TWO DROWNING TRAGEDIES TOOK PLACE YESTERDAY

Tragic End to Sunday Outings--Five Drowned and Eight Saved--Newsboys on Picnic Nearby Made Gallant Rescues After a Hard Struggle--One of Four Men in Party Perished in Same Waters.

Warren, R. I., Aug. 28--Two drowning accidents in which five persons lost their lives and eight others were rescued some of them in such a state of exhaustion they were resuscitated with difficulty were recorded here today.

The accidents happened within an hour of each other the first soon after 5 o'clock and the other, in which four persons lost their lives, a little later in the evening.

The first accident happened at Kelly's Bridge, near the Junction of the Warren and Talmers rivers. Five young men all residents of Warren, had been spending the afternoon boating on the river and were on their way home. As they neared the bridge the tide was running out with considerable speed, and as they sought to navigate the heavily loaded craft through the narrow draw it got beyond their control. A moment later the boat struck the piling and was turned, throwing all of the occupants into the water.

The rescuers, a crew from the United States life saving station a short distance away reached the place as the men, almost exhausted, were about to give up the fight.

All of the men were in a serious condition when they finally reached shore, and some time was spent over them by the life savers and others before it was assured that they were out of danger.

FOUR MORE DROWNED.

Hardly more than an hour later a party of nine Portuguese picnickers, who left Fall River early in the day for an outing on the river, were overturned in Mount Hope Bay and four of them drowned. The party were in a small motor boat and were about to start for home when it started to rain. The motor boat had no awning and as it could not run up to

shore on account of the shallowness of the river, the entire party started to climb into the small tender behind to row ashore.

Eight of them had got into the frail little craft in safety and taken their seat when the ninth, one of the women of the party climbed aboard and the craft was overturned. A moment more and all were struggling in the water, women, clasping their babies with one hand and trying to hold onto the men with the other and all shouting lustily for help. The same rain which had brought disaster to the picnickers brought rescuers to the scene, for a short distance away the Fall River newsboys had been engaged in a Sunday baseball game when the pattering drops drove them to shelter and incidentally brought them within earshot of the drowning people.

NEWSBOYS TO THE RESCUE.

Three of the newsboys, Abraham Tinkoff, Edward Ney and Max Friedman, dove into the water and a moment after were foreigners apart and effect the rescue of some of them. Tinkoff grabbed one of the women and started for shore, with her. As he did Manuel Muniz, believing that he was about to sink for the last time grabbed the boy's leg and the latter was being rapidly dragged down when the boy, realizing that it was his only hope, drew off and kicked the man square in the jaw. Muniz's hold relaxed and a moment later he sank from sight while the boy succeeded in dragging the woman ashore after much difficulty. Meanwhile the others had rescued four members of the party. By this time other help had arrived, one of the leaders being E. D. Hardy, of New York, a summer visitor at Warren Neck. He and other men aided the boys in caring for the rescued persons.

RUNAWAY PLUNGED INTO DISUSED PIT

Joliet Ill., Aug. 27--Mrs. A. Johnson wife of a building contractor and her two year old daughter were drowned and Johnston and his six year old son barely escaped death last night in a runaway. The carriage plunged into an abandoned quarry half full of water.

Johnson swam to a ledge with the boy but when he returned for his wife and daughter they had sunk.

THREE KILLED, THREE INJURED

Marianna Ark. Aug. 29--Two negroes were instantly killed and three others injured while John Russell, a white man was fatally shot at a dance at Raggo yesterday. News reached Marianna nearly two hours later when a negro came for coffins. Russell attempted to end a quarrel between Mary Harvey and his wife. Russell left the dance hall and when he returned with two officers to arrest Harvey, Harvey started shooting. More than fifty shots were fired.

HYGIENE IN SCHOOLS

Strongly Supported at Physician's Convention
--School Lighting Criticised

Sherbrooke, Aug. 27--At the French-Canadian physicians convention here Dr. Jean P. Decarie of Montreal gave the first address on the programme drawn up for the congress, on 'The teaching of hygiene in the schools.'

The study of hygiene he stated, furnished the citizens of this country the opportunity to live in the most favorable surroundings.

'It is very important' he asserted 'to know if the teaching of this important subject is of the best. In our province the organizers of the course of hygiene taught in schools are the members of the Council of Public Instruction. It is the duty of this Council to direct the course of training for mental development, and it is also their duty to see that the physical side of life is kept normal and to make the teachers teach the kind of hygiene that will make the children strong in body when they go out into the world. Our duty as medical men is to place at the disposal of the Council the fruit of our labor in this connection.'

'Today the study of hygiene is a part of every school's curriculum. We are now studying the means of teaching hygiene in the schools, the importance attached to it and the results obtained.'

He contended that it should have an important place in the course of study, and in his remarks he was dealing with it from a medical and scientific point of view.

Hygiene in the province of Quebec is supposed to be taught and form a part of the course of study. It is very often taught orally the student having little or no preparation to make. Not having to write it the students do not remember as well.

Dr. Decarie strongly advised that all teachers who undertake to teach hygiene should be compelled to have a diploma either from a normal school or from a central bureau, established for the express purpose of teaching hygiene.

The speaker referred to the good work that had recently been done in the schools of Montreal through the introduction of modern hygienic principles.

BAD LIGHTING IN SCHOOL ROOM

Dr. E. J. C. Kennedy, Montreal, referred at some length to the poor light in many schools. 'The light shone on the child's face, instead of at his side. This injures the eyesight. The printing and letters in many of the school books was very bad and had a bad effect on the students. He suggested that the citizens should take the matter up with the Council of Public Instruction and get well printed books.'

Medical inspection of scholars was a great thing, England spends six million dollars yearly for this purpose. The eyes, nose, ears and teeth should be thoroughly examined. In some places the children's teeth are considered so important that unless they are in good condition they will not be admitted.

In closing, Dr. Kennedy urged all the doctors to take an active part in the campaign for better hygienic training in the public schools.

EUCCHARISTIC CONGRESS MONTREAL SEPT. 6-11

Headed by a special representative of His Holiness the Pope, and with five cardinals, two hundred and sixty bishops, innumerable priests, the list of those who will officiate at the Eucharistic Congress in Montreal, is certainly an imposing one. And when it is considered that Montreal is the greatest stronghold of Roman Catholicism on the North American continent, with its halo of church romantic history, its magnificent churches,--the Parish Church of Notre Dame and St. James' Cathedral of world wide repute, its hundreds of Roman Catholic institutions, there is no wonder that the Canadian Metropolis feels the honor conferred upon it and will once more display that hospitality for which it is noted. Aside from its educational aspect visitors will have an opportunity of taking part in or seeing some of the most impressive ceremonies, such as the official welcome of the Cardinals, the official opening of the Congress in St. James' Cathedral Sunday, September 3rd., the civic reception to the Papal Legate, the midnight mass in the Church of Notre Dame (seating capacity 15,000), the Pontifical High Mass in the open air on Friday at the altar specially built at the foot of Mount Royal. Sunday the solemn procession of the Blessed Sacrament.

THE FOREST FIRES

Spokane, Wn., Aug. 27--Walter Hess a home seeker, who was a member of a fire fighting crew on Big Creek, told how a dozen of his party were burned to death.

'Saturday afternoon thirty of us were stationed about twelve miles up Big Creek, under Warden Christy,' he said, 'Below us about two miles was another small crew, and together we were working to control a small fire. We had worked for some days in this way and had the fire pretty well surrounded. About 2.30 p. m. we heard terrible roaring upon the ledge just south of us and before we realized it the fire had cut off our escape. Thirty men at the upper end of the fire all escaped, but all the poor fellows below were killed. Five of the men were killed by falling trees and seven were suffocated in a small cave where they had sought protection.'

Tacoma, Wn., Aug. 27--Fire about 11 o'clock last night totally destroyed the saw mill plant of E. J. McNeely & Company, causing a loss of \$550,000 insurance, partially covers the loss.

Port Townsend, Wn., Aug. 27--Dense clouds of smoke from the burning forests to Washington and Oregon overspread the waters of Pacific from one hundred to three hundred miles off the coast of both states.

A report of conditions said to be particularly difficult for navigation was brought yesterday by the steamship which came from San Francisco. Captain Beery said that the vessel was never free from the ball of smoke on the run in. Shipping on every port of Puget Sound is hampered by the dense smoke.
