## FREDERICTON CITY RUGBY CLUB ORGANIZED LAST NIGHT

A. R. Babbitt Captain of Team—Intention is to Play First Game Against U. N. B. on Saturday October 8th.

The Fredericton City Rugby Football Club was re-organized at a meeting held at the Queen Hotel last night. The meeting was not as largely attended as it should have been, but several who were unavoidably detained, were present in the spirit. Officers were elected and arrangements made for practice. It is expected that the first match game of the season will be played against U. N. B. on Saturday, October 8th.

The officers of the club elected last night were:

Captain, A. R. Babbitt.

Manager, C. W. Clark.

Treasurer, H. G. Deedes.

It was decided to adopt the old Fredericton colors, Red and White, as the club colors. The manager was instructed to get quotations on jerseys and stockings and to order a sufficient number to equip the team. The club jersey will be white with a broad red band about the waist. The stockings will be white with a red band.

Prof. Day, who made a most efficient chairman, suggested that it might be possible to have a cup donated for competition between the Fredericton City and U. N. B. teams. It was decided that the officers of the club be a committee to take the matter up. It is likely that the banks of the city will be approached in the matter.

The manager was instructed to open correspondence with teams in other places with a view to getting games with them. It is likely that Acadia, Moncton and the St. John teams will be asked for practice.

A full team practice will be held at Scully's Grove on Saturday afternoon and before that date some of the players will practice on their own account. It is the intention to have a practice game against a team picked from U. N. B. on Wednesday next, and a match game on the Saturday following.

Fredericton has not had a senior team worthy of the name since 1903. The effort to revive the game here should be well supported.

## STARTLE WAS BIG NOISE ON GRAND CIRCUIT YESTERDAY

Joan Came Back with Three Straight Heats Over Dudie Archdale—The Harvester Again.

Columbus, O., Sept. 28.—Startle, a Michigan gelding, which is raced by Joe Gahagan, of Toledo, astonished an overflow crowd at the grand circuit races today, by winning the first two and necessary heats of the 2:09 trot, from a high grade field, in which General H. was thought to have the best chances. Startle's time in the first heat was 2:05½.

Joan, winner over Dudie Archdale last week in two of three heats, made it three straight today, when they met for the Buckeye stake of \$5,000. In the first two heats Joan did the trail and showed the best speed when sprinting started, after the half was passed. The final half of the first mile was in 1:01½. The fast quarter, with the two mares all but lapped throughout, was made in thirty seconds. Joan won by a whip's length. The next finish was not so close. In the third heat, Dudie Archdale tried coming from behind, but was pocketed by Baron Penn.

Grace was the choice and a handy winner in the 2:13 pace.

Border Guard was singled out to win the second division of the 2:19 trot but the award went to Betsy G., in straight heats and slow time.

Tomorrow The Harvester will start in an attempt to lower the world's stallion trotting record of 2:01.

Proposed That Two Leagues be Organized in Province and Winners Play Off.

St. John is talking hockey and it is suggested that leagues be organized on the North Shore and on the Southern part of the province. There is to be a meeting tomorrow night for the formation of a St. John hockey team.

MYSTERIOUS FEMALE  
HORSE THIEF APPEARS  
IN WESTERN STATE

Spokane, Sept. 28.—A young woman horse thief has the authorities of Colville County mystified. The girl who is apparently but little over twenty years old, tall and of striking appearance, has made away with nearly a dozen good horses in the last fortnight.

Some of the teams have been taken by her directly from stables, while others have been hired and never returned. On several occasions she has been traced to points near the Canadian border, and it is believed that she has confederates who assist her in getting the stolen animals across the line.

Her latest and boldest theft is reported from Ione. Thursday she hired a saddler, but later returned, claiming that the animal was not as good as she wished to ride.

She then engaged the best horse in the stable for Friday, but failed to return. She was traced to a point near Metaline, but has evidently succeeded in crossing the border into the East Kootenay Mountains with her latest prize.

EUROPE MAY COPY  
LEMIEUX LABOR ACT

London, Sept. 28.—Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, interviewed at Paris, said that during his stay he found that the different countries of Europe are following with close attention Canada's industrial disputes investigation act.

Mr. King has had many inquiries from public men as to the working of the act, and measures drafted along similar lines will be introduced in France and Sweden.

Mr. King added that legislation of Canada with respect to combines and trusts had created considerable interest. One or two Ministers had expressed their intention of sending special investigators to Canada to report to their Government on the working of the Canadian laws.

CUT HIS CORK LEG  
TO SAVE HIS LIFE

Youngstown, O., Sept. 28.—An ax vigorously wielded by Thomas Edwards, a cab driver, cut off a leg of William J. Shaw, Erie fireman here, and liberated him from the debris of a wreck when an engine was sidetracked by a passenger coach near the Erie depot.

Shaw and the engineer, H. N. Vail were caught in the wreckage, and both were badly scalded. Shaw was held in the debris by his leg, and the use of the ax probably saved his life. The leg was cork.

AGED GROOM WED IN BANK VAULT

Roanoke, Va., Sept. 28.—In the vaults of the National Exchange Bank and in the presence of President J. B. Fishburn and other officials of the institution, W. P. Snidow and Miss Rose Price of Montgomery County, Va., were made man and wife.

The groom is eighty years old, while the bride gave her age as thirty. Mr. Snidow came to the bank and asked that a minister be sent for. This was done, and the ceremony was performed immediately.

Following the marriage Mr. Snidow deposited \$2,000 to his wife's credit and the couple left to attend the fair.
