UHLAN BROKE WORLD'S RECORD MILE TO WAGON

Covered Distance in 2.01 Flat at Cleveland Yesterday--Favorites won in Races.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Aug. 8--

The opening here of the second annual meeting at North Randall track and the third week of grand circuit racing today was signalized by the breaking of a world's record, Uhlman, driven by his owner, C.K.C. Billings, trotted a mile to a wagon in 2.01 flat thereby setting a new mark for trotting geldings.

It was apparent that the son of Bingen and Blorde was out to make history when the first quarter was passed and the oar showed his time to be 30 1/2. When the half and three quarter poles were passed and the black had not faltered for an instant the big crowd stood up and begged him to beat his old mark of 2.02 1/2. He responded nobly and clipped 1 1/2 seconds off his record.

Baltimore is the best hitting Eastern League Club, with a team average of .241. Buffalo is second, with .242. That shows that something more than hitting is needed to win games. It is another case of Buckenberger's Bronchos in 1907. The other clubs follow in this order: Toronto, Newark, Rochester, Montreal, Jersey City, Providence.

Dave Brain, ex-Bison, is again out of a job. Word has just been received from St. Paul that Mike Kelley of the Saints has given his general utility player his unconditional release. When he left Buffalo, Dave joined St. Paul and during his stay substituted in the outfield, behind the bat and at the third and second base position. Parkin a few days ago fractured his ribs at Toronto, where the Indians were playing a series.

With McGraw's two most reliable pitchers out of the way, it is up to the Leon Ames or Young Drucker to help even up the series.

Three hits out of four trials was his record Wednesday. One of them was a bunt of the perfect variety.--New York American.
