## LUNENBURG TORIES

(Continued from page two.)

Dublin Township which is part of the County of Lunenburg upon the understanding that after the election, when the time limited for filing an election petition and the time limited for taking any proceedings for corrupt or illegal acts should expire that the said candidate Charles Edwin Kaulback would repay the said amount and that in the meantime a note from members of the committee would be given the plaintiff as collateral security.

## SIGNED THE NOTE

(4) After such arrangement had been made with the plaintiff, the defendants were requested by the members of the committee who had interviewed the plaintiff, to sign a note in favor of the plaintiff for the sum of eighteen hundred dollars. The defendant signed the said note upon the verbal understanding and condition that they, the defendants, were not to be personally liable upon said note and that it was only to be given as collateral security to the plaintiff for such loan or advance as the plaintiff might make to the committee or to the said candidate, to tide over the situation until after the election when the advance or loan made by the plaintiff would be repaid by the candidate, or money would be secured from the candidate to pay the said loan or advance.

## WHY MONEY WAS RAISED

(5) The said loan or advance made by the plaintiff was made for illegal purposes and in contravention of the Dominion Elections Act then in force in Canada and for the following purposes, namely:—

To pay back bills incurred by the workers of the Conservative party at previous elections which it was represented if not paid would injure the said Charles Edwin Kaulback at the said election then pending;

To be used in inducing persons to vote for the said Charles Edwin Kaulback at said election;

To be used to induce persons to refrain from voting for the said Alexander Kenneth MacLean, the other candidate at said election;

To be used in hiring teams to convey voters to the polls at said election;

To purchase and secure a supply of liquor and refreshments to be used at the said election;

And to be used in various other corrupt or illegal ways at said election.

(6) The plaintiff advanced or loaned the said money as aforesaid for the purpose aforesaid, and the defendants signed the note sued upon at the request of the other members of the said committee and upon the verbal understanding and condition that the defendants should not be called upon to pay same, and said note was delivered to the plaintiff by a member of the committee, other than defendants as collateral security for the loan made or to be made by the plaintiff.

## WAS USED CORRUPTLY

(7) The money so obtained from the plaintiff was actually used for illegal and corrupt purposes at said election.

(8) No part of the said money so advanced or loaned by the plaintiff was received by the defendants or either of them.

(9) The plaintiff was aware of all the foregoing matters and things.

(10) In pursuance of the said verbal agreement made with the plaintiff with reference to the said loan or advance, the plaintiff, after the election and after the time had expired for filing an election petition, requested repayment of the said loan from the said candidate Charles Edwin Kaulback and at various times thereafter by himself and his agents, endeavored to obtain repayment of the said loan from the said Charles Edwin Kaulback but before final arrangements were made by the said Charles Edwin Kaulback to repay said loan, the said Charles Edwin Kaulback died, whereupon the plaintiff by himself and his agents endeavored to obtain payment from the executors of the said Charles Edwin Kaulback's last will and testament under representations that the said Charles Edwin Kaulback was personally responsible for the making of said loan by the plaintiff, that the loan was made to and for and on behalf of said Charles Edwin Kaulback and at his request and that the executors should recognize the said loan as a claim against the estate. Upon the refusal of the executors to pay said claim, the plaintiff demanded payment of the said note from the defendants in violation of the arrangement under which the said note had been given. The plaintiff is estopped from claiming the amount of said note from defendants.

Toronto, June 6.—Heaving head downward by one arm and a leg, caught between the elevator and the wall, fourteen-year-old Albert Parker was found in the office of the Standard Silver Plating Company.
