LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR TO
BE SWORN IN TOMORROW

Ceremony to be Performed in Legislature Chamber by Chief Justice—Executive Council Also to Take Oath.

In compliance with instructions received in the despatch through the Secretary of State the Lieutenant Governor will take the oath of allegiance before the Chief Justice in the legislative chamber on Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock. His Honor will then administer the oath to all the members of the Executive Council.

This evening a special edition of The Royal Gazette will be issued. This edition will contain the telegram of condolence sent by the Lieutenant Governor to the Royal Family through the Governor General and also a proclamation concerning the death of King Edward and the accession of George V.

Telegrams from the Secretary of State, Charles Murphy, have been received here by Private Secretary R. S. Barker on the behalf of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor. These telegrams contain the official announcement of the late King's death, the accession of George V and instructions for the observation of today with the ceremonies usually marking the coming of a sovereign to the throne. In obedience to these instructions the Union Jack was hoisted to the masthead on the Officers' Square today. As there is no artillery here no salute was fired.

The City Council met Saturday afternoon and decided to engage Mr. Norman A. Edgecombe to drape the entrance to the City Hall with purple and black and also to drape the council chamber and Mayor's Office. This draping is being done today.

A committee consisting of His Worship the Mayor, Ald. Clark and the City Clerk was appointed by the council and drafted and forwarded to the Governor General the following telegram:

May 7, 1910.
To His Excellency the Governor General, Ottawa.

The mayor and aldermen of the city of Fredericton, New Brunswick, on behalf of themselves and citizens of this city most respectfully desire your excellency to convey to Queen Alexandra and the Royal Family their profound sorrow and grief occasioned by the sudden demise of our noble and illustrious sovereign King Edward VII, with the undoubted assurance of their continued and devoted loyalty to the Crown of Great Britain and to his present Majesty King George V.

WILLIAM JENNINGS
DIED THIS MORNING

Pneumonia Caused Death in Few Hours—A Well Known and Prominent Business Man—Deceased was Native of Ireland.

Fredericton lost one of its most respected citizens this morning when William Jennings passed away after a severe attack of pneumonia. The late Mr. Jennings although of late not in the best of health was able to be out on Sunday and attended mass at St. Dunstan's church yesterday morning. Pneumonia set in last night and death took place shortly after ten o'clock this morning.

The deceased was seventy-six years of age and was a native of Ireland. He left the country of his birth at an early age and went to Boston, Mass. In 1872 he came to Fredericton and went into business with the late Mr. McPeake. Seven years later he established a merchant tailoring business of his own in the premises now occupied by McMurray & Co. A few years ago he removed to the store in which he conducted business up to the time of his death.

The deceased since coming to Fredericton has been one of the city's most prominent business men and was a most exemplary citizen. His death comes as a great shock to the community.

He is survived by one son, Mr. John T. Jennings of Colwell & Jennings. Mrs. Arthur J. Ryan is an adopted daughter.

The hour of the funeral has not been definitely set but it is likely that High Mass of Requiem will be celebrated at St. Dunstan's church, Wednesday morning. Friends of the deceased and family are requested not to send flowers.
