ABOUT ONE HUNDRED AND SEVENTY SCHOOL PERMITS WERE ISSUED

Attendance About Same as Last Year
—Miss Williamson Will Return in Latter Part of Next Week.

The public schools re-opened today after the summer vacation. About one hundred and seventy permits were issued today by Mr. C. A. Sampson, secretary of the Board of School Trustees, and still others are to be issued as many children who have been spending the holidays away from home have not yet returned. The total attendance will be about the same as last year.

Secretary Sampson stated this afternoon that it would be several days before all the pupils would be in the schools and everything running smoothly. For the first few days here is bound to be some over-crowding but this will be remedied in time.

PROF. AND MRS. HARDY EN ROUTE HOME FROM TRIP TO WOODS

Canoed From Head Waters of Tobique to This City—Had Good Fishing and Saw Lots of Game.

Prof. and Mrs. J. G. Hardy arrived in the city yesterday from a three weeks' trip to the headwaters of the Tobique and Nepisiguit Rivers, made under the guidance of Messrs. Charles Cramin, David Edwards and Frederick Edwards. They experienced beautiful weather all through and had the most enjoyable outing of their lives. They canoed down the Nepisiguit River, a distance of thirty-five miles, and had splendid fishing, some of the trout which they caught weighing as high as three pounds. They also saw a great many moose and deer.

They made the return journey from the head of the Tobique to this city by canoe, camping at night along the route. The entire distance travelled was about two hundred and fifty miles.

Prof. Hardy occupies the chair of mathematics in Williams College at Williamstown, Mass. This is his first trip to New Brunswick and he assured The Mail that it had been a most agreeable one. "The fishing at Bathurst Lake and on the Nepisiguit is splendid," he said. "I never saw anything like it in my life. Why, often we would catch three trout at a single cast. As for Guide Cramin and the Edwards boys, they did everything in their power to make it pleasant for us. They are first-class guides, all of them, and I will cheerfully recommend them to my friends." Prof. and Mrs. Hardy will leave for home by this evening's train.
