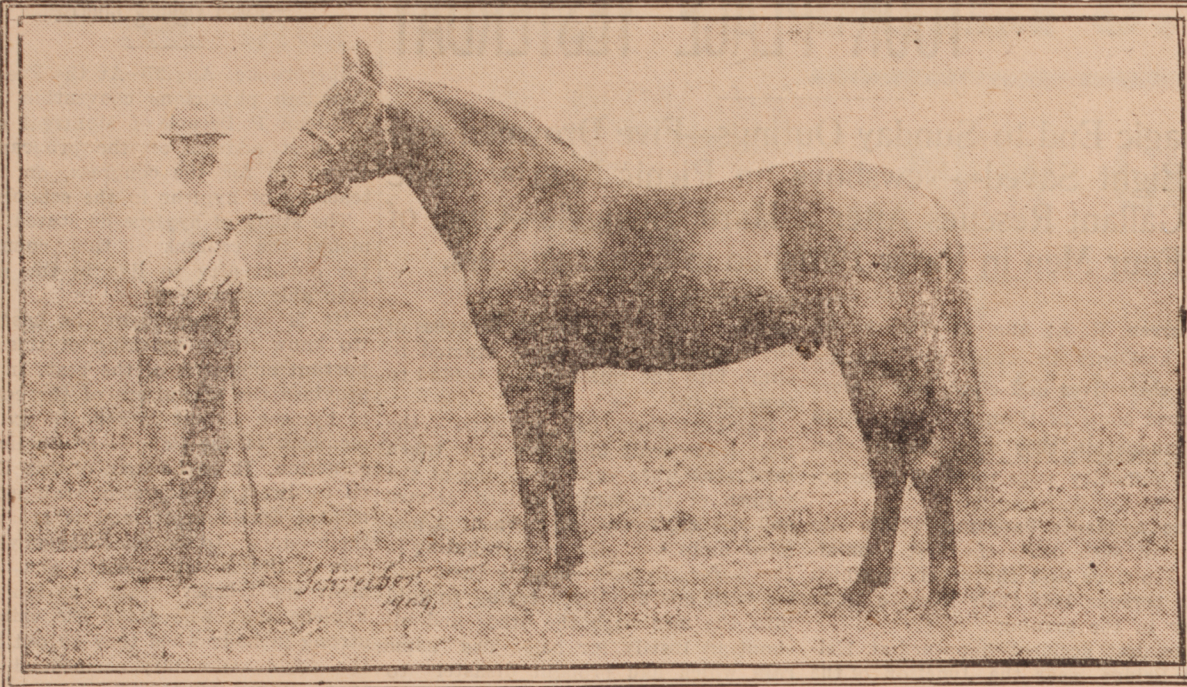

Uhlán's mile in 1.58½ without the aid of a wind shield at Cleveland last week was one more triumph for the family of Bingen, 2.06½. Perhaps no other trotting sire ever lived that at the same age was the progenitor of so many sensational young horses as are now credited to Bingen and his sons, Todd, 2.14½, and Bingara.

The sire of Uhlán is seventeen years old. He has already founded a family which now promises to be one of the most important in the future of the trotting horse.

Besides being a sire of early and extreme speed, Bingen is a model of the trotting horse type, not alone for light harness, but for heavy harness

work as well. He has the form, substance, style, action and quality of a prize winning carriage horse, and it he were not worth a fortune for stock purposes some of New York's enterprising dealers in fashionable high steppers would probably have snapped him up for show purposes and cut short his stud career long ago.

WITH NATIONAL LEAGUE BATTERY CLIPPERS WON FROM ST. JOHN'S 2 TO 1

Woodstock and Moncton Men Played for St. John's—Ferguson Pitched Great Game—Peasley Outclassed.

Before 2,500 enthusiastic fans, the Clippers snatched a ninth-inning victory from the St. John's in the game at St. John's Saturday afternoon. The game was closely contested throughout, and was one of the best that has been seen at the Winter Port for a long time. The Clippers had a National League battery—Ferguson and McCarthy—and to them is largely due the credit for the victory. Ferguson pitched a good heady game throughout and had the St. John's batters at his mercy all the time. He was ably caught by McCarthy, who is said to be late of the Cincinnati Reds. The St. John's drew first blood getting a man over the pan in the fourth inning. They did not remain long in the lead, however, for the Clippers evened things up in the next inning. In the ninth inning, however, the Clippers were able to score their winning run. A base on balls, a head ball and a two-bagger brought home the score. Peasley was on the mound for the St. John's and, although he pitched good ball, was outclassed by Ferguson. Both teams put up good ball, the Clippers having just a shade the better of play. Two Moncton players, Gallagher and Trites, played for the Saints. The fans turned out well to the game, and it was evident that base ball is due to revive in St. John. By winning this game, the Clippers and St. John's are again tie for the championship, and the play-off will take place next Saturday. The following is the summary of the game:

UHLÁN WILL TROT AGAINST HIS OWN RECORD TOMORROW

1.58 1-2 the Record to be Beaten—Great Gelding is in Good Condition.

Readville, August 27.—The world's champion trotting gelding Uhlán 1.58 3-4, owned by C. K. G. Billings of New York arrived at Readville track yesterday from Cleveland for his tilt against Father Time next Tuesday afternoon in connection with the opening day of the Grand Circuit meeting. He will be sent against his own best record, and if he beats 1.58 1-2 he will enjoy the distinction of going the fastest mile ever trotted. In appearance Uhlán looks very much the same as a year ago. Those who see him in action will observe that he is hung up considerably differently than when Proctor had him in charge. Tanner has taken much of the gelding's toes, has dispensed with the bow boots entirely and as for shoes he wears them now practically plain his front ones weighing 6 1-2 ounces and his hind ones but three ounces.

HUGH J. MCCORMICK DIED YESTERDAY

St. John, Aug. 29.—Hugh J. McCormick, the famous, oarsman and ex-champion speed skater of the world, died at his home in Coldbrook early yesterday morning. The deceased had been ill for a long time, and last Sunday he took a very bad turn from which he never rallied. He was in the fifty-sixth year of his age and was well known throughout the sport world. He was born on Long Island, in the Kennebecasis, and resided there for the greater part of his life. After his marriage he moved to the Willows hotel, on the Kennebecasis, which he conducted successfully for several years. About three years ago he moved to Coldbrook, where he was proprietor of the Three Mile House. When but a young boy he made quite a reputation as an ice skater and an oarsman.

He is survived by his wife, two brothers—Charles, of Kennebecasis Island, and Ralph of New York, and two sisters—Mrs. William Leonard of the North End, and Miss McCormick, also of this city. Rev. Charles McCormick, C. S. S. R., who is at present conducting a mission at Loggieville, is a nephew of the deceased. The funeral arrangements have not been completed as yet, but in all probability burial will take place tomorrow morning.

HAYDEN'S ALCY BELL WON 2.16 TROT AT BANGOR FRIDAY

Holmes Drove Winner in Consolation Race—Brownette Made Fastest Time of Meet.

Bangor, Me., Aug. 27.—Three events were on the card for the fourth and last day of the Eastern Maine fair and all were interesting although settled in straight heats. A feature was the performance of the green 4-year-old stallion Prince Aldine, owned by John McKay of Bangor who won his first race easily, taking the 2.40 trot 2:42 pace and setting his first mark at 2:19½.

The 2:16 trot-2:18 pace was won handily by Frank Hayden's Alcy Bell, who was driven home by Altissimus in one heat in 2:14½. Fernando showed a good mile in the first heat of the consolation race, which was a hard-driven mile. Constantly took the second heat, easily.

The races today ended the state fair series of 12 classes. Of these seven were won by Frank Hayden of Lewiston, who took first money in every event in which he started clean up about \$1000 for the week. Seven straight wins is believed to be a Maine record for a fair race program. The rest of the money was widely distributed.

The fastest time for the meet was made by Hayden's mare Brownette, who went two heats in 2:13½ on Tuesday. Two of the Hayden string came and Maude S. won two races. There were no accidents and no protests or fines. E. E. Wentworth of Springvale started all the races. The summary:
