WILL PAVE TWO BLOCKS OF QUEEN STREET WITH TARVIA

Ald. Mitchell's Report on Paving Adopted Without Discussion--James Roberts Appointed Server of Tax Notices After Long Debate--Local Improvement Association Criticized--Invitation Extended to Summer School of Science.

Tarvia is to be the material used for permanent street making in Fredericton this year. The City Council, in regular monthly session last night decided to lay pavement of the kind mentioned on Queen Street, between St. John and Regent Streets, and between York and Westmorland Streets. There was little discussion on this matter, Ald. Mitchell's report being taken as read. The item of business which caused the longest debate was the appointment of Mr. James Roberts as server of tax notices. Four of the aldermen were of the opinion that Mr. Hedley Vanwart, the collector of taxes, was the man who should serve the notices, and that they had understood that he was to do so when he was given the collectorship. During the evening the Local Improvement Association came in for severe criticism from Ald. Walker. The usual grant of \$300 was voted the Association, however. The council also decided to invite the Summer School of Science to hold a session here in 1911, promising a grant of \$150.

Those present were His Worship the Mayor, Ald. Mitchell, Ald. Weddall, Ald. Vanwart, Ald. Walker, Ald. Hooper, Ald. Osborne, Ald. Calder, Ald. Jewett and Ald. Clark.

After the reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting, His Worship brought up the matter of the public observance of mourning as a result of the death of King Edward. It was decided that the reply of the Secretary of State to the telegram of condolence from the City of Fredericton be entered in the minutes.

The auditor's report on expenditures for the month was then considered and passed. It was as follows:

MONTHLY SALARIES.

The monthly pay of the city officials and employees was voted, on motion of Ald. Clark, seconded by Ald. Calder.

MUNICIPAL HOME.

Ald. Jewett reported that the Municipal Home department had a balance of \$37.25. He recommended that a cheque for \$150 be issued in favor of Commissioner Boone. The recommendation was adopted on motion of Ald. Hooper.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Ald. Walker reported verbally on behalf of the Fire Department. He stated that at the request of Chief Rutter, a special committee consisting of Ald. Mitchell, Ald. Calder, and himself had been appointed to take up certain matters. The new horse purchased for use with the ladder truck was perfectly satisfactory. Alterations in its harness were necessary, however. The committee recommended new plumbing for No. 4 Hose Station. Arrangements had been made for the relief of the permanent drivers of the department on Sundays during the summer months. A temporary platform to be placed over the gutter in front of the Central Hose Station, had also been procured. It had been laid by the firm, Architect Brodie & St. John, had offered to prepare plans for the new station.

Ald. Weddall seconded the motion of Ald. Walker to adopt the report. In reply to Ald. Hooper, Ald. Walker said their had been no special

complaint against the new horse. It was a credit to the department.

Ald. Jewett stated that he was glad the mare had been so satisfactory. Some members of the Fire Department had done all they could to put the mare to the test and made boasts that they would do it. The report of Ald. Walker was adopted.

On the motion of Ald. Walker, seconded by Ald. Hooper, leave of absence for Chief Rutter and twenty-four men on July 4th in order to attend a celebration at Houlton, Me., was granted.

PERMANENT PAVEMENT.

Ald. Mitchell reported on behalf of the special committee on permanent pavement's. The report was adopted without reading.

Ald. Mitchell, seconded by Ald. Osborne, moved that Tarvia pavement be laid on Queen Street between York and Westmorland Streets, and between St. John and Regent Streets.

The motion was carried. A resolution expressing the gratitude of the council to the engineers and other officials of the towns visited by the special committee for the kindness shown the members of that committee, was passed.

A communication from Mr. Peter Farrell expressing the thanks of his family for the kindness shown them by the city Council and officials during its bereavement was received.

Another application from the Moncton Manufacturing Company for assistance from the city was received. The City Clerk explained that any company requiring such assistance according to law must give public notice of such application thirty days in advance. He had informed the secretary-treasurer of the company, that such was the case.

The application was received and filed.

LOCAL IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION

On the motion of Ald. Weddall the usual grant of \$300 to the Local Improvement Association was voted. Ald. Walker said he did not oppose the grant but he voiced the opinion of many in saying that the city could make the money go farther than the association. Many things done by the Local Improvement Association were not satisfactory to the public. One instance of lack of economy on the part of the Improvement Association was the grading of the front of the old burial ground. To grade one half of that front had cost the Improvement Association \$300. The city had almost completed grading the other half without the cost of a cent.

Ald. Mitchell thought the Road Department should be credited with the labor at the old burial ground. He also thought the Local Improvement Association was doing good work. He said it could be given a larger grant. Ald. Weddall said that the great improvement made in Fredericton in the appearance of private grounds was directly due to the efforts of that association. It deserved encouragement.

ALD. WALKER CRITICIZES

Ald. Walker replied that he would not oppose the grant but would criticize the association. The West End fountain was useless from lack of water. It had cost \$200 and yet was of no use. That was work of the Improvement Association.

It was pointed out to the aldermen that it was the city's duty to turn the water on.

Ald. Hooper supported the Local Improvement Association. It was doing good work grading the grounds of Victoria Hospital.

THE TEMPLE FOUNTAIN.

Ald. Clark called attention to the discreditable condition of the Temple Fountain. Ald. Mitchell stated that the matter was to be attended to at once.

Ald. Hooper thought something should be done to improve street crossings.

TO SERVE TAX NOTICES.

On the motion of Ald. Clark, Mr. James Roberts was appointed server of tax notices.

Ald. Jewett and Ald. Weddall said they thought Mr. Hedley Vanwart when appointed tax-collector was also to be server of tax notices.

Ald. Hooper was of like opinion. Ald. Jewett said it was getting fashionable for city officials to draw their salaries and have others do their work.

ALD. CLARK EXPLAINS.

Ald. Clark said that Mr. Vanwart was an excellent official but was not receiving sufficient salary to assume the duties of server of tax notices. When Mr. Vanwart was appointed it was stated that the matter of appointing a server of notices would be taken up later. Ald. Vanwart expressed the same opinion. Ald. Calder said he had understood that Mr. Vanwart was to be notice-server. However he would say that Mr. Vanwart was the best collector the city ever had (Hear! Hear!) Perhaps it would be better to have Mr. Roberts serve notices this year and help Mr. Vanwart in this branch of the duties.

Ald. Clark had no doubt that Mr. Roberts would give every assistance to the collector. Ald. Mitchell supported the appointment of Mr. Roberts.

Ald. Hooper said that if the finance committee was not of one mind on this subject he could not support the motion.

Ald. Weddall repeated the statement that he had thought Mr. Vanwart was to serve notices as well as collect taxes. However if the general feeling was that the duties of the collector were too onerous for him to assume the duties of server of notices he would agree to appoint another official.

ALD. HOOPER'S AMENDMENT.

In amendment Ald. Hooper seconded by Ald. Jewett moved that collector of taxes be also server of notices.

Ald. Clark stated that Mr. Vanwart had already collected enough taxes to pay his salary had he been on a commission basis. He thought perhaps the matter should have been considered in committee before coming to council.

ALD. JEWETT PROTESTS.

Ald. Jewett could not see why the collector should be relieved of part of his duties because he had proved to be a good official. Ald. Clark stated that the collector desired to take a trip on private business which would take him from the city three weeks or more. The business of the office could be carried on best by appointing Mr. Roberts as server of notices.

Ald. Jewett could not see that this was a reason for relieving the collector of part of his duties.

ANOTHER AMENDMENT.

In amendment to the amendment, Ald. Weddall moved that the matter got to the Finance Committee. There was no second. Ald. Walker said he would support the motion.

Ald. Calder said he would vote for the collector to serve the tax notices. The amendment was lost on the following vote:

Yes—Hooper, Jewett, Calder, Weddall, Nay—Osborne, Clark, Vanwart, Mitchell, Walker.

SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE.

The matter of a grant for the Summer School of Science in 1911 was brought up by His Worship. It was generally recognized by the aldermen that a session of the school in Fredericton would be an advertisement for the city. It was decided to extend an invitation to the school to hold a session here next year and a grant of \$150 was offered.

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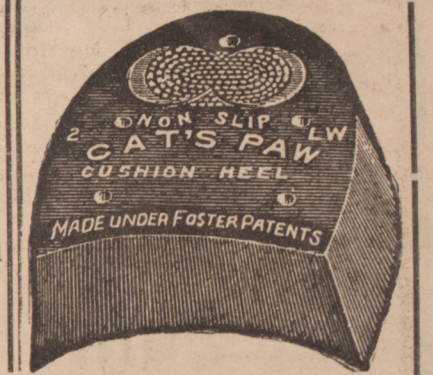
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
