1882 and apparently more wide-spread in its effect.

The indications toward midnight were that the national house of representatives had been carried by the Democrats, reversing the present Republican majority of 43.

In New York State, John A. Dix, Democratic candidate for governor, was elected over Henry L. Stimson, Republican, by a plurality of about 55,000, reversing the Republican plurality of 70,000 in 1908 for Governor Hughes.

In New Jersey, Woodrow Wilson, Democratic candidate for governor, is elected over V. M. Lewis, Republican by about 15,000 plurality, reversing the previous Republican majority of over 8,000 for Gov. Fort.

FOSS WINS BY 30,000

In Massachusetts, Eugene N. Foss, Democratic candidate, has defeated Gov. Eben S. Draper, Republican candidate for re-election, by about 30,000 plurality, reversing Governor Draper's former plurality of 8,000.

In Connecticut, Judge Simeon E. Baldwin, Democratic candidate, is elected governor over Charles A. Goodwin, Republican, by about 4,000 plurality, reversing the Republican of 16,000.

In Ohio, Governor Harmon, Democratic candidate for re-election, appears to have carried the state by about 15,000 over Warren G. Harding Republican candidate.

In New Hampshire Robert P. Bass, Republican for governor, is leading Charles E. Carr, Democratic candidate, by about 6,000.

In Pennsylvania, the election of Fohn K. Tener, Republican candidate for governor, is claimed by a large plurality.

In Rhode Island, Governor Pothier, Republican candidate for re-election, is very slightly in the lead, over Lewis A. Waterman, Democratic candidate, with a plurality much reduced from that of 1909.

In Tennessee, the Fusion candidate Ben W. Hoover, is elected by 15,000 plurality.

Democratic governors have been elected in Alabama and South Carolina.

### DEMOCRATS CLAIM IOWA

In Iowa the Democrats claim the election of Claude R. Porter for governor, but this is not yet conceded.

In Wisconsin the election of the Republican candidate for governor, Francis McGovern, is claimed by a reduced plurality and the returns of Senator La Follette to the United States senate is assured.

In Michigan, Chas. S. Osborne, the Republican candidate for governor, appears to have a safe lead over L. T. Hemans, Democrat.

### DEMOCRATS SWEEP NEW YORK

New York, Nov. 8--Returns at 11 o'clock tonight indicate that John A. Dix, Democrat, has been elected governor of New York over Henry L. Stimson, Republican, by between 55,000 and 65,000 plurality.

New York city gives Dix a plurality of at least 100,000. Below Mr. Dix on the ticket the result is uncertain at this hour, although tending toward Democratic success.

In New York city Herbert Parsons, Republican, was defeated for re-election as a representative to congress by J. M. Levy, Democrat, as was Wm. S. Bennett, Republican, by Henry George, Jr.

Theodore Roosevelt's home district in Oyster Bay gave Dix a plurality of 214, as against a plurality of 793 for Hughes in 1908.

In Utica Chas. A. Halcott, Democrat, defeated Millington, Vice-President Sherman's nominee for congress by 3,768.

At 9.20 o'clock Mr. Stimson sent the following telegram to Mr. Dix: "The present returns clearly indicate your election. I congratulate you and send you my good wishes for success of your administration."

### FOSS ELECTED

Boston, Nov. 8--Congressman Eugene N. Foss, a Vermont by birth, a successful Massachusetts business man, until three years ago a staunch Republican, but since then an ardent Democratic leader, was today elected governor of the state by a plurality of 25,000 over Governor Eben S. Draper, the Republican candidate for a third term.

High cost of living, the tariff bill, and several labor measures figured prominently in the election and compassed the Republican defeat.

The Democratic wave has not run high enough up to a late hour tonight to sweep the remainder of the Democratic state ticket into office behind Mr. Foss, but it did reach several congressional districts and was felt decidedly in both branches of the legislature, although not sufficiently to endanger the re-election of Senator Henry Cabot Lodge.

Up to a late hour tonight it looked as if the Republicans had won the first, second, fifth, sixth, eighth, twelfth and thirteenth districts, and that the Democrats had been successful in the third, fourth, ninth, tenth and eleventh districts, leaving the seventh and fourteenth districts in doubt.

Governor Draper early acknowledged his defeat, while the Democrats in this city held a jollification meeting that rocked Faneuil hall almost as vigorously as did the turbulent convention that threatened party disruption four weeks ago.

The day was without particular incident, but the weather encouraged voting and more than 400,000 exercised the right of franchise.

Charles E. Hatfield, chairman of the Republican state committee, issued the following statement shortly before 9 o'clock tonight: "I simply bow to the will of the people. Governor Draper, the defeated candidate, is the best man that ever ran for the office. I believe from the returns that Lieutenant-Governor Frothingham and the rest of our ticket are safe."

"Roosevelt epithets made Republican epitaphs," was the epigram E. Gerry Brown, Democratic candidate for lieutenant-governor four years ago, contributed tonight as the returns indicated the election of Eugene N. Foss as governor.

Senator Henry Cabot Lodge said "I deeply regret the defeat of Governor Draper. I have no further comment to make at this time."

Eugene N. Foss, Democratic candidate for governor, had the following to say at 7 o'clock tonight: "The returns as they have come to me thus far are highly gratifying and would

### HANDICAPPED AT THE START.

The Democrats gained success today after an up-hill fight. They were handicapped at the start because of a bitter wrangle at the state convention which delayed for twelve days the selection of a party candidate for governor. Election day was less than three weeks away when Congressman Foss, who had already gained party honors by a hard fight for the lieutenant-governorship last year, and who overturned the fourteenth district at the bye-election in March, started off to gain the highest political seat in the state.

Governor Draper's margin last year was only 7,934 compared with his plurality of 60,000 at his first election. Mr. Foss, however, carried the issues into nearly every corner of the state and traveled night and day from Chatham to Williamstown, criticizing the Republicans, and holding them responsible for the rise in all the costs of living. Governor Draper denied the responsibility of these advances and defended his two administrations and especially the business of the state which, he said, had been conducted honestly and economically.

But the people's pockets proved too sensitive to keep the Republicans in office and the overthrow which began in Maine two months ago continued in Massachusetts today. It was not a landslide, but it was a sound thrashing for the Republicans. The day was ideal for voting, the weather being cool and crisp.

It is many years since Massachusetts has seen so many congressional districts in doubt, and it was well toward midnight before even the complexion of the delegation to the sixty-second congress could be determined.

### BOSTON'S MAJORITY FOR FOSS.

Boston, Nov. 8--Leading as the standard bearer of the Democratic landslide which swept over the state, Boston gave E. N. Foss for governor a plurality of 27,265, or more than 8,000 greater than James H. Vahey secured here last year, gave increased pluralities to the three congressmen elected in metropolitan districts, and cut down the local Republican representation in the state legislature by one representative. Thos. Cassidy, Democratic candidate for lieutenant-governor, ran behind the head of the ticket in the city, his plurality being around 20,000.

William F. Murray, a member of the governor's council, was elected to congress in the ninth district.

James M. Curley (Dem.) won out in the tenth, where Congressman Jos. H. O'Connell (Dem.) failed of renomination, and Andrew J. Peters (Dem.) was re-elected in the eleventh district.
