ROYAL BANK ADVANCES

The stock of the Royal Bank of Canada advanced during the week from 231 to 240 on sales of 768 shares. The growth of the Bank has been remarkable. In 1900 the bank was comparatively unknown with only a few branches in the Maritime Provinces, and British Columbia, while today it has no less than 111 branches in Canada and 13 in the West Indies. Its deposits have increased from \$12,000,000 in 1900 to \$50,822,123 at the end of 1909. While in 1900 the net earnings were \$182,426 on a capital of two million or 9.12 per cent., at the end of 1909 the net earnings were \$838,306 on an average capital of \$4,636,000, or 18.08 per cent. The stock has been scarce for some months and a little buying has advanced the stock.

THE SAW MILLS OF
GIBSON COMPANY
WORK OVERTIME

1,200,000 Feet of Lumber Going Through the Gibson Company's Mills Every Week.

The saw mills of the Gibson Manufacturing Company at Marysville and Blackville are running overtime in order to keep up with the demand for sawed lumber. The mills at Marysville are turning out about 1,000,000 feet of sawed lumber per week, and the Blackville mills are producing 200,000 feet per week. The lumber is being shipped to Gibson, where it is loaded on scows and exported to the lumber market of the Old Country.

The lath mills of the Company are also very busy. The Marysville mill is sawing over 700,000 feet of lath lumber per week. The mill at Blackville turns out 120,000 feet of laths each week.

Four gangs are on duty all day at the Marysville mill and at night are replaced by two gangs. Prices in the old country markets are very steady.

SOLDIERS OF THE KING

The 71st York Regiment lined up at the Drill Hall this morning and marched to the C. P. R. depot where it embarked at 6.50 for Camp Sussex. The streets last evening were dotted here and there with representatives of The Hospital Medical Corps, The Field Ambulance, Infantry and Cavalry. The boys of York County, headed by Lieut. Col. H. F. McLeod, mounted on a spirited charger, made a picturesque spectacle. Major W. H. Gray and Acting Adjutant McKnight were also mounted. Taken altogether the boys made a good appearance and marched well. They wore the red coat uniform but upon reaching camp a khaki uniform consisting of shirt and trousers will be issued to each man, these being far more serviceable both for warm weather and field duty.

BAD ROADS

People coming in from the country this afternoon say that the heavy rain of this morning has made the roads similar to what they were last spring. In some places a wagon will sink almost to the hubs and the horses have great difficulty in getting through the mire. The road from here to Springhill is in especially bad shape and it is hoped that some good will come from the petition which was recently sent to the Commissioner of Public Works through the Hon. H. F. McLeod. The stretch of road through St. Mary's and Gibson from the highway bridge to the Marysville road, would hardly please the old road-builders of Rome. In fact it would be hard to find a worse road in any part of the county. With so much traffic continually going over it, the overseer of roads in that community would greatly increase his popularity by having the road fixed up.

MR. JUSTICE LANDRY
WOULD REDUCE JURIES

At the Opening of Supreme Court this Morning He made Interesting Observations on Juries and Administration of Justice.

The King's Bench division of the supreme court opened at the County Court House this morning with Mr. Justice Landry presiding. There was only one case on the docket, that of Martin Kennedy vs. Margaret Gorman. The issue was trespass upon lands owned by the plaintiff in Cork Settlement. Mr. Peter Hughes appeared for the plaintiff and the defendant was represented by Mr. O. S. Crockett.

The grand jurors who answered their names were: Benjamin Babbitt, Lody Belyea, William Jeffrey, Joseph Smith, William D. Sansom, Robert Colwell, Samuel MacFarlane, Henry Anderson, Frank Clements, Walter Jennings, Charles Fowler, Arthur Sewell.

The petit jurors in attendance were, William Seymour, Glazier Currie, Howard Burt, Asa Currie, Dell McKnight, Harry Seymour, Alfred D. Jewett, Spafford Barker, Ernest Holyoke, Geo. P. Christie, John P. Fletcher, Dawson Howard, Lorne Merrithew, John Greer, Alex. Haining, Jas. A. Bell, Harry Lehr.

The following jurors were chosen to sit on the only case before the court: Harry Lehr, Glazier Currie, William Seymour, Spafford Barker, Dell McKnight, Alfred D. Jewett, John Greer.

After the grand jury had elected their foreman, Mr. William Jeffrey, and had been duly sworn, His Honor Judge Landry, addressed them, remarking that he was glad for their sakes that there was no business to

come before them at this sitting of the court. He would not impose a fine on those jurors who were absent, since their services were not needed. He was of opinion that the administration of justice would be more satisfactory without any grand jury at all and if there had to be one he could see no reason why six good men and true should not be just as effective as five, seven or twelve. The time has come when nearly all matters of arbitration between nations and corporations were left to not more than three men. When the jury is small the members of it would feel more responsibility and would not be so apt to shift their responsibility to the shoulders of their fellow jurors. "The time has come," said Judge Landry, "for a change and a rapid change." In criminal cases he thought the justice meted out to the community would be far more satisfactory if the case were left entirely in the hands of two judges. A third, either a judge of the county or supreme court, could be added if necessary. The record of verdicts in criminal cases in Canada show that the jury method of obtaining justice might be greatly improved on.

The grand jury had no presentment to make and were discharged from further duty.

The case before the court is proceeding this afternoon.
