VACCINE DISCOVERED THAT WILL CURE DEADLY CANCER

Successful Experiments Made with it in
Manila and in San Francisco--Dr.
Phillip K. Gilman Discover of New
Vaccine.

San Francisco, Sept. 28.—Dr. Phillip K. Gilman's vaccine treatment and cure for cancer, which was tried on two patients in the Southern Pacific Hospital here last Saturday, is fully explained in a scientific bulletin which was made public today. It states that the new discovery has proved successful in almost every case.

The bulletin is issued by the Bureau of Science in Manila, P. I., and is entitled, "The Scientific Treatment of Carcinoma." It deals with the advance experiments made by Dr. Gilman and Arthur F. Coca, pathologist in the Manila bureau. The preparation of the vaccine, its application and its subsequent effects, are described in the most technical detail.

The new cancer cure contrasts most sharply with other treatments for this disease, in that it is obtained from the very tumor it heals. Every cancer victim, therefore, is made a most important part of the laboratory.

HOW FEAT IS ACCOMPLISHED.

The part of the tumor which is cut off for the preparation of the vaccine, is immediately cut into the smallest possible bits with a pair of scissors. They are then passed ten times through grinders, for the purpose of breaking up the tissue threads. Meantime the same amount of sterile solution is added.

A sort of creamy fluid is the result of the process, even in order that it may not contain even the smallest shred of tissue the liquid is spun around with great rapidity and then most carefully decanted. The vaccine is injected subcutaneously. Dr. Gilman says that the injection is preferably made within six hours after a dilute solution of carbolic acid has been added.

The disappearance of the cancerous growths, which is noted in most cases within three days after treatment, must be looked upon as a remarkable phenomenon, Dr. Gilman says. According to all past theories the injection of large quantities of tumor material should have increased instead of diminished the symptoms.

INJECTIONS EVERY TWO WEEKS

The action of the vaccine appears to be that of forming a multitude of anti agents absorbed by the tumor cells. "The national treatment," says the cancer specialist, "in cases where large tumor masses have to be left in the body would be to inject successively at intervals of two weeks large quantities of tumor material." These injections vary from five to ten grams of vaccine.

The efficiency of the treatment depends largely on the stage to which the tumor growth has advanced. The quicker action taken, the more easily the work is accomplished.

As a result of his experiments Dr. Gilman encountered many phases of the disease that will require much more study to comprehend perfectly. In one case, for example, a rapidly growing lump appeared near the tumor, which had been cut for the vaccine. After attaining a remarkably size the growth ceased. The microscope later showed that its cells were dying.

Two other cases in which not all the cancer tissue had been cut for the preparation of the vaccine remained from five to six months free from any recurrence of the disease. "In only one case," says Dr. Gilman, "has the disease reappeared after treatment." This was because the vaccination had been rendered inert by a too strong disinfectant.

**LORD PENTLAND
WILL BE GOVERNOR
OF AUSTRALIA**

Was Secretary to Lord Aberdeen
While Latter was Governor-General
of Canada.

London, Sept. 27.—Honors are falling thick upon the shoulders of Lord Pentland. He has been elevated to the peerage, the last honor given by King Edward, and now he is to be Governor-General of Australia in the place of Lord Dudley.

Lord Pentland married a daughter of Lord Aberdeen, to whom at one time he was aide-de-camp. He has been a soldier, county councillor a member of Parliament, a social philanthropist, founding many institutions for the benefit of the East End poor, and a Liberal whip.

Lord Pentland and Lady Pentland are both known in Canada. Lord Pentland then plain John Sinclair, spent two years at Ottawa as secretary to Lord Aberdeen. Lady Pentland, then known as Lady Marjorie Gordon, was at Rideau Hall with her parents during Lord Aberdeen's term as Governor-General.

Lord Pentland's appointment will be particularly interesting to Canadians in view of the fact that he acted as private secretary to Lord Aberdeen, Governor-General of Canada in 1895. He was born in 1860 the son of the late Captain George Sinclair and was educated at Edinburgh Academy Wellington and Sandhurst. He married in 1904 Lady Marjorie Gordon, daughter of the seventh Earl of Aberdeen.

Lord Pentland served in the Sudan expedition in 1897. He represented Dumfriesshire from 1892 to 1895, when he was defeated by A. Wylie M. P. (Con)

LEAGUE TEAM WILL
PEAY THE ATHLETICS**

Cleveland, Ohio, Sept. 29.—The world's series between the Cubs and the Athletics may start on October 15, according to an announcement made by Secretary Robert McRoy, of the American League. That is, however, if President Murphy, of the Cubs will wind up his season with St. Louis, on October 13, as he stated yesterday in Chicago. Otherwise the series will not start until October 17th. A meeting of the National Commission will probably be held Monday, when the matter will be settled.

THE ALL-STAR TEAM.

Mr. McRoy's visit here was to sign up Outfielder Power and First Baseman Stahl, of Boston, as members of the All-Star American League team, which will meet the Athletics in five-game series, starting October 10. This series will be played providing the world's series does not start until October 17th.

THE LINE-UP.

McRoy announced the full line-up of the team at follows:
Ainsmith and Street, of Washington, catchers.

Stahl, Boston, first base.
McBride, Washington, second base.
McBride, Washington, short stop.
Lord, Chicago, third base.
Speaker, Boston; Milan, Washington; and Cobb, Detroit, outfielders.
Johnson, Washington; White and Walsh, Chicago, pitchers.

All of these players have now been signed up but Walsh and Cobb, and Hess are expected to be signed tomorrow. No Cleveland or New York players were selected, as these two teams will participate in post season games.

The all-star team will be led by Manager McAleer, of Washington. The object of the series is to give the Athletics all the necessary practice during the week interval between the closing of the American League season and the start of the world's series. The proceeds will be split even, between both leagues and all players will share alike.
