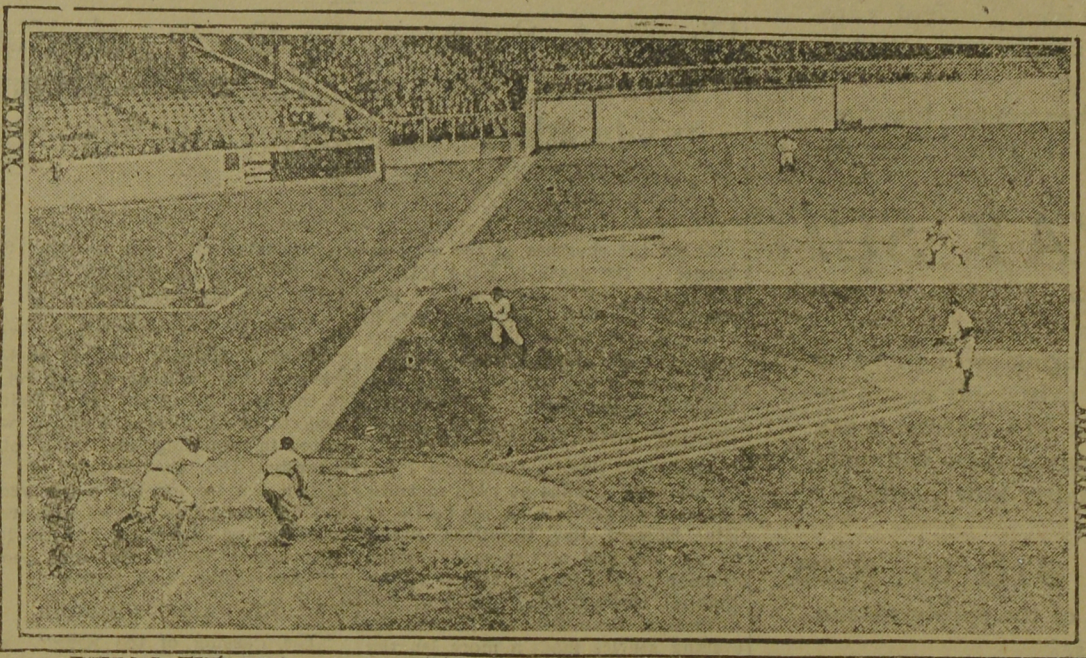

## CAMERON RACES CORKERY TONIGHT

Five Mile Race at Amherst—Will Run in Halifax Wednesday Night—Amherst Track Overlength.

Halifax, May 8.—Fred L. Cameron, of Amherst, and J. Corkery, of Toronto, will run a five-mile race at Amherst tomorrow night for the championship of Canada.

On Wednesday the same two will meet in Halifax on an indoor ten-lap track for a cup offered by the Arena. In this race Patterson, of Dartmouth who last year beat Cameron, and Rogers and Palmer, of Halifax, will also be competitors. Cameron had a comparatively easy win when he defeated Corkery in the ten-mile race, but in these shorter distances, the result may be different.

Mathieson who is a civil engineer and member of the Canadian Society of civil engineers, went to the auditorium this morning, and measured the track accurately, and reported that instead of being short that it over-ran 12 feet to the lap. ### FAMOUS HORSE SOLD

The Canadian bred chestnut horse Gold Ring, at one time a famous trotter in the United States, known as "The Guidless Wonder," was sold at Albridge's mar., London, yesterday for twenty guineas (\$105).
